

BoI Eyes \$10bn from Foreign Investors, Disbursed N1.2trn in Seven Years

President Muhammadu Buhari, yesterday commended the board and management of the Bank of Industry (BoI) for contributing to the growth and industrialisation of Nigeria.

Buhari made the

commendation when he unveiled the bank's second edifice in Abuja. He said the structure would boost BoI's Internally Generated Revenue (IGR) potential.

That came as BoI said it had raised about \$4 billion from over 100 international banks/ investors in over 20 countries

within the past four years. The bank revealed that it was also working to increase the figure to about \$10 billion within the next few years.

Buhari pointed out that the development finance institution had disbursed over N1.4 trillion to micro, small and medium sized enterprises (MSMEs) at

single-digit interest rate. This helped in making access to credit easier and affordable for Nigerians as well as supporting the diversification agenda.

Buhari addressed the gathering via a video conferencing. Dignitaries physically present at the unveiling of the BoI edifice included Minister of Industry,

Trade and Investment, Mr. Adeniyi Adebayo; Governor of the Central Bank of Nigeria (CBN), Mr. Godwin Emefiele; Chairman of BoI, Mallam Aliyu AbdulRahman Dikko; and the bank's Managing Director/Chief Executive, Mr. Olukayode Pitan, as well as development partners. The president expressed

optimism that with the raising of a €700 million Eurobond, the BoI would be able to provide more funding for the growth of businesses in the country.

He said, "I am particularly impressed that this world-class building will finance internally

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Stock Market Shrugs Off Insecurity Worries, Gained N3.02trn in Q1

The market capitalisation of the Nigerian Exchange Limited (NGX) gained N3.02 trillion in

the first quarter (Q1) of 2022, notwithstanding the growing insecurity concerns in the country.

The market performance was buoyed by impressive corporate

earnings by major listed companies that saw some of them delivering robust dividend payout to shareholders.

Precisely, the market

capitalisation gained N3.02 trillion to close on March 31, 2022, at N25.312 trillion, higher than the N22.297 trillion it opened for trading activities on January 4, 2021.

The NGX All-Share Index (ASI), which tracks the general market movement of all listed companies on the Exchange, also rose by 9.95 per cent to close at 46,965.48 basis

points in the first Q1 2022.

Determined to punish Monday's attack on a Kaduna-bound train, which killed eight passengers and left scores unaccounted for, the military, yesterday, launched a counter-offensive against terrorists suspected of links with the bombing incident, killing 34 of them through air strikes.

The attack created deep fears in citizens and doubt about the ability of the military to defend the country's democracy and territorial integrity.

In their reaction to the incident, members of the House of Representatives, yesterday, expressed serious worry over the worsening insecurity in the country and lamented that nowhere was safe any longer. The lawmakers

demanded the sack of the National Security Adviser, Major General Babagana Monguno (rtd). They accused the security agencies of profiting from the increasing insecurity in the country.

Similarly, House Majority Leader, Hon. Alhassan Ado-Dogwuwa, accused the government of failing to live up to expectations. Ado-Dogwuwa suggested that citizens should be allowed to bear arms in self-defence.

But the Peoples Democratic Party (PDP), yesterday, decried some of the public words of the Kaduna State Governor, Mallam Nasir el-Rufai, and Minister of Transportation, Chibuike Amaechi. The main opposition party said such words tended to confirm its position that the All Progressives Congress (APC) administration knew the whereabouts as well as plans of the terrorists, and deliberately refused to act.

The air interdiction came as troops of the Multinational Joint Task Force (MNJTF) killed scores of insurgents during a clash in the Lake Chad area.

Nigerian Air Force sought collaboration with the Office of the Surveyor-General of the Federation in the area of mapping and geo-spatial deliveries, to aid the fight against terrorism.

A military update issued in Abuja, yesterday, said 34 terrorists were decimated in waves of air strikes.

The update said, "In receiving credible information that at about 2pm on 30 March 2022, about 70 terrorists on 40 motorcycles and some on foot were sighted moving towards the Akilibu-Sarkin Pawa Road, near Mangoro Village, the Air Component of Operation Thunder Strike swiftly scrambled an aircraft to intercept and neutralise the terrorists. "As the aircraft approached the scene, several terrorist were seen running in disarray on sighting the aircraft, abandoning their motorcycles to take cover within nearby bushes.

"The terrorists were subsequently engaged in different waves with rockets while those fleeing were mopped up with canons decisively. Feedback from local sources around Mangoro Village, disclosed that 17 motorcycles including 34 dead bodies as well as 14 locally fabricated guns belonging to the terrorist were recovered."

A source said some of the terrorists fled with multiple gunshot wounds during the encounter, but it was still unclear what roles they played in the attack that killed eight passengers onboard the Kaduna-bound train, with many injured and undetermined number abducted.

Meanwhile, an emergency intelligence meeting coordinated by the Defence Intelligence Agency after the train attack identified three locations as "destinations" of bandits after most attacks within the axis.

The meeting, according to PRNigeria, also considered immediate deployment of integrated security surveillance and monitoring

solutions for the rail line.

The locations identified by the intelligence service as bandit dens are in Rijana, Katari and Kasarami.

The places have proximity to the Kaduna-Abuja highway and rail lines.

"These locations are abodes to kidnappers, armed bandits, drug addicts, gun runners, prostitutes and fleeing Boko Haram terrorists," a senior intelligence source revealed.

The officer further disclosed that a "massive joint security operation" would commence in the areas, simultaneously with the support of recently acquired drones.

The source added, "Some of the services have recently acquired sophisticated Unmanned Aerial Vehicles, the drones to improve surveillance and ensure precisions on attacks on targets.

"We anticipate collateral damages in the initial stages of the operation, even though we will ensure maximum protection of innocent citizens.

"Proper identification exercises of people in the areas would be conducted."

The meeting of the intelligence operatives was on the heels of a security parley between President Muhammadu Buhari and the service chiefs.

Buhari had given the service chiefs the marching order to find lasting solutions to the incessant attacks on motorists and train passengers by bandits and kidnappers.

Prior to their meeting with Buhari, the duo of Chief of Defence Staff, General Lucky Irabor, and Chief of Army Staff, Lieutenant General Faruq Yahaya, undertook an assessment visit to the scene of the attack.

In another development, troops of the MNJTF, Operation Hadin Kai, eliminated scores of fighters of terror groups, Boko Haram and the Islamic States West Africa Province (ISWAP), in the on-going clearance operations around Lake Chad region.

Security sources said troops successfully cleared Cemente, Bagadaza, Zanari and Wulgo in Gamboru Ngala Local Government Area of Borno State.

A source said, "There were two encounters with the Boko Haram/ ISWAP insurgents at Zanari and also at the harbour area. Troops were decisive in both attacks."

It was gathered that the troops also rescued 21 women, 11 male children and nine female children in the operations, which commenced on March 28, 2022.

Some of the items recovered in the aftermath of the encounter included two gun trucks, 22 bicycles, 18 motorcycles (destroyed in situ), two Rockets Propelled Grenade (RPG) tubes, three Rockets Propelled Grenade Bombs, one NBST Gun, two General Purpose Machine Guns (GPMGs), three GPMG belts, 600 rounds of 7.62 MM NATO, and one FN Rifle magazine, among others.

The Nigerian Air Force sought collaboration with the Office of the Surveyor-General of the Federation in the area of mapping and geo-spatial delivery.

Speaking during a courtesy visit to the Surveyor General of the Federation (OSGoF), Surv. Abudulganinyu Adeyemi Adebomehin, the Chief of Intelligence of the Nigerian Air Force (NAF), Air Vice Marshal (AVM) Abubakar Liman, said the purpose of his visit was to seek areas of further collaboration with OSGoF, because of its expertise, skills and data required to aid NAF in its operations.

He solicited synergy with relevant authorities especially, in the war against insecurity, stating that, "security is everyone's business. War is a national assignment," which required the support of every citizen.

The intelligence chief reiterated the significance of the role of OSGoF in the war against criminality in the country.

In his response, Adebomehin said OSGoF, an extra-ministerial

establishment of the federal government as the apex mapping arm and responsible for implementing the survey coordination act of the country, was ready to provide all resources at its disposal for the success of the operations of NAF and other arms of the Nigerian Armed Forces. He disclosed that his office produced navigational charts for the Nigerian College of Aviation Technology (NCAT), which was certified by the Nigerian Civil Aviation Authority (NCAA). He added that OSGoF had acquired more sophisticated equipment and Unmanned Aerial Vehicles (UAVs) as well as a digital printing outfit.

Adebomehin stressed that the surveyors and other staff were already undergoing series of training and retraining in readiness to provide geo-spatial needs of the government, its MDAs, and other sectors of the economy.

Outraged Lawmakers Say Nowhere is Safe in Nigeria

Members of the House of Representatives, yesterday, expressed concerns over the worsening insecurity in the country, lamenting that nowhere is safe in the country anymore. Reacting to the recent attacks by terrorists on Kaduna airport and train, the lawmakers, while debating a motion of urgent national importance on the killings in Giwa, took turns to fault the security agencies and the federal government for their failure to end killings by terrorists and other criminal elements.

Hon. Shehu Balarabe (APC, Kaduna), while moving his motion, lamented that his local government had been ravaged by the series of attacks by bandits, who indulged in killings, kidnapping, raping, robbery and destruction of property. He said between 24 and 28 of March, bandits had unleashed attacks on those communities, killing over 117 people, while some corpses were yet to be recovered.

The lawmaker also claimed that more than 136 people were abducted, while over 10, 463 others had been displaced from their homes.

Contributing, Hon. Dachung Bagos (PDP, Plateau) called for suspension of funds appropriated for security agencies until they showed what they had achieved with what had been released to them over the years.

Majority Leader, Hon. Alhassan Ado-Dogwuwa, suggested that citizens should be allowed to bear arms to defend themselves. He said, "I arise to speak in the capacity of the Majority Leader, who of course, is the ambassador of government on this floor. When you have a government in place, the major responsibility of that government, especially, a democratic one which was elected by the people is to ensure safety of lives and property of the innocent citizens.

"Mr Speaker, when things like this continue on daily basis, those of us who are representatives of the government become speechless. We become speechless here to defend actions by government. This is an elected government, under a popular democracy but we continue day in, day out – killings, massacre, armed robbery all over – left, right and centre. Government in this case has to rise up to its responsibility, call a spade, a spade.

"On account of this institutional failure, regimental failure on the part of our security agencies, because you have just no cause to raise excuse, funding is provided, here we are now as an institution, we have now sent invitation, come and meet with the people of Nigeria, come and interface with us.

"With all sense of responsibility, I think Nigerians should this moment be allowed to also take arms. Nigerians must be allowed to take up arms in defence of their innocent souls, defend their hard earned properties, because it is like a monumental failure, if the agencies of security have failed,

then Nigerians should not be seen as failure.

"Let Nigerian organise themselves in the way of civil defence. Let's organise defence for their innocent souls, because if the responsibility of the government cannot be carried out democratically, then, everyone has the cause to defend himself. Nigerians should no longer be running away from attacks, unnecessary bandits."

Ahmed Jaha (APC, Borno) was of the view that security matter in Nigeria has become a cash cow business, accusing security agencies of profiting from it.

Jaha said, "In 2021, we budgeted N460 billion for the Nigerian army alone, only N29 billion was for capital expenditure, the remaining was for recurrent expenditure. In 2022, we budgeted N571 billion for the Nigerian army alone, only 37 billion is capital expenditure, the remaining were recurrent expenditure.

"Mr speaker the truth of the matter is security in Nigeria has become a cash cow business. I am not willing to go without taking my own and he is not willing to go without taking his own and the other person is not willing to leave until when he got his own.

"It is a cash cow business. They don't want it to finish, because they will realise that everybody's attention was diverted towards north-east. Okay, let them release north-east to some extent and go to north-west, after north-west, they move to south-west. Before you realise what is happening, the whole country is gutted with security challenges."

However, after being chided by Deputy Speaker, Hon. Idris Wase, he withdrew his comment and said he was not going to deal with him.

But Hon. Nasiru Ali Ahmed (APC, Kano) called for the sack or resignation of the National Security Adviser (NSA), Major General Babagana Monguno (rtd),

performance of the NGX was bullish, as most indices closed the period on uptrend as at March 25, 2022.

For instance, the NGX Oil & Gas Index appreciated the most by 28.12 per cent. It was closely followed by the NGX Banking Index, which recorded a gain of 8.55 per cent, while the NGX Premium Board Index rose by 6.34 per cent.

Others were the NGX Pension, NGX Industrial Goods, NGX 30, and NGX Lotus II that went up by 6.34 per cent, 5.63 per cent, 5.39 per cent, 4.37 per cent, and 1.18 per cent, respectively.

On the other hand, the NGX Insurance and NGX Consumer Goods recorded year-to-date decline of 6.35 per cent and 4.21 per cent

respectively, as at March 25, 2022.

On a monthly review, the Nigerian bourse witnessed positive price movements leading to a bull-run throughout January 2020, during which it closed with a 9.1 per cent month-on-month growth in the All-Share Index, and extended the gains by 1.7 per cent in February. During the period, BUA Foods got listed, boosting the market capitalisation by N720 billion.

Speaking on the market performance in Q1 2022, Chief Operating Officer of InvestData Consulting Limited, Ambrose Omordion, said the stock market sustained positive sentiment and uptrend due to the influx of corporate actions and 2021 audited financials, as players reacted to the

released numbers and dividend declared for year-end 2021 earnings.

Omordion said that was expected to support an uptrend during the earnings season, amid the oscillating oil prices, just as the market continues to interpret economic data in relationship with crude oil price and other factors, in the midst of profit-taking and portfolio rebalancing.

"This resulted in market players targeting fundamentally sound and dividend-paying stocks, as 2021 Q4 GDP was up at 3.98 per cent, while the International Monetary Fund called for a hike in the interest rate and further devaluation of the naira," he added.

On the market outlook, Omordion projected mixed sentiment trading

by investors in April and beyond, saying all eyes would be on the performance of the economy and how the country's economic managers would navigate challenges, which included insecurity and activities externally.

According to him, investors would also be concerned about on-going war in Ukraine, energy supply chain distortion that had been one of the major factors driving inflation, insecurity, among other factors that have pushed cost of production, goods and services higher.

He added, "To invest profitably in this changing environment, you need investment education, trading plans and trading tools/ software. These will help manage

risk associated with volatility and unstable markets."

An analyst at PAC Holdings, Mr. Wole Adeyeye, said investors priced in the dividend payout out by the listed companies, which according to him drove market performance.

Adeyeye said, "Investors have already priced in the dividend in January and February and that is why the market maintained positive growth during the period. However, there was profit-taking in March as most investors did not bother to wait for the dividend payment date."

He predicted that in April, the stock market might witness cautious investors' trading due to the uncertainties surrounding the economy.

"From being an import-dependent economy to an economy that is self-sufficient and economy that develops itself and ensures that we reduce imports and begin to export and produce."

Emefiele said Nigeria has the potential to grow not just its economy but also the economy of other countries in Sub-Saharan Africa.

The Bol managing director disclosed that the bank had raised about \$4 billion from over 100 international banks/investors in over 20 countries within the past four years, adding that most of the funds ended up as part of the country's foreign reserve.

While thanking Buhari for the renewal of his tenure and that of the chairman for another

five years, Pitan assured that the board would work harder and, "complete our succession planning project, which is on-going with our consultants, Price Waterhouse."

Pitan said through the president's support, Bol had been able to approach the international capital market and conclude various funding transactions, including a \$750 million syndicated medium-term loan in 2018, which had now been fully paid; €1billion syndicated loan in March 2020; \$1billion syndicated loan in December 2020; and recently the €750million Senior Eurobond (the first by any African national DFI) in February 2022, whose sovereign guarantee was also approved by the National Assembly.

The Bol MD added that these funds had significantly improved the bank's capacity to continually support Nigeria's real sector.

On his part, Dikko said the commissioning was an important milestone for the bank, as it signifies the culmination of many years of tenacity and

determination to ensure that the edifice was completed and put to judicious use.

He said judging by the increasing profile of the bank and its operations, the new building should open new business frontiers for the country in general.

According to him, for decades, Bol has delivered appreciable results on its mandate towards transforming the country's industrial sector by providing affordable and long-term financing across key segments and sectors of the economy.

The Bol chairman said in the last five years alone, working with strategic partners, the bank had supported over 3.2 million MSMEs as well as large enterprises, and created over 7.1 million direct and indirect jobs in the process.

He added that the bank's total assets also grew from N683 billion in 2016 to N1.7 trillion in 2021.

He said, "BOI has consistently aligned its corporate strategy with the strategic objectives of the federal government, especially

as it relates to industrialisation and job creation; from Nigeria Industrial Revolution Plan, to Economic Recovery and Growth Plan; and now to the newly introduced National Development Plan.

"To that end, the bank has been a reliable partner in managing several intervention projects and funds targeted towards entrepreneurship, economic rehabilitation and poverty eradication on behalf of the federal government."

With \$537m, US Begins Construction of Largest Consulate Globally in Lagos

The United States Government yesterday commenced the construction of a new Consulate office, which would be the largest globally, to be situated at the iconic Eko Atlantic City in Lagos.

An impressive ground-breaking ceremony on the project, estimated at \$537 million, was witnessed by Governor Babajide Sanwo-Olu, who was joined US Ambassador, Mary Beth Leonard, and US Consul General Claire Pierangelo.

Located on a 122-acre site in the rapidly developing Eko Atlantic City, the new US Consulate General in Lagos would support diplomatic and commercial relations between the United States and Nigeria and provide American and Nigerian Consulate employees with a safe,

secure, sustainable, and modern workplace.

"When completed, it will be the largest US Consulate in the world, demonstrating the importance of the relationship between the United States and Nigeria," according to a statement issued after the ceremony by the Public Affairs Section of the U.S. Consulate General, Victoria Island, Lagos.

The new Consulate, the statement said, would directly benefit the Nigerian people, and throughout the project, an estimated \$95 million would be invested in the local economy, with the project employing approximately 2,500 Nigerian citizens, including engineers, architects, artisans, construction workers, and administrative staff.

"These workers will have the opportunity to learn new technical

skills and safety awareness that will help distinguish them in the local market," the statement said.

In her remarks at the ceremony, Leonard expressed appreciation to the federal government and Lagos State Government for their support.

"Our vision for this remarkable Consulate campus is to create a facility that both honours the vibrant relationship between

the United States and Nigeria and communicates the spirit of American democracy, transparency and openness," Leonard added.

"Nigeria and the United States have a long-standing history of people-to-people engagement fostering bridges between our two nations. We look forward to the many accomplishments we will continue to achieve together in the future," Pierangelo said.

The new Consulate would provide a modern space for the largest consular operation in Africa, including improved public-facing interview and waiting areas.

The construction project targets Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) Silver Certification — a globally recognised designation for achievement in high performance, best-in-class, green buildings —

and incorporates many features designed to make the building more sustainable.

Ernead Architects LLP of New York is the design architect, Pemix Federal, LLC of Lombard, Illinois, is the design/build contractor, and EYP, Inc. of Albany, New York, is the architect of record. The construction project would take approximately five years, with completion expected in 2027.

Poor Leadership, Bane of Nigeria's Challenges, Says Saraki

● Ex-Senate president seeks support of Delta, South-east PDP delegates, rejects zoning

Former President of the Senate, Dr. Bukola Saraki, has argued that the rudderless leadership currently in charge of affairs in the country is the cause of the present socio-economic challenges facing the country.

Saraki therefore stressed the need for a president in the next administration that could reverse the trend by detoxifying the country.

Saraki said he decided to throw his hat in the ring for the presidency in 2023 because the nation was in dire need of courageous and patriotic people to rise to the challenge to rescue Nigeria from the present inept leadership.

The presidential hopeful spoke through The Abubakar Bukola Saraki Contact and Advocacy Council, which yesterday, was in Delta State to canvass support of the PDP delegates for actualisation of the Saraki presidential ambition in 2023.

Speaking in Asaba, Delta State capital, the leader of the Council, Prof. Iyorwuese Hagher, lamented the pervasive rot in Nigeria, saying it was a direct manifestation of a failed government occasioned by the ineptitude of the Buhari-led All Progressives Congress (APC).

A former Presidential aspirant and high commissioner to Canada, Hagher expressed optimism that the Bukola Saraki presidency would be the right leadership for Nigeria

especially at this point in time that the country was confronted with numerous challenges.

"As governor of Kwara State, he has a track record; as senate president, he has a track record; a record of doing the right thing. As president of this country, Saraki has the political will to implement the much needed change Nigeria desires", Hagher said.

The chairman of the Council noted that Nigeria has practically become toxic as a result of toxic leadership and appealed to Delta State PDP delegates to support a Saraki presidency to cleanse the nation of its toxicity.

Hagher added: "The time has come for serious Nigerians to step forward to take charge of this country. We can no longer leave the affairs of this country to mediocre leadership."

Responding, the Chairman of the People's Democratic Party (PDP) in Delta state, Chief Kingsley Esiso, said that he has no doubt that Saraki was well-equipped to make a good president.

"He (Saraki) is a man of intelligence and capacity. As the chairman of our party's reconciliatory committee, he has done very well to unite the party", the Delta PDP chairman said, assuring that he would, "relate the message of the council to the leaders of the party and the governor of Delta state."

In a related development, Saraki also sent his emissaries to

the south-east geopolitical zone seeking support to realise his ambition, despite strident clamour for power shift to the zone.

Leading one of the teams to Umuahia, Abia State, Senator Suleiman Adokwe delivered Saraki's message to the leadership and stakeholders of Abia State chapter of the PDP, saying that zoning has no role in the task of saving Nigeria.

"It's not about zoning; PDP should choose a competent person to take power from APC," he said, adding that Saraki fits the mould and his emergence as the presidential flag bearer of the former ruling party would yield success in 2023 general election.

According to him, the former Kwara State governor, "is desirous" of taking the reins of power in 2023 to breathe life into a nation battered into comatose by the ruling APC.

He argued that the ruling party had plunged Nigeria into a deep mess, adding that it would take a leader of immense capacity and political will, like Saraki, to pull the beleaguered nation out of the miry economic, socio-political situation where insecurity has become a new normal.

Adokwe noted that prior to APC coming to power, Nigerians were travelling across the country without fear, saying under APC insecurity has engulfed the nation so much so that not even air travel was immune to terrorists' attacks.

He stated that the Buhari government has proved in words

and in deeds that they cannot be trusted by Nigerians. This is because, "everything that APC promised are yahoo yahoo promises", referencing internet fraudsters that usually make false promises to their victims.

Extolling Saraki's qualities, the leader of the advocacy and contact team pointed out that the Kwara born politician is a detribalised, young, energetic and highly competent leader, who is not a religious bigot.

He noted that Saraki served Nigeria creditably as Senate President and ensured that the country was protected from reckless borrowing, unlike what the present, "rubber stamp" Senate leadership which has encouraged Buhari to plunge Nigeria into debt crisis.

Chairman of Abia PDP, Hon Alwell Asiforo Okere told the Saraki emissaries that they were "marketing a very good product", describing the presidential hopeful as "a man of high intellect, charming, generous" and imbued with immense capacity for great achievements.

"You have a good product; so continue to sell it," he said, adding that "we in Abia are proud of the quality of presidential aspirants coming up in our party" as it would enable PDP to come up with high quality presidential candidate.

However, he said that Abia PDP would continue with consultations in order to take good decision that would reflect the overall interest of Nigeria's main opposition party in its quest to return to power in 2023.

Obaseki: Benin River Port'll Boost Export Earnings, Facilitate Economic Growth

Edo State Governor, Mr. Godwin Obaseki, has said his administration remains committed to the realisation of the Benin River Port project considering its economic benefits to the state and country.

The governor said the port project would upon completion, boost export earnings, expand the economic value chain and open up new business opportunities, create employment opportunities, and stimulate economic growth and development.

According to a statement yesterday, the governor spoke at this year's Annual Investment Meeting (AIM) in Dubai.

The governor was pitching for investments in the Benin River Port and seeking foreign direct investments from businesses and organisations in the United Arab Emirates (UAE).

He said: "We are committed to the development of the Benin City River Port. This will be the closest port to the center of Nigeria. We have all talked about developing the deep seaport on our coastlines and most of those goods need to get into the country.

"So, we are using the opportunity of the Benin River to build a river port that is going to be a sister port to the Lekki Deep Seaport to bring goods and containers right into the country from where they will get distributed."

Obaseki added: "There are four opportunities in the transaction, which is already being finalised. We are looking for the opportunity to dredge the Benin River.

"Also, we are looking for the opportunity to construct infrastructure for the port itself and construct the accompanying road leading from the port to the city. All of these offer public and private opportunities."

The governor, who stated that Edo State was fast becoming a destination of choice for foreign investment, paraded the ongoing reforms for ease of doing business in Edo State, driven by laws that guarantee the security of investments, as well as the signing of a Power Purchase Agreement (PPA) with Osiomo Power Company to provide stable power to government institutions and drive the state's industrial sector, among others to ensure the influx of investors into the state.

OPEC+ Resolves to Continue with Gradual 400,000 bpd Oil Output Hikes

● *Nigeria's quota hits 1.753m daily production in May* ● *US plans release of 1m barrels per day to lower rising prices*

The Organisation of Petroleum Exporting Countries (OPEC) again resolved yesterday to stick to its strategy of gradually reopening its oil taps, agreeing to raise output targets by a measured 432,000 barrels per day for May.

The oil producers' group and its allies, known as OPEC+ at the conclusion of the 27th OPEC and non-OPEC Ministerial Meeting decided not to deviate from their schedule of gradual increases, as it has done for months.

Although oil prices recently

overshot the \$100 mark, OPEC insisted that some of the drivers of the increase like the Russia-Ukraine war were extraneous to the cartel's activities and have little to do with the supply of the commodity.

Russia is the world's third-largest oil producer, behind the US and Saudi Arabia, and the world's largest exporter of crude to global markets in addition to being a major producer and exporter of natural gas.

Brent crude, Nigeria's international benchmark, was down 5.6 per cent at \$107.05 yesterday.

The oil cartel also raised Nigeria's production quota from April's 1.735

million barrels per day to 1.753 million barrels per day in May, even though the country has been struggling to meet lower production allocations.

Nigeria had been constrained in meeting its OPEC quota for months, and as at the last production circle had as much as 300,000 barrels per day deficit, mainly due to theft, ageing upstream infrastructure and sabotage as well as technical reasons.

Despite the over 1.7 million barrels per day output allowed by the oil producers organisation, the country had managed to increase production to about 1.4 million, the highest in recent times, going by the latest OPEC review.

After its meeting yesterday,

OPEC noted that continuing oil market fundamentals and the consensus on the outlook pointed to a well-balanced market, and that current volatility is not caused by fundamentals, but by ongoing geopolitical developments.

The OPEC and participating non-OPEC oil-producing countries decided to reaffirm the decision of its ministerial meeting on 12th April 2020 and further endorsed in subsequent meetings to reconfirm the baseline adjustment, the production adjustment plan and the monthly production adjustment mechanism approved by the organisation.

The Sanusi Barkindo-led group also resolved to stick with its "decision to adjust upward the monthly overall production by 0.432

mb/d for the month of May 2022."

"OPEC reiterates the critical importance of adhering to full conformity and to the compensation mechanism, taking advantage of the extension of the compensation period until the end of June 2022.

"Compensation plans should be submitted in accordance with the statement of the 15th OPEC and non-OPEC ministerial meeting," it stated. The body further scheduled its next meeting to hold on May 5, 2022.

Meanwhile, President Joe Biden is considering a plan to release one million barrels of oil a day from the Strategic Petroleum Reserve (SPR) for as long as 180 days, a move that would add a large amount of oil to the global market.

If fully enacted, the president's plan is intended to help the US weather spikes in demand or drops in supply. About 550 million barrels are in the reserve, which has a reported total capacity of about 714 million barrels.

CNN described the announcement as unprecedented, saying the step was meant to punish oil companies for not increasing production from unused leases on federal land.

The steps are an attempt to reduce gas prices while also putting an onus on oil companies to increase supply. The dramatic step, which Biden was set to announce from the White House later Thursday, confronts what has become a looming political problem months ahead of the midterm elections.

Ajaokuta Rolling Mill Can't Be Ready again in 2022, Says FG

● *Attributes delay to COVID-19, Russia-Ukraine war*

The federal government has ruled out the possibility of completing the 43-year old Ajaokuta Steel Rolling Mill in Kogi state this year, saying its initial resolve to resume the construction of the mill was thwarted by the outbreak of the COVID-19 pandemic and the Russia-Ukraine war.

The Minister of Mines and Steel Development, Olamilekan Adegbite made the disclosure yesterday, while featuring on the weekly ministerial media briefing at the State House, Abuja.

He revealed that President Muhammadu Buhari had approved the release of \$2 million for the conduct of a technical audit of the mill as demanded by Russians before the restart of its implementation.

He said the technical audit was necessary to ascertain the condition of the facility before restarting the work.

According to him, just as arrangements were being made to commence the process, the COVID-19 came and put a halt to all activities causing a force majeure.

He said as the government moved to continue the earlier negotiations with Russia following the lockdown and procurement on, progress was again stopped by the outbreak of

the Russia-Ukraine war.

The minister maintained that the approved \$2 million was still intact, saying it had not been paid out.

According to him, government's earlier promise to deliver the project this year would no longer be feasible, saying, "where we are today, we may not be able to get Ajaokuta to work."

He, however, expressed the hope that something could be started on it that would be permanent while absolving government of any blame over the non-completion of the project.

Responding to a question, Adegbite said: "I told you Ajaokuta, by the grace of God, we will start an irreversible process. The problem with Ajaokuta is actually what we call force majeure. Nobody thought of the COVID-19 because the plan was deliver Ajaokuta this year 2022.

"And I've said it before, when we came back from Russia. Yes, I went to the public and said, look we will deliver Ajaokuta before the end of this tenure. And I pray that I'll have a chance to go back and apologise and explain what happened to the people before I leave office.

"Yes, it was through no fault of ours. We were ready to go, unfortunately, COVID became a force majeure."

13 Years After, Buhari Directs Return of East-West Road Construction to Works Ministry

● *Akpabio officially hands over to Fashola, says N10.4bn being awaited*

Thirteen years after it was taken away from the Ministry of Works and Housing, President Muhammadu has ordered the return of the problematic East-West Road to the ministry from the Senator Godswill Akpabio-led Niger Delta ministry which had been handling its construction.

The 328-kilometre road which has been under construction in the past 16 years, had seen the release of billions of naira, although work on it remains slow, a development that has elicited protests from indigenes of the region.

The important artery which criss-crosses the Niger Delta, from Delta state, through Bayelsa, Rivers, Akwa Ibom and Cross River was started by former President Olusegun Obasanjo.

It was at the time a product of agitations from the youths of the region and was awarded initially at a cost of N211 billion, although since then, it has increased on several occasions.

Last year, while on an inspection

tour, the Minister of State for Niger Delta Affairs, Omotayo Alasoadura, disclosed that the federal government had released an additional N7 billion to contractors to facilitate the completion of the road.

But following Buhari's directive, Akpabio, has now handed over the project back to the Minister of Works and Housing, according to a statement by the Deputy Director of Press in the ministry, Stephen Kikebi.

At the handing over ceremony, Fashola said such occurrences were rare and urged the Niger Delta people to maintain the peace so that work on the project could continue.

"It is an uncommon act because it is the decision of the federal government that this project that started then in the ministry of works be transferred to the ministry of Niger Delta affairs and 13 years after, the president directed that the project be handed over to the ministry of works and housing for completion," he stated.

Fashola added that collaboration

was needed within the host communities for the project to be delivered.

"One condition for any project to take place is communal peace. If we don't have peace there, we cannot do anything," he said.

The minister also urged representatives of the various communities at the event to take the message back home that peace was needed to deliver the project on schedule.

"Progress has been made from 2009 till date no doubt, but unfortunately that progress is not reported because of the passion with which the uncompleted part has been reported," he argued.

The minister further instructed a Director in the Ministry, Chukwunwike Uzo, to constitute a team from the ministry to undertake actual assessment with the contractors so that the ministry will be able to sign off on the engineering and civil construction terms at the point of takeover.

Earlier in his remarks, Akpabio said in order to fast-track the

completion of the project, the people of Ogoni demanded that it should be supervised by ministry of works and housing which has much more experienced professionals in terms of engineering services.

Akpabio reiterated that the project was awarded in 2006 by the administration of Obasanjo and that as of 2022, sections 1-4 of the project had reached 80 per cent completion.

"As we hand over the East-West road to you today, about 80 per cent of the project has been completed and the situation today is that it is easy to drive from Port Harcourt to Yenagoa under 50 minutes," he said.

On the length of the road, he put it at 328 kilometres, from Effurun in Delta State and traversing several states in the region.

Akpabio disclosed that the sum of N10.4 billion was awaiting release and that he had directed that the money should be released to the East-West Road account which would henceforth be controlled by the ministry of works and housing.

The House of Representatives Ad Hoc Committee on the recovery of N1.2 trillion

unclaimed funds from banks, Ministries, Departments and Agencies (MDAs) has discovered another N83 billion with Stanbic IBTC and another

N14 billion with First Bank of Nigeria Limited. During the continued hearing of the committee on Wednesday, it was revealed

that over 2 million operational bank accounts with First Bank had no Bank Verification Number (BVN).

The committee while expressing disappointment over the inability of the bank to abide by the laid down rules for financial transactions, insisted that the bank should take immediate steps to refund the money in question to the government coffers.

It was revealed that N3.2 billion of the total sum Stanbic IBTC was owing the government were in accounts without BVN.

Responding, the bank's Executive Director, Risk Management, Kola Lawal explained that he was hearing of the figure for the first time despite making submissions earlier to the committee.

Lawal pleaded for more time from the consultants to the

committee before they would take any decision regarding the matter.

But the lawmakers insisted that the committee was looking for government monies in the hands of both individuals and corporate entities to augment the government to fund the yearly budget and reduce external borrowings

Also, the Committee also called on the Joint Admission and Matriculations Board (JAMB) to begin the remittance of N74 billion in its kitty before next week Wednesday

Appearing before the lawmakers, a Director with JAMB, Muftau Bello also pleaded for more time to study and reconcile the documents relating to the said amount before making his submissions

The committee granted the prayers of the respondents with the hope to reconvene

from Tuesday next week for further hearing

Meanwhile, Citibank Nigeria Limited (Citi) in a statement yesterday, said it had provided extensive evidence to the Committee, adding that, "the Committee has since acknowledged that the claim that Citi is owing N99 billion to the federal government of Nigeria is completely incorrect."

A statement from the bank added: "Furthermore, the forgery allegations against Citi and any of its employees are false. The Committee has directed Citi to provide additional documents which Citi will provide.

"Citi continues to conduct its business in Nigeria with utmost transparency, the highest level of integrity and is in full compliance with all applicable laws.

AON Threatens to Sue FG over Multi Entry Points Granted to Foreign Airlines

Airline Operators of Nigeria (AON) has threatened to sue the federal government over its policy of allowing foreign airlines to access multiple airports in the country.

The operators insisted that allowing each foreign carrier to operate to more than one airport in Nigeria enhances their repatriation of foreign currency and also shrinks the market for domestic carriers.

The body also stated that for any foreign airline or investor to invest in the new national carrier, it must deposit at least \$200 billion with the Central Bank of Nigeria (CBN) to be sure of its seriousness, saying that no airline should use Nigeria as a dumping ground for unused aircraft.

AON was reacting to federal government's explanation that the multiple entries to foreign airlines was a good economic decision, but regretted that it put pressure on the foreign exchange for Nigeria.

Speaking at the Q1 2022 Breakfast Business Meeting organised by the Aviation Round Table (ART) with the theme: 'Economic Implications of Multiple Entry Points by Foreign Airlines into Nigeria,' President of AON, Alhaji Yunusa Abdulmunaf, said the body had decided to challenge the government in the court of law on the current policy on multiple entries to foreign airlines if not reviewed.

Abdulmunaf who was represented at the occasion by the Vice President of AON, Mr. Allen Onyema, said the body would in the next few days meet with the Minister of Aviation, Sen. Hadi Sirika, to deliberate on the issue.

He expressed confidence that the government would address the issue in the next 21 days, but stressed that the body was not giving the government an ultimatum.

The AON President lamented

that billions of naira were being lost annually to multiple designations granted the foreign carriers and warned that if the policy continued unabated the domestic airlines might suffer, while the foreign airlines would eventually take over the domestic market.

He insisted that multiple designation was a great disservice to the Nigerian economy and its people.

The AON said: "All the foreign airlines that come into Nigeria, every day the Central Bank Governor cries about the amount of money being repatriated abroad. We are talking about scarcity of foreign exchange in the country, but the foreign airlines are removing billions of dollars every year from this country, and airlines in Nigerians have been hassled with lots of requests on how to repatriate dollars into the system. Where are we going to get it from?

"Yet we are creating more avenues for these things to happen by giving multiple destinations to these foreign airlines. All the foreign airlines that come to this country, maybe about 20 or 30 of them have not been able to employ more than 150,000 Nigerians.

"We keep on badmouthing Nigerian airlines, forgetting that we are the architects of our own undoing. Air Peace alone employs over 4,000 people directly. It would take foreign airlines another 60 years to generate 4,000 jobs. Yet Air Peace has to beg to be given rights to build a hangar in its own country, it has no land in its own country. No land for its assets and passengers. It didn't start today."

The Minister of Aviation had explained in his presentation that multiple entry points were granted to foreign airlines based on the nature of their Bilateral Air Service Agreements (BASAs), noting that it expands the business and grows the economy of foreign airlines.

"It also generates revenue for the country as foreign airlines are able to land at different airports connecting different area of the country to foreign countries thereby promoting commercial trade, tourism and friendly relations.

"The grant of entry into more than two airports in Nigeria exposes foreign airlines to domestic routes and therefore into the domestic markets of the domestic airline and this has its negative implications. It is a capital flight against the country," Sirika said.

Telcos Give FG Seven Days Ultimatum to Address Sites Closure in Kogi

Telecommunication operators (Telcos) under the aegis of the Association of Licensed Telecoms Operators of Nigeria (ALTON), yesterday gave the federal government seven days ultimatum to address issues of incessant telecoms site closure in Kogi State as well as the refusal of the Federal Capital Development Authority (FCDA) to allow telecoms operators to build telecoms infrastructure in the Federal Capital Territory (FCT).

The telecoms operators who gave the ultimatum in Lagos, during a press conference, said the action of Kogi State government could lead to a total communications blackout in the entire Kogi State, parts of Abuja the Federal Capital Territory and possibly impact on service availability in some neighbouring states like Nassarawa, Benue, Enugu, Anambra, Edo, Ondo, Ekiti, Kwara, Niger.

They therefore called on the federal government to prevail on Kogi State Governor, Yahaya

Bello, to reverse the order to close telecoms sites in the state within the next seven days.

The telcos warned that they would be forced to commence nationwide disconnection of telecoms services, if the issues in Kogi State and the FCT were not addressed after seven days.

Chairman of ALTON, Mr. Gbenga Adebayo, said: "As a result of these actions by the state government, our members are unable to refuel the power generators nor provide any support or maintenance services in these sites, a situation which has currently resulted in the outage of over 70 sites including hub sites across parts of Kogi State.

"The impact of these outages will gradually spread to the states mentioned above and if no action is taken within the next few days, a total outage of telecommunication sites in all these states will be catastrophically experienced.

"We are very concerned that this indiscriminate action has the potential of further leading to a total telecommunication outage in Kogi State with neighboring states

and parts of the Federal Capital Territory adversely impacted.

"We will therefore be left with no other option than to begin nationwide disconnection of telecoms services, if the issues are not addressed after seven days."

According to Adebayo, "Telcos have settled all statutory levies and taxes due to the Kogi State government and have taken necessary steps to comply with local laws that govern business activities within Kogi State."

Speaking about the quality of telecoms service in Federal Capital Territory, Adebayo said the FCDA, office of the Director for Signage and Advertisement has refused to grant telecommunication service providers permit to build infrastructure in the Federal capital city.

"This is affecting the quality of services around FCT and Abuja. The problem is created by the governing authority in the FCT. Telecommunications services drive on the terrestrial infrastructure. We hereby call on the Federal Executive Council (FEC) to prevail on the FCDA in granting approval/

permit to our members to deploy infrastructure," he added.

Adebayo said ALTON and its members would no longer tolerate discriminatory charges against the sector, adding that the industry was planning to begin a study on varying tariff to some of the unfriendly telecommunications states in order to accommodate their demand. Those states that are requesting for non-statutory levies and taxes are the one being subsidised by some viable states, Adebayo further said.

"We want to be clear and state categorically that the action by Kogi and FCDA will not only jeopardise communication services provided by our members to the Nigerian subscribers, but will have the greater effect of negatively impacting the use of critical communication infrastructure by our National and State security agencies in the discharge of their duties to provide necessary security for the country, especially in these trying times, when communication across states should be uninterrupted and seamless."

OPEN LETTER TO GOVERNOR BABAJIDE SANWO-OLU ON THE PLANNED RESUMPTION OF TOLLING ACTIVITIES

May we first of all, express our best wishes to you and your administration as we write to bring a matter of utmost urgency with the potential to quickly spiral out of control if not checked, to your attention.

Let's first paint a picture of the current reality being faced in the socio-economic environment: According to the Central Bank of Nigeria / National Bureau of Statistics, unemployment is at 33% while youth unemployment is at a staggering 42.5%; and when you add youth under-employment, you have 63.5% of youth either unemployed or underemployed. Also, Consumer Price inflation (CPI) is currently at 15.70% resulting in increasing cost of food compounded by increased cost of electricity, fuel and diesel prices. In addition to all of this, the Academic Staff Union of Universities (ASUU) is on strike, meaning students are at home, with other unions threatening to go on strike.

It is therefore evident that with elections around the corner combined with Nigeria's precarious socio-economic climate, any additional triggers increasing the burden of citizens could produce unexpected outcomes.

We view with deep concern and trepidation the less than transparent attempt at recommencing tolling activities at the Lekki-Ikoyi Link Bridge, even as matters relating to the #EndSARS protest, which led to the termination of tolling activities in the first place, remain largely unresolved. The issue is compounded by the myriad of issues bedeviling the rationale to toll at this location.

It is against this backdrop that the Lekki Phase 1 Residents Association (LERA) implores the Lagos State Government (LASG) to apply wisdom and shelve its plans to resume toll collection on the Lekki-Ikoyi Link Bridge.

Furthermore, there are fundamental and critical issues yet to be addressed which make the decision to recommence tolling unjust, oppressive, and illegal.

1. **Pending Court Matter**

The Lekki Concession Company Limited (LCC) and LASG have continued to use the instrumentality of the law courts to foist hardship on our community. We recall that the Federal High Court in Lagos had in the recent past effectively declared the tolling of the Lekki-Ikoyi Link Bridge as illegal and unconstitutional. LASG characteristically secured an order of stay of execution on the ground that it had appealed the court's decision but has so far failed to prosecute the subject appeal. With this Sword of Damocles hanging over our community, one expected LASG to pursue the best interest of its citizenry rather than use the machinery of the state against law-abiding citizens.

2. **Ownership Question and Lack of Transparency**

In currently making a case for the resumption of tolling, LASG has stated several times that LCC is a privately owned entity. As such, it has the burden to cater for its over 500 employees. Nothing, however, could be more disingenuous.

According to LCC's website, LASG, "... acquired the shares/equity of the previous owners of LCC in December 2014." This was supported by the testimonies of the Managing Director of the LCC, Yomi Omomuwasan and the Head of Service to the Lagos State Government, Hakeem Muri-Okunola during the Judicial Panel of Inquiry on Police Brutality that LCC is 100% owned by LASG.

It was therefore clearly misleading that LCC presented itself to the members of the Lekki Estates Residents and Stakeholders Association (LERSA) as a private company. This was recorded in the Minutes of the Monday, March 14, 2022 meeting between the LCC Managing Director, LERSA members and other stakeholders.

Lekki Phase 1 residents have proximity to the Lekki-Ikoyi Link Bridge for obvious reasons, and LCC again sought to misinform the general public when it stated that it had consulted with stakeholders including residents who consequently endorsed the resumption of tolling. Nothing could be farther from the truth as LERA maintains that it NEVER gave its consent for the resumption of tolling.

LERA's position is that it is unconscionable to buffet the estate with excessive tolls on the two major exit points out of the estate without any viable alternatives. Not least because these infrastructures should rightly be provided by the government without the need to burden a populace that is already overtaxed.

3. **Underdevelopment of Lekki-Epe Corridor**

One is left to wonder as to the real motivation for the multiplicity of toll points within our community, a community that is already overtaxed in real terms.

Asides from the toll gate at the International Airport operated by a federal agency, the only functioning toll gates in Lagos State are the two toll gates managed by LCC in the Lekki axis within a 5km radius. In addition to the Land Use Charges, Infrastructure Development Charges and sundry other levies and fees paid by residents in the Lekki-Epe axis, what services has LASG provided in return? There is no general hospital; no central market; no public primary nor secondary schools. However, the residents have to pay an additional tax in terms of tolls and this is framed as LCC providing services. As LCC is owned by LASG, it is its job to provide services and we deserve more. The accounts of LCC have never been made public despite several requests, so we have not been able to carry out an audit for a cost-benefit analysis.

4. **Justice for #EndSARS Victims**

Following the directive given by the National Economic Council (NEC), Mr. Governor worked with his colleagues in most other states to set up the Judicial Panel of Inquiry on Police Brutality. The report of the panel was submitted, and a White Paper produced. LASG has not engaged Lagosians on the recommendations nor made concrete plans to deal with the underlying factors that led to the protests. Rather than work to seek peace, the State is actively working through LCC to inflict more suffering and hardship on its citizens. It is within this context that we understand that protests are being planned under the banner #NoJusticeNoToll. If the protests happen, the residents and businesses in Lekki will be the most affected.

Your Excellency, we feel it is expedient to bring all the above to your attention, and to particularly note that the general mood of the people suggests that LCC should refrain from collecting toll at the Lekki-Ikoyi Link Bridge and the Lekki-Epe Expressway until these fundamental issues are addressed. To do otherwise will be to needlessly stoke the tension which pervades the nation.

We urge Your Excellency to act to exercise maximum restraints at this point and to immediately suspend this planned resumption of tolling at the Lekki-Ikoyi Link Bridge in the overriding interest of peace and order in our community.

May God bless Lagos State and God bless the Federal Republic of Nigeria.

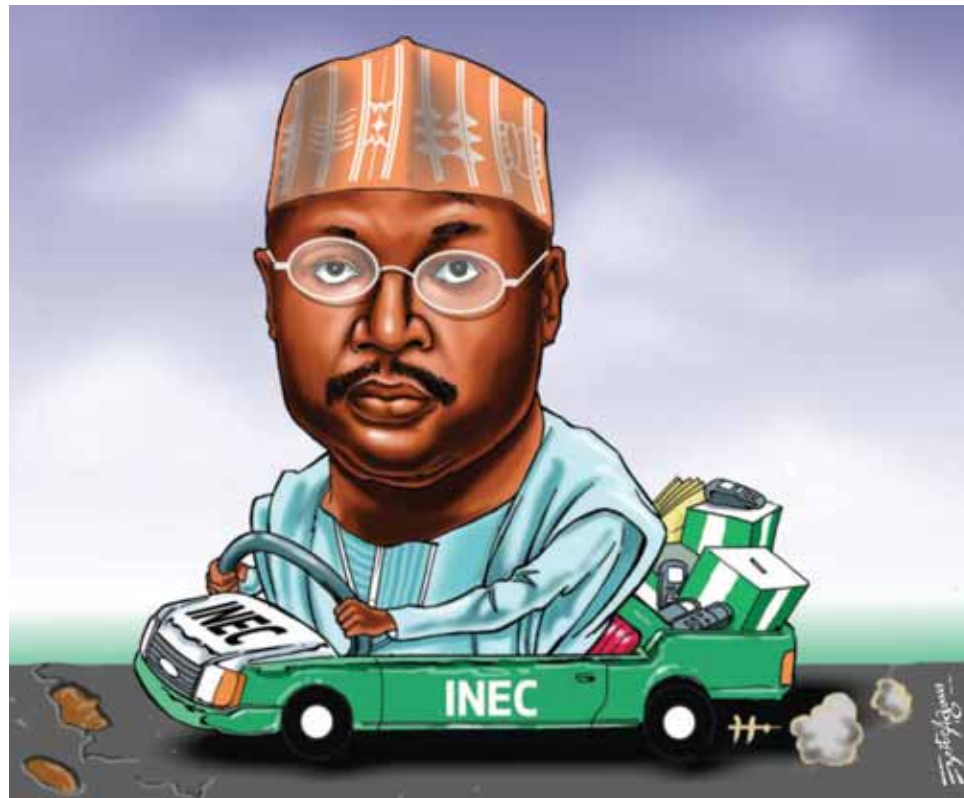

We must challenge our continent to put proper primacy on the education of the girl child, when we do that, Africa shall grow more Chimamanda Adichies, Ngozi Okonjo-Iwealas, Ellen Sirleaf Johnsons, Amina Mohammeds amongst others. And when we do so, we shall be bringing forward the joyous daybreak of massive gender parity and development in Africa.

Please join us in praying that the souls of the departed rest in peace and for their loved ones, that they may find the strength to bear their terrible losses. Those are prayers offered to God in heaven with hope and in faith. We, mere mortals on earth, can and must however act, we must take some very practical steps by ourselves right away.

The first thing we can do is to ask ourselves what we can do to help the injured and the bereaved. For the injured we can donate blood, maybe even send money and or volunteer to treat or assist if we have the skills. For the bereaved and those whose loved ones are battling for their lives we can call, visit and offer emotional, financial and logistical support. The latter will include offering to take them to hospitals or elsewhere, helping to take care of their wards and or offering to take charge of their meals. Despite the inauguration of the new international terminal at the Murtala Muhammed Airport in Lagos last week, it has emerged that the facility is not yet completed with the federal government requiring additional money to make the facility ready for full utilization, THISDAY has learnt.

It was also learnt that the current situation of the Murtala Muhammed Airport in Lagos, is the same with

the Nnamdi Azikiwe International Airport, Abuja, which has been partly put to use since two years ago despite the lack of some essential facilities.

THISDAY investigation revealed that out of the four airport terminals in Abuja, Lagos, Kano and Port Harcourt built with Chinese loan of \$500 million with counterpart fund of \$100 million, the two terminals in Lagos and Abuja will need extra facilities to make them functional.

Competent sources told THISDAY

that the additional funds would bring the total cost of the projects at the four international terminals to about \$2 billion.

According to a source who do not want his name in print, the two terminals at the Lagos and Abuja airports need additional critical features, “because they were located at wrong places. So existing installations, buildings and attendant equipment have to be demolished and rebuilt at other locations at huge cost to expand

the terminals for full operations.”

THISDAY also learnt that although the four terminals have been inaugurated, the variations to remedy structural deficiencies and to expand the facilities had already cost China additional \$150 million, while the federal government is yet to pay its own additional counterpart funding to speed the work and complete the projects.

It was learnt that the additional funding would be incurred because

many buildings around the project in Lagos and Abuja would be destroyed and rebuilt to make the terminals fully functional.

THISDAY learnt that the additional \$150 million incurred by China in the project was to connect the new terminal in Lagos and Abuja to the old one in order to have seamless passenger movement, as the train station, which is located at the new terminal in Abuja would have to process passengers from both the

local and international terminals.

But a study on the infrastructural limitation of the airport, funded by the then Ministry of Transportation in 2018, disclosed that there were many facilities that must be relocated before the terminal would become operational.

The study, which was carried out by Arcaid, Architects and Environmental Consultants, revealed

Nigeria Must Have One Refinery of Dangote Size Every Five Years to Meet Growing Demand, Says London-based Agency

A London-Based petroleum and energy market information provider, Argus, has said Nigeria must improve its refining capacity by having at least one size of Dangote Refinery every five years to guarantee in-country supply of

petroleum products that would meet the country’s growing population and demand.

The Vice President, Crude and African Markets, Argus, Mr. James Gooder, stated this yesterday, during an online workshop for journalists organised by the Major Oil Marketers Association of Nigeria (MOMAN), with the topic, “Fuel Pricing in

International Market and Nigeria.”

Argus is an independent provider of price information, market data and business intelligence for the global petroleum and energy industry including natural gas, electricity, emissions, biofuels, biomass, Liquefied Petroleum Gas (LPG), metals, and petrochemicals, among others.

Gooder said contrary to the impressions out there, Dangote’s 650,000 barrels per day refinery under construction in Lagos would not solve all the challenges associated with petroleum supply in the country.

He argued that Nigeria was growing in terms of population, wealth and consumption, adding

that with the demand rise against the low production capacity, the country would definitely need more refineries of Dangote capacity to be able to meet the growing demand.

Gooder said: “On whether Dangote Refinery will solve all the petroleum issues in the country, the sure answer is no. It will not, because Nigeria is a growing country, it’s

growing in terms of population, it’s growing in terms of wealth and it’s growing in terms products consumption.

“And so, if you are to look at the rising Nigeria’s consumption against Nigeria’s production of refined products, you will see a

Nesto Aviation Poised for Growth Despite Industry Challenges

As business aviation creates stronger market in Nigeria and operators become more competitive, Nesto Aviation Services Limited (NestAv), the aviation arm of the Obijackson Group has restated its capability to surmount industry challenges.

The company said it plans to expand the business operations in its areas of focus through its fleet of helicopters and Jets.

The General Manager, NestAv, Mr. Ehis Uadiale, who is a seasoned aviation and oil and gas expert, disclosed this in an online chat with newsmen recently.

According to him, the company, which was incorporated in 2013, is focused on consolidating its business plans, increasing its market share as a charter service provider within the oil and gas industry while working on its fleet expansion plan.

He also called for a consolidation of airline operators in the industry to enable capacity building in delivering premium value to its target market.

“We need to have consolidated efforts in the industry where people

with the same business idea, come together to achieve the required capacity to ensure operators deliver on promised frequencies without fail”, he said.

He further stated that the consolidation or strategic alliances would save both the industry and the clients as this would ensure the eradication of scheduled flight operators’ inability to airlift passengers at promised frequencies and completely eradicate cancellations.

On the maintenance of NestAv’s fleet, which consists of two AW139 helicopters, one Bombardier Global Express jet and a Gulf Stream G-IV, Uadiale posited that the organisation maintains its rotary wings (helicopters) through a self-sustained maintenance organization in the country. He also explained that NestAv has an agreement with the Original Equipment Manufacturer (OEM), which entailed following a defined maintenance program to aid the in-house maintenance and repairs when an aircraft is unserviceable or requires routine scheduled maintenance.

On the other hand, for the fixed wings aircraft (jets), there is limited capabilities to service and maintain these aircraft in Nigeria, the organization schedules annual shadow maintenance outside the country with an approved aircraft maintenance organization (AMO), to ensure all aircrafts that require C-checks are serviced efficiently.

He also called for a closer synergy between government agencies regulating the aviation industry to ensure harmony while protecting the industry from the numerous threats confronting it. He added that a huge challenge for airline operators is the high foreign exchange rates, which affect the cost of fleet maintenance and the cost of procuring aircraft spare parts.

“The government needs to look at fiscal policies that would help to stabilize the Nigerian currency. The fluctuating exchange rate compounds the cost of operating in Nigeria and this is in addition to the aviation fuel scarcity which is the reason a lot of airline operators cease operations” Uadiale added.

As Airlines Jostle for Nigeria’s Growing International Passenger Traffic

The Minister of Aviation, Senator Hadi Sirika confirmed on Tuesday during the World Government Summit, Dubai 2020 that many international carriers have been jostling to take a slice of the Nigerian international air travel market, which a former Ethiopian country manager in Nigeria described as the most contested market in Africa.

Also at Dubai 2020, the President of Emirates Airlines, Tim Clark acknowledged that Nigerians are seeking to travel all over the world and described Nigeria as powerhouse of Africa.

“We are over interested in flying there because it is a rich nation in terms of demand for services,” Clark said.

Industry experts confirm that Nigeria has the highest indigenous international passenger traffic in the world and average Nigerian likes to travel to international destination for business, for leisure or just for adventure.

This explains why Royal Air Maroc is pushing to have larger market share in Nigeria and it has put everything in place to actualise that objective.

Royal Air Maroc, more commonly known as RAM, is the Moroccan national carrier, as well as the country’s largest airline. RAM is wholly owned by the Moroccan government, and has its headquarters on the grounds of Casablanca-Anfa Airport. It joined the Oneworld alliance in 2020 and has remained one of the most successful African carriers.

The airline disclosed in a press conference in Lagos that it plans to expand operations in Nigeria, as the airline is the first African airline to join the Oneworld Alliance.

The airline which operates daily scheduled flights to Nigeria from its base in Casablanca to the Murtala Muhammed International Airport (MMIA), Lagos suspended its operations to the Federal Capital Territory (F.C.T) in Abuja due to low passenger traffic, but indicated that it would return to that destination to operate to two Nigerian cities.

Speaking during the conference to mark the celebration of the alliance between Air Maroc and Oneworld in Lagos, The Director, Finance, Royal Air Maroc, Karim Benchekroun said that although Air Maroc has a small market share in Nigeria, the demand is expected to increase with the new membership to Oneworld.

Oneworld is an airline alliance founded on 1 February 1999. The alliance’s stated objective is to be the first choice airline alliance for the world’s frequent international travellers. Members of the alliance include Japan Airlines, British Airways, American Airlines, Qantas of Australia, Malaysia Airlines, Cathay Pacific, Qatar Airways and others. Royal Air Maroc is the first member from Africa.

The airline said it is poised to increase its market share in Nigeria and this would be enhanced by the OneWorld Alliance, as it hopes to bring in travellers from the Americas, Europe and other destinations to Nigeria at the wings of the alliance.

“Nigeria is a very important market to us. Although the market is not very strong for Air Maroc now, it will increase very soon. We have discovered that people who travel with the airline basically travel for business, tourism and religious visits but the demand is small. We will keep

pushing to ensure we increase demand in Nigeria because the population is large,” Benchekroun said.

He said the airline would work with the relevant authorities to ensure visa processes for passengers are easy and seamless.

“Oneworld Alliance brings together world-class airlines to deliver a superior, seamless travel experience and special privileges for frequent flyers, he added.

He explained that the entry of Royal Air Maroc into the alliance followed a rigorous implementation programme to integrate Royal Air Maroc into the alliance.

Benchekroun said it took the airline a lot of effort and time to be a part of the big alliance, adding that this is a great way to bounce back after border closures as a result of COVID-19.

He said he was optimistic that the membership would also help the airline grow passenger demands across the world, especially in Nigeria.

“It took us a lot of efforts to be a part of this big alliance. We have only three African airlines as parts of the world’s alliances and Royal Air Maroc is the first airline to join the Oneworld alliance from Africa. We have added 30 more destinations to the Oneworld Alliance through our membership.

“The best alliance to join for us is Oneworld. Oneworld did not have any member in Africa until now and since we joined, the economic benefits to the airline and the travelling public have increased. Our goal was and it is still to compete with other airlines. Our aim is to give more benefits to our passengers and airline,” he said.

He disclosed that the airline chose this particular alliance because apart from being the first African member on the alliance, the alliance has quality members.

Chief Executive Officer, Oneworld Alliance, Robert Gurney, said the membership of Royal Air Maroc to the alliance was very strategic.

He said the membership of the airline had further swelled its destinations by 30 on the continent, promising that this would also be beneficial to the Nigerian travellers and market.

NAMA Hands over 29 Sites for Multilateration Surveillance System Installation

The Nigerian Airspace Management Agency (NAMA) is at the completion stage of its pet project, the Wide Area Multilateration(WAM) system, which is surveillance system to cover the Nigeria’s delta region.

The agency said it has recorded a milestone with the handover of 29 sites by the agency to ERA /CWA for system parts installation, including all construction works necessary for system commissioning, daily operations and maintenance.

The handover was formalised recently with signing of the Site Handover Certificate by both parties. The Director, Safety Electronics Engineering Services, Farouk Umar, presided on behalf of the agency while ERA of Czech Republic was represented by their subcontractors, Cathedral (West Africa) CWA.

Oil and gas activities occasioned a lot of helicopter operations in the Niger Delta and the purpose of WAM is to capture these flight operations that are outside the radar coverage areas in the country.

This is done for safety and

security purposes and according to the agency, benefits of the system include the provision of low-cost extension of the surveillance coverage for low altitudes and areas where no radar coverage currently exists; optimization of surveillance infrastructure through the efficient mix of radar sensors, MLAT and ADS-B; increased airspace safety and capacity by providing separation to aircraft operating in the region; the project upon completion, will provide additional source of revenue for the agency and MLAT applications, particularly when combined with Automatic Dependent Surveillance Broadcast (ADS-B) to provide important operational improvements by addressing some of the limitations of the traditional radar surveillance system, optimize the controller workload and provide benefits in the areas of safety, capacity, efficiency and environmental impact, thus contributing to the overall Communication, Navigation and Surveillance/Air Traffic Management

(CNS/ATM) objectives.

Multilateration Surveillance Technology (MST) requested by NAMA includes necessary services e.g. installation, optimization and commissioning of the WAM system for Nigeria.

This incorporates the supply and installation of the Air Traffic Management (ATM) system at Port Harcourt International airport with the ATM display for Area 1- Port Harcourt, Area 2 -Qua’iboe / Calabarand Area 3 -Osubi /Escravos in a single ATM Centre.

It also includes the installation of equipment at all sites, the supply and installation of equipment of Central Processing Unit; the supply and installation of Control Working Positions; the provision of system having capacity for management of Remotely Piloted Aircraft Systems (RPAS); the provision of all ancillary equipment which the system may require for its operation e.g. GNSS antenna /receiver etc and the provision of training for ATC and maintenance engineers.

Activate Red Alert on Aviation Infrastructure, Nanta President Urges FG

President, National Association of Nigeria Travel Agencies (NANTA) Mrs. Susan Akporiaye has called on the federal government through the aviation authorities to urgently step up and activate proactive security measures to deter attacks to aviation infrastructure across the country.

Akporiaye, in a statement, noted that the process should be backed up

with best global security intelligence architecture, which would nip such negative intentions and breaches in the bud.

“It’s certainly strange to wait to be attacked before we can respond, so we must advise that relevant government security agencies in charge of the critical aviation systems be put on the highest level of alert

at the airports and the vicinities,” Akporiaye said.

She suggested that all operators and workers in the aviation sector should also be profiled daily and access to the cargo and passengers areas be limited and put under effective surveillance at both local and international airports in the country.

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Recent terror attacks close all routes to Kaduna, writes

NO ROAD, AIRWAY, RAILWAY TO KADUNA

It takes personal restraint and courage not to be cynical about the mass graveyard that Nigeria has become under the watch of Muhammadu Buhari. Carried into power at the fourth try on the back of a general disenchantment with the security situation in the country, Nigerians looked forward to an improved and secured environment that would provide a conducive atmosphere for their economic growth and development. Almost seven years after, many discerning Nigerians have now come to the conclusion that indeed, 2015 was a mistake and its product, an avoidable disaster.

In the early evening of last Monday, the nation's news wave was hit by stories of an armed assault on a Kaduna-bound train from Abuja. Many were said to have been killed and several others injured. Terrorists had planted explosives on the tracks and as the train rode on them it exploded, derailing and making it a sitting target for the volley of bullets that came from the bush. The initial figure of the dead was put at 60 and scores were abducted.

By the time the official casualty figure of eight came at noon the next day, Bola Tinubu, an All Progressives Congress presidential frontrunner, had cancelled the 13th Colloquium that was already on to commemorate his 70th birthday. That rare gesture of compassion came ahead of the presidency's condolences to the victims' families. As usual, it was a drab and uncomfortable message that Nigerians have become accustomed to.

Expectedly a furious rage overtook the land with people asking the federal government to explain the basis for its existence if it could not rein in the non-state actors who have so frontally challenged its authority. A flurry of the usual post-violence activities followed, a presidential briefing with the security chiefs, Vice President Yemi Osinbajo visited the survivors at the hospitals, Minister Rotimi Amaechi and Chief of Defence Staff Gen. Lucky Irabor inspected the scene of the bloody incident and a presidential statement that Buhari had ordered the military to go after the terrorists. Last Wednesday, the Federal Executive Council observed a minute silence in honour of the dead victims of the train attack.

Of course, all these did not impress many Nigerians and they have said so loudly. How could they have been impressed? They have heard these severally in the past. The train attack occurred a few days after terrorists overtook the runway at the airport in Kaduna and prevented a passenger aircraft from taking off. One person was killed. With the airport and train attacks, Kaduna would appear to have been cut off from the Federal Capital Territory as road travel had become perilous years ago because of the activities of terrorists and kidnappers on the Kaduna-Abuja Highway.

This is very bad for a government that came



to office with a commitment to end insecurity. More depressing is the cluelessness of the regime on the way forward. Amaechi in his on-the-spot assessment visit said the attack was preventable but that lack of foresight of his cabinet colleagues made the occurrence inevitable. He had made requisition for explosive tracking equipment for the trains in view of the security situation in the country. In spite of FEC approval, procurement procedures frustrated the release of funds.

Nasir el-Rufai, the governor of the encircled Kaduna State, had also poured out his frustration. The security forces, he complained, were not doing enough to neutralise the terrorists. The intelligence agencies and the military, he said, knew where the terror merchants were but had refused to take them out. Given el-Rufai's

flippant mouth, it is tempting to dismiss his grievous claim but a statement by Uriah Opuene, a brigadier-general and Garrison Commander of 1 Division, Nigerian Army, clarifying the airport invasion seems to confirm the governor of the troubled state's claim. He said the terrorists did not actually attack the airport but were merely ridding through their routine route at the back of the fence of the airport. If the military was aware of the route, why did it not trace them to their base or lay ambush on them?

This is a poser that not only the military must answer. The federal government must also explain why in spite of billions of dollars expended on the security forces the nation is still in this mess. This is especially significant because the media had quoted intelligence sources saying that these occurrences were not for lack of intelligence but largely due to the failure of the appropriate authorities to act on the intelligence made available.

The governor's and the military officer's statements have given credence to the claim of the intelligence community. The defence of the intelligence community is that it could not go beyond collating, processing and disseminating information since it is not a fighting force.

No doubt, there are intelligence challenges but a more serious problem is not only the failure of the federal government to coordinate its intelligence agencies but also its inability to utilise the avalanche of recommendations made by security experts and related stakeholders on how to stamp out insecurity in the country.

The Bukola Saraki-led eight National Assembly held a lengthy conference on insecurity more than three years ago and made several recommendations. Nothing came out of it. The succeeding Ahmad Lawan-led ninth National Assembly and lapdog of Buhari also held a retreat on the same subject matter last year. Again, no show.

Both came on the back of several other workshops and seminars on the vexed issue. The panacea offered hovered around the same themes: rejig the security architecture of the country by synergising the intelligence agencies, improve intelligence gathering, deploy technology, upgrade the equipment and welfare of the security forces, and make criminality an unprofitable venture through strict enforcement of sanctions.

Which of these has been done by this administration? You guess. But the prevailing dire situation where the Kaduna people cannot travel by road, railway or air is a demonstration that whatever had been done was ineffective. ■

AIRSPACE AND AVIATION SECURITY

Another national embarrassment almost happened over the weekend. But alas, it wasn't fated. Reports indicated that a group of bandit-terrorists, numbering about 200 swarmed the Kaduna International Airport located in Igabi Local Government Area of the State.

The incident led to disruption of activities, which included the grounding of an Azman Air Lagos-bound aircraft, temporarily. In addition, a security officer attached to the Nigerian Airspace Management Agency (NAMA) also lost his life.

It was learnt that the terrorists were on a revenge mission after some Nigerian military troops neutralized scores of them, and equally retrieved some rustled cattle in their possession.

However, this unfortunate development is coming after another security breach had occurred last year, when the same category of criminal elements--bandits--invaded the country's highest defence and security training hub, the Nigerian Defence Academy (NDA) in Kaduna. Aside from killing some soldiers, reports claimed that the bandits also abducted a senior military officer.

Nevertheless, the level at which these non-state actors are resurging and unleashing violence at will, is something that needs to be treated with the adequate attention it deserves. Government and security agencies should live up to their expectation to surmount these lingering security challenges which are disturbing the peace of our nation.

It has been noted that an efficient transport system is part and parcel of national security as it entails the movement of people and goods from one place to another across the length and breadth of a particular geographical location. But in today's Nigeria, it is disheartening to learn that people no longer travel comfortably with peace of mind due to uncertainties associated with our entire transport system.

For example, looking at the land transport system, the roads are in bad shapes caused by numerous potholes that can easily plunge a motorist into an accident. Apart from that, the roads are also not safe as bandits, kidnappers and armed robbers are always having a field day to at any time launch attacks on commuters, robbing them of their hard-earned properties, abducting or even killing them.

Even the trains are no longer safe as terrorists have since devised a means of exploding rail tracks, thereby forcefully bringing it to a halt so as to pave way for them to carry out their nefarious activities on passengers.

The recent bombing of Kaduna-Abuja rail track by bandits is one of the worst attacks to have happened to Nigerian transport system. Several passengers were killed, others got injured while scores of them were equally abducted and yet to be accounted for.

Similarly, Nigeria's water ways are also dangerous, because they are swarmed by pirates who rob ships and sometimes abduct the entire crew only to release them upon payment of ransom. With the recent attack on the airport, it is right to deduct that the entire Nigerian transport system is compromised and has lost its calibre to serve the functions it is known to deliver.

The time is long overdue for Nigeria to rise to the challenge of safeguarding airspace and other transport sectors from the menace of criminal elements.

The importance of airspace and aviation security has been captured effectively in Nigeria's National Security Strategy, (NSS 2019), a document published by the Office of the National Security Adviser (ONSA),

Babagana Monguno, a retired Major General. According to the document, "Efforts to secure the Nigerian airspace will be led by the Nigerian Air Force (NAF) in collaboration with other relevant agencies. Considering the vulnerability of the airspace, the NAF will employ preventive and protective measures to guard against airspace violations through enforcement of international and national air laws.

"In addition, the NAF will deploy its resources to ensure the integrity of Nigerian airspace is maintained at all times. This will include conduct of aerial surveys and delineation of security zones and liaison with appropriate agencies towards the completion of the Total Radar Coverage of Nigeria (TRACON) project to ensure effective monitoring and airspace security.

The primary stakeholders principally concerned with safety and security in the aviation sector include the Nigerian Civil Aviation Authority (NCAA), Nigerian Airspace Management Agency (NAMA), the Federal Airports Authority of Nigeria (FAAN) and the Nigerian Air Force (NAF) among others.

The role of these agencies is expected to be coordinated and enhanced in line with extant legislation and policy on Nigerian Aviation Security.

Nevertheless, another evolving phenomenon in airspace security is the preponderance of drones which constitute safety challenges such as air misses and mid-air collisions with manned aircraft and security challenges such as air space violation, penetration of prohibited airspaces, threat to VIP security, terrorism and espionage. Others are law enforcement challenges such as drug trafficking and proliferation, which are all inimical to national security.

In order to properly secure airspace and the aviation industry, government must ensure the continuous provision of modern and up-to-date equipment as well as the promotion of effective training and professionalism of various agencies handling different aspects of aviation security.

Additionally, Standard Operation Procedures must be developed to streamline the roles and responsibilities of the various agencies in order to optimize their performance and enhance the cohesion of their personnel.

Furthermore, it is imperative to ensure the development of common safety protocols and resilience to protect critical aviation information infrastructure against cyber-attacks to enhance aviation security.

With regard to the Kaduna attack, the security agents that countered the invasion should be commended. But it is clear that the security arrangement at the airport needs to be improved. Security presence should be strengthened to prevent a recurrence.

It is intriguing that the invaders all got away. The invasion should be thoroughly investigated.

The security agencies should see this unprecedented attack as a dangerous sign that some bandits may be seeking new pastures, meaning that they could attack other airports in the country. Extra vigilance is necessary.

It is a new dimension to the country's security crisis, and should be addressed urgently and decisively. Bandits, or terrorists, must not be allowed to begin to imagine that they can operate anywhere and anyhow they like.

While public service is often perceived as an opportunity to serve the purpose of government as it relates to providing essential services to those being governed, there are those within the space that finds it as a viable avenue to leave enduring examples. A brief reflection on the history of public service in Nigeria is replete with individuals who brought on board raw character and distinguished themselves in the line of public duty. The names of Chief Jerome Udoji, renowned public servant of the "Udoji Award" fame; Simeon Adebo; Alilu Akilu; Joseph Imoukhuede, and other sterling examples heralded a golden era for public service in Nigeria.

In recent times, some reputable public servants emerged within the public service space who showed adequate commitment to institutional reforms viz-a-viz efficient service delivery. The likes of Ambassador Abu Obe, erstwhile Head of Service of the federation; Professor Tunji Olaopa, a retired permanent secretary and sound intellectual who left indelible footprints in calling national attention to reforms in the public sector; Dr. Sam Abah of the Bureau of Public Service Reforms (BPSR), and more.

Enter Mr. Sonny Echono. Suffice to say that the trajectory of the renowned public administrator is a testament to the convergence of personal character, administrative acumen and historical dynamics that makes Echono a doyen of public service in Nigeria. Born on December 16, 1962 in Otukpo, Benue State, Echono had his earliest education at the St. Mary's Primary School in Otukpo before proceeding to Jos, where he completed his primary and secondary education at St. Theresa's Primary School and St. Murumba's Secondary School respectively. Echono was the best graduating student of his set. He was later to enrol for his A-Level at Murtala College of Arts, Sciences and Technology in Makurdi. In 1980, Echono was admitted into the prestigious Ahmadu Bello University, Zaria to study Architecture and graduated with Master's degree in 1985.

Echono joined the Benue State Housing Agency upon completion of his National Youths Service in 1986 briefly before joining the federal civil service in 1987 where a sterling career spanning close to 35 years begun in earnest. Within this period, Echono served in various capacities in the Federal Ministry of Works and Housing including as Secretary, Implementation Committee on National Housing Policy-1991 to 1995; Secretary, Special projects Task Force, 1992-1995; Secretary, Committee on Lands and Housing, 1993-1995; Special Assistant to

Permanent Secretary, 1994-1999; head, Council Affairs and Parastatal, 2003/04; Secretary, Ministerial Tenders Board, 2004 - 2005.

When the idea of procurement reforms was revitalized within the public sector at the twilight of the President Jonathan administration, Echono's experience came handy as he was among the first civil servants assigned to the Budget Monitoring and Price Intelligence Unit, popularly known as Due Process Office in February 2015.

Not one to rest on his oars in his quest for personal development, Echono went on to acquire a Post Graduate Diploma in Management (PGDM) from University of Calabar in 2002; Mater of Business Administration (MBA) from Benue State University in 2004; Master of Science, Procurement Management from University of Turin in Italy in 2011.

His sound knowledge of the procurement process earned him top spots as Director of Procurement in several federal ministries including Defence, Water Resources, Environment, Agriculture and Power.

His elevation to the position of permanent secretary in the federal civil service in October 2014 was in recognition of his shining performances in

his earlier postings. Echono went on to serve in the ministries of Agriculture and Rural Development (2014-2015); Communications (2015-2017) and Education (2017-2022). In these capacities, the refined public servant brought the core aspect of his character to bear as he distinguished himself in service to fatherland.



Mr. Echono also contributed in no mean feat to the development of architecture in Nigeria. Beginning as secretary of the Admissions Committee in 1991, he rose through the professional ranks to be elected as president of the Nigerian Institute of Architects in November 2019, a position he judiciously manages till date.

This thoroughbred public servant attended several management courses at top notch institutions across the globe including the Oxford and Cambridge universities in the UK; the Japan Institute of Development Studies and at the reputable Harvard Business School in America.

Upon his retirement from civil service in January 2022, President Buhari, who obviously appreciates the Echono brand of distinction and integrity, picked him to be the Executive Secretary of the Tertiary Education Trust Fund (TETFUND). For a man who administered the behemoth called federal ministry of education with various agencies and parastatals including TETFUND, he understandably is adept with the requirement of his new assignment.

He hit the ground running upon his assumption of office by declaring that his dispensation would focus on curriculum delivery systems in schools, adding that this would make graduates from tertiary institutions more relevant not just in employability but in job creation. Information and Communications Technology (ICT) would also be accorded a right of place to improve curriculum development with focus on human infrastructure at TETFUND in this new dispensation.

"We have done so well in physical infrastructure and we will continue to do so but we also must focus on those we entrusted with the evaluation of our students. We must focus on the type of curriculum that is being taught and the delivery system," he declared upon taking duties from his predecessor.

As a funding agency, the role of TETFUND in the quality of tertiary education in Nigeria cannot be overemphasised. How the intervention funds would be judiciously utilized to achieve desired objectives at the face of dwindling revenues would be another testimony to the strength of character and unblemished antecedents of the new executive secretary. There is no doubt that Echono would justify the confidence reposed in him.

A consensus candidate will give PDP an edge, writes ZAYYAD I. MUHAMMAD



PDP AND CONSENSUS PRESIDENTIAL CANDIDATE

The 2023 presidential election presents to the Peoples Democratic Party (PDP) a golden opportunity to wrestle power from the ruling All Progressives Congress (APC). However, the greatest challenge facing the PDP is how to utilize this



opportunity seamlessly by presenting a candidate that can secure for the party, sufficient votes throughout the country. As of today, all indices indicate that the APC's presidential candidate may come from the southwest. Since 2015, APC's trump cards have been the north and the southwest. However, the north may be APC's biggest dilemma in 2023 - the party has to appease the north while striking a balance on Nigeria's complexities. This is where the PDP can take advantage if it plays its own cards very well. Former Senate President Bukola Saraki, Governor Aminu Tambuwal, and Governor Bala Mohammed, all presidential aspirants on the PDP platform, have kick-started a move for

the PDP to present a consensus candidate for the 2023 presidential elections. Saraki said the reason they were pushing for a consensus candidate was to reduce the likely rancor in the process of choosing the party's standard bearer. Apart from having a rancor-free process, a consensus candidate will give the PDP an opportunity to pull resources together for a common goal. Furthermore, the party will have ample time to campaign for the general elections; as it would

eliminate the long and tedious campaign for the primaries. The big question is, who is PDP's ideal consensus candidate among all the aspirants? The person should be someone who is well-known, have a network and connection, and is sellable across the country. The PDP may, as a matter of real politics, consider a one bloc vote. That is, the Buhari cult-like followers, who, as of now, have undecided votes. The PDP can win the vote of that bloc vote and combine it with its own traditional votes by presenting someone different from Buhari but acceptable to Buhari's cult-like followers. In addition, a consensus candidate should be someone who knows the Nigerian political terrain and is acceptable to the common people - someone who Nigerians see as capable of tackling the current problems in the country. If the PDP agrees to go for a consensus candidate, the party should do this based on certain logics. Firstly, the PDP should analyze the North and Southwest - two parts of the country with the highest number of voters- to define which of them will give the party some cutting-edge advantage. The party should then present a candidate that can bring the votes from that region. Secondly, as the APC is looking southwest, the PDP should analyze the entire south, and do its arithmetic with an open heart on just how to win the election. Thirdly, PDP's ideal consensus candidate should be chosen relative to the APC's likely presidential candidate. It should be someone from the PDP ranks who has the clout, the political structure, the war chest, and the human resources to face any candidate from the APC. An open discussion among the PDP presidential aspirants can produce good results for the consensus candidate. Though some of the aspirants will fizzle out from the race if the party does not use a zoning formula, because their aspirations are based on permutations that the ticket is zoned to a particular section of the country. Consensus is good for an opposition political party with an opportunity to get power. But some observers are of the view that a primary election will eliminate any hassle for the good candidate as he may be tied down with many demands from other aspirants and interests. If the call for a PDP consensus presidential candidate by Bukola Saraki, Tambuwal, and Bala Mohammed is without any ulterior motive, it will be a welcome and excellent idea for the PDP. Former Vice President Atiku Abubakar said all the presidential aspirants don't have issues with each other, once they sat down in a room, they will select the best candidate among themselves. Most political observers said Atiku made the statement because he is fully aware that, as of today, all the odds are in his favor- either consensus or primary election. ■

ADESEGUN OGUNDEJI argues that the establishment of the two new universities is desirable

LAGOS AND THE NEW UNIVERSITIES

On the 8th of February, 2022, the National Universities Commission (NUC) stamped the seal of authority on the establishment of two new specialized universities in Lagos State. The State House of Assembly had earlier passed a bill for the transmutation of the Lagos State Polytechnic, Ikorodu to the Lagos State University of Science and Technology (LASUST). Also contained in the bill was the transmutation of the State's two Colleges of Education - Adeniran Ogunsanya College of Education (AOCOED), Otto-Ijanikin and Michael Otedola College of Primary Education (MOCPED), Naforija, Epe - to the Lagos State University of Education (LASUED). The bill to establish the two new specialized universities was assented to by Governor Babajide Olusola Sanwo-Olu to give the process the needed legal backing. The establishment of these universities brings to three the number of state-owned universities in Lagos. The premier university of the state, the Lagos State University (LASU), was established in 1983 by the administration of the highly respected late Lateef Kayode Jakande (LKJ). Like it was speculated then, that the establishment of LASU and other state universities by the then five states controlled by the defunct Unity Party of Nigeria (UPN), except Oyo State, was a response to the perceived plot to slow down capacity development in region, tongues have also started wagging as to the real motive behind the creation of the new universities. To some, it is a needless exercise as there is still a lot to be done in the state's public primary and secondary schools as well as at LASU. Some even question the state's financial capacity to cope with the funding of the new citadels of learning. Others see it as a mere populist stunt to shore up the approval rating of the governor preparatory to a second-term bid. Such lines of thought are expected, considering the diversity of our society. Speaking at the NUC headquarters, Governor Sanwo-Olu cleared the air on the real intention of the government when he said that "the creation of the two universities is not about being ambitious, but about doing what is proper for the people of the state". The Executive Secretary of NUC, Professor Abubakar Rasheed corroborated the governor's view and also perfectly put the decision in proper perspective. He said: "We congratulate the governor on his efforts and initiative. We congratulate your team on the vision of moving Lagos State forward. We particularly congratulate you on your decision to invest wisely in higher education." Speaking further, the NUC boss said: "The Lagos State University of Science and Technology certainly would be a benefit to the position of Lagos as the hub of industries and technology in this country and West Africa. And if properly supported, this is a university that can help Lagos State's determination to transit into a knowledge economy. "Lagos can move ahead of others based on investment in education. I know that the economy of Lagos alone is the fifth largest in the entire African continent. The economy of Lagos alone is more than the economy of Ghana and Ivory Coast put together". The fear of what becomes of the academic pursuit of the students of the upgraded institutions was allayed when the Special Adviser to the Governor on Education, Mr. Tokunbo Wahab in response to recognition of the institutions said: "By the way of this recognition by the NUC, they can't admit students into subsisting structures as Polytechnics and Colleges of Education. That ends, but they will have to graduate the students that have been admitted before now". It is common knowledge that getting admission into tertiary institutions in Nigeria



has become a herculean task. The preference for university admission is very high amongst our youth population. The dichotomy between the Bachelor and Higher National Diploma (HND) degrees has not helped matters. Even, the directive of JAMB to admission seeking students to pick a University, Polytechnic and College of Education as preferred institutions in that order has not reversed the situation. Many school leavers have had to write JAMB severally as their parents could not afford private universities and the children are not prepared to settle for any certificate lesser than a university degree. The implication is that the Polytechnics and Colleges of Education with high students' carrying capacities have less learners on campus, while capital and recurrence expenditure continues to rise. Lagos is home to over 14 million youths. According to available data, in a previous admission exercise, only 3,500 out of the 36,000 qualified candidates that applied to LASU for admission that could be admitted. With the current spate of insecurity in the country, one does not need to be a soothsayer to state that idle youths portend a grave danger that could further aggravate the already tense security situation. Thus, the decision of the government on the new universities makes a lot of sense. First, because of the preference of the youths for university education. Second, it will help to produce the needed human capacities to drive the state, nay the country, in all facets of life. Third, it will greatly address the idle youth syndrome. Of importance is also the fact that the universities were established for different purposes. While LASU is a conventional university, the two new ones LASUST and LASUED specialize in science and technology and education respectively. Particularly, the new University of Science and Technology will boost entrepreneurship activities in the state, thereby further enhancing wealth creation. It would provide manpower for the economic development of the state and the country at large. Vocational and entrepreneurship skills development programmes will certainly help develop the potential of the youths to make them relevant in the 21st-century global digital economy and make them employers of labour. This will go a long way in addressing the issue of youth restiveness, crime reduction and other vices capable of undermining development efforts across the country. The new universities will, no doubt, reduce the pressure on Lagos State University, provide other alternatives to aspiring students, especially indigent students who cannot afford private institutions. ■

THE MURDER ON LAGOS BRT

Bamise Ayanwola deserves justice

The recent death in controversial circumstances of Ms Bamise Ayanwola, a promising young Nigerian woman who boarded a Lagos government BRT bus, is another sad reminder of the growing violent criminality across the country. According to reports, before her body was dumped, the young lady had been raped with some parts of her body taken away, presumably for ritual purposes. This tragedy speaks to so many issues: Collapse of security, the epidemic of ritual killings and the diminishing value of the sanctity of life. The fact that it happened on a government-owned public transport system makes it more egregious. While we commiserate with the family of the deceased, we call on the Lagos State government to get to the root of the murder, ensure justice for the deceased and put in place measures to ensure it does not happen again.

This murder is also significant because BRT buses are considered one of the safest public transportation options in the city. They were not previously associated with the “one chance” phenomenon in which robbers and ritual killers lure victims into vehicles for their nefarious activities. So this tragedy represents an escalation of worsening security and a tightening of the noose, metaphorically speaking, for residents in a transportation system characterised by inadequacies and risks. While the urgency with which the police and the Lagos government have taken up the case is a good signal, the initial steps have not inspired confidence. A video in which the driver of the bus confessed was followed by another one in which the same individual, spruced up, declared that the bus was hijacked. This has understandably raised public concerns about the impartiality of the Lagos State government on a



matter that requires nothing less than a rigorous and transparent investigation.

The Bus Rapid Transit system is supposed to be one of the cheapest and safest means of commuting within Lagos State. Unfortunately, the incident has thrown up the issue of public safety. If riding in a state-owned vehicle is deadly, which one is safe?

Unfortunately, the concerned authorities have not treated the tragedy with the urgency and seriousness it deserves. Elder brother to the deceased, James Joel who spoke on behalf of the family, said last week that it took 10 days before the Police could disclose that the body had been found, whereas it was found the same day she boarded the bus. The Lagos State government has also been lackadaisical, raising question as to whether the murder

would not have attracted more attention if the family of the victim had been people of high status in the society. But this is one case on which Nigerians are united: Bamise Ayanwola deserves justice.

Going forward, the driver must be tried expeditiously so that justice may be served and the fears of the public allayed. The Lagos State government must also, as a matter of urgency ensure that henceforth, all BRT employees are made to go through rigorous background checks, and their addresses and their sponsors verified. Also, CCTV cameras must be installed in all buses to monitor the drivers, and commuters. Lastly, all the BRT buses could be fitted with alarm systems, which a passenger could press when in danger. The alarm system should be remotely connected to the BRT terminus (a kind of command and coordinating centre) such that any alarm raised from any BRT bus could be seen and the location identified for immediate response.

Why should an elderly woman be so cruel as to request for the eyeball of an innocent person for the preparation of the medicine?”

These are indeed very thoughtful questions and valid concerns. Unfortunately, these sentiments have not succeeded in weakening the grip of the primitive beliefs on the minds of Nigerians, nay Africans. The fact that these horrific abuses continue illustrates the potency of these irrational beliefs and their stranglehold on the minds of people across the region. This incident further shows that abuses linked to ritual beliefs know no faith; they are not restricted to people from a particular region or religion.

The occurrence of ritual attacks is a stark demonstration of moral and edu-

cational failure. As Mohammed Zagga states: “This incident also highlights the vulnerability of the almajiri. The life of the almajiri is a life of uncertainty and danger. The almajiri is at the risk of being recruited by terrorists or being killed by wicked people looking for human body parts for spiritual purposes. Allowing your child to become an almajiri in the street is grossly irresponsible. It’s criminal to produce children you can’t provide for and abandon them into the world to fend for themselves”.

AfAW enjoins all Africans to advocate against witchcraft accusation and witch persecution in their communities. Africans should understand that there is no medicine that can make any human being to disappear and reappear. Such notions are baseless and mistaken ideas of the world rooted in ignorance and fear. Africans must realize that no ritual sacrifice of human or animal can change the fortune of anyone for good or ill. They should resist the manipulation and exploitation by charlatans parading as medicine men and women. Africans should abandon these absurd and nonsensical ideas and beliefs that motivate them to commit atrocities. They should endeavor to draw attention to all cases of abuses linked to witchcraft or ritual beliefs in their communities. Meanwhile, AfAW is working to provide some support for the child victim. Between Kaduna Airport Security Breach and Nigeria’s Safety Rating

For the second time in two years there were security breaches around the Kaduna airport despite being in the centre of Nigerian security forces. **Chinedu Eze** writes that the breach may call for a review of Nigeria’s safety rating by international aviation agencies

In march 2021 suspected bandits stormed the staff quarters of the Federal Airports Authority of Nigeria (FAAN) at the Kaduna International Airport and abducted some families and one year later, gunmen attacked an area very close to the airport runway and a security operative with the Nigerian Airspace Management Agency (NAMA) was shot dead.

Inside source informed THISDAY that NAMA engineers were working on the Ominidirectional Radio Range (VOR) equipment, surrounded by security operatives when gunshots tore the air and forced everybody to scamper for safety. Unfortunately, bullet hit the ill-fated security official of the agency and he died. The control tower directed Azman Air flight that was about to take off to Lagos to abort it to ensure that the aircraft was not attacked on takeoff.

Azman Air later explained in a statement that the Lagos-bound flight, Azman Air aircraft, “5N-HAI touched down at the Kaduna airport around 12:36 pm and the boarding of Lagos bound passengers was completed around 1:04 pm during which the cockpit crew requested for permission to depart.”

“The Control Tower offered a safety advice to hold on departure due to security threats in a village close to the airport. This delayed our departure by 44 minutes after which the control tower cleared the crew to proceed accordingly. The aircraft was stamped airborne at exactly 1:48 pm.”

Two days after the incident, Azman Air issued another statement saying that it would stop operations to Kaduna.

According to the statement, “The management of Azman Air will like to inform the general public that we will be halting our operations into Kaduna airport for few days. We understand the security situation around the airport has ben handled and normalcy has been restored accordingly, but it is imperative for the management to re-evaluate its operational procedures into the airport to ensure maximum safety of equipment, staff and passengers are fully guaranteed.”

SAFETY RATING

Industry stakeholders said the security breach incident in Kaduna and other related incidents might draw the attention of the International Civil Aviation Organisation (ICAO), the International Air Transport Association Operational Security Audit (IOSA), which audits Nigerian carriers’ safety status, insurance companies, Transport Security Administration of the United States (TSA) and the US Federal Aviation Administration (FAA), to review the security situation in Nigeria in their dealings with the country. Insurance premium might rise due to high country risk.

The CEO of Centurion Aviation Security and Safety Consult, Nigeria and former Commandant of the Murtala Muhammed International Airport, Lagos, Group Captain John Ojikutu (rtd) expressed the worry that these international aviation agencies would be monitoring what is happening in Nigeria and urged that the Nigerian Civil Aviation Authority (NCAA) should call for review of the National Civil Aviation Security Programme (NCASP).

“I am certain that ICAO and the TSA are watching the trend in the country but I expect the NCAA to either call for the review of the National Civil Aviation Security Programme or send out Advisory Letters to the various operators, airlines, airports and the allied services to enhance their various services,” Ojikutu said.

He advocated for a type of security programme that would be able to meet the security challenges of the

time, noting that NCAA would rely on the national intelligence estimates to be able to give such directives.

“The question that will be going through any discerning minds now is: do we really have a national intelligence estimates or who is expected or responsible for providing the national intelligence? Who will coordinate the airport security among the multiple government security agencies working in the airports? The NCASP said it is the Federal Airports Authority of Nigeria (FAAN). Can FAAN designate security responsibility to any of the government security agencies in the airports,” Ojikutu said.

Ojikutu insisted that aviation security remained a function of national security and attacks on any target in aviation is an attack on the state.

“My knowledge in aviation security tells me that aviation security is a function of national security and attacks on any target in aviation is an attack on the state. What am saying is that the frequencies on the attacks are getting on roads and railway could be a rehearsal for major attacks on aviation, especially within the Kaduna state axis. Have you taken a second thought on the man that was killed at Kaduna airport, at the site of the VOR? Could the VOR be the target or why would the bandits face that direction and not the terminal building or the tower? What do the bandits know about the VOR or could there be an insider from the aviation community? Many questions needed to be asked for an intelligent answer to determine a preemptive action or solution for a repeat in any of the airports,” he said.

Ojikutu stated that Nigeria has failed to do what it used to do before it obtained the Category One Safety Status certification from the FAA.

“It is not that scary; we have failed to regularly do what we were doing before we got the FAA certification in Aviation Security (AVSEC) in 2009. Can we talk about this? This is one of the areas my proposal on aviation security for networking the government security agencies working at our airports are expected to address. The last time we did it, like I said, was 2010 following the (Umar Farouk) Abdumutallab failed attempt (to bomb US airliner on December 25, 2009),” Ojikutu added.

REVIEWING SECURITY APPARATUS

The General Manager, Public Affairs, NCAA, Sam Adurogboye, told THISDAY that the security committee in the aviation industry would review the incident and decide on the next line of action, noting that insecurity is a global phenomenon and therefore a global challenge. On whether the international aviation agencies like ICAO, FAA and others would review their rating of Nigeria, he explained that Aviation Security (AVSEC) comes under different assessment, adding that security issues are national issues and all ought to get involved, from the aviation industry to the federal, the state, local government and the communities.

“Airport security committee meet regularly and it is presided over by the Director General of NCAA. They will review the system. Fighting insecurity requires collective effort. Depending on their decision, the airport can be isolated pending when security is restored,” he said.

Adurogboye also assured that what happened would not affect Nigeria’s rating in international aviation because the incident did not happen at any of the major airports where international carriers operate.

“What happened will not affect our rating. TSA is interested in major gateways. ICAO certification covers major gateways and everything is being done to

ensure that security is restored at the place,” he said.

TASK FORCE

The House of Representatives on Tuesday, summoned the heads of Security Agencies, Aviation Minister, Captain Hadi Sirika and the heads of aviation agencies to a meeting on Wednesday with the House leadership and the Chairmen of relevant committees of the House of Representatives on the recent security breach at the Kaduna International Airport.

The House also urged the Federal Government to through the office of the National Security Adviser, (NSA), the Chief of Defence Staff, the Inspector-General of Police and heads of other security agencies to holistically intervene by setting up special security task force (SSTF) on airports across the country.

The House said it took the decisions after adopting the motion of Urgent National Importance, titled, “Urgent Need for The Federal Government Investigate The Recent Banditry Attack at Kaduna International Airport And Reinforce Security Surveillance and Personnel in All The Nigerian Airports sponsored by the Chairman of House of Representatives Committee on Aviation, Hon. Nnolim Nnaji.

The House further directed Federal Ministry of aviation, Federal Airports of Nigeria, (FAAN) security and other security agencies to come up with a more proactive measure in securing the airports, including providing modern security surveillance equipment on the perimeter fences in all airports.

Presenting the motion earlier, Nnaji told the colleagues that about a year ago, armed bandits attacked the staff quarters of the Federal Airports Authority of Nigeria at the same Kaduna airport and abducted about twelve persons.

He noted that on March 25, 2022 another horrific

armed banditry attack was unleashed at the airport resulting in the death of a security guard of the Nigerian Airspace Management Agency (NAMA).

Nnaji acknowledged the swift intervention of the military and other security agencies who confronted the heavily armed bandits numbering over a hundred, adding that their gallantry saved the situation.

The Aviation Committee Chairman said he was concerned that the attack on Kaduna airport might escalate to other airports if urgent measures were not taken to safeguard the nation’s aerodromes.

INTELLIGENCE GATHERING

The two incidents at Kaduna airport last year and this year were surprise attacks, which means that the security operatives at the airports did not envisage them. There are suggestions that security operatives at the airports must have to collaborate with the host community to gather intelligence and possible pre-empt a possible attack and nip it before execution.

Group Captain Ojikutu noted that the first line of any defence layers against insecurity including those considered as aviation insecurity is intelligence.

“Secondly, at MMA in particular with over 23km perimeter fences and where these fences are used as part of public and private buildings or fences, there is need to build a secondary fences as security fences to meet the basic requirements of Document 8973 (from ICAO Security annex) that demands six meter distances from the perimeter fences to any public and private buildings, infrastructure and roads outside the airport,” he said.

kind of rise in line of demand and a very low line of production with a bump up to 650,000 barrels a day.

“But that’s nowhere close. So, in order to meet that demand, you will not only have to have Dangote now, you will have to have another Dangote every five years or so, just to keep up. And so, it’s not going to happen, I fear.

“The truth is, even if you have a new Dangote every five years, you will still have to pay the market price. So, that wouldn’t necessarily solve the problem.”

He, however, pointed out that the Dangote Refinery would have some positive impact on the nation’s economy, saying a significant amount of foreign

exchange would be saved as freight costs since the products are being refined in Nigeria.

“The impact of Dangote - it’s because of the freight advantage. You have production right here in Lagos. So, the crude doesn’t have to be sent to Europe, refined and brought back. All of that freight saving is made. And what that will do is, it will reduce the marginal price that others have to compete with,” he said.

He said when the refinery comes on stream, Dangote could become the price-setting refinery for the country. Asked about what would be the actual pump price of petrol if subsidy was removed, the Argus vice president said the

pump price should reflect the market price of the time.

He maintained that the market would determine the price and reward those who are efficient in supplying the market, whether through domestic refinery like Dangote or through an importer who has got a particularly efficient way of doing things.

He said currently, based on the prevailing exchange rate, the pump price of petrol should be somewhere above N400 per litre.

Gooder pointed out the dangers in imposing such high price at this time in the country, stating that doing that would trigger some shock to consumers.

Of CBN Interventions and Enthronement of Stable Foreign Exchange Regime

With volatility a major dynamic in economic management, **Eromosele Abiodun, James Emejo and Nume Ekeghe** examine the various initiatives by the Central Bank of Nigeria (CBN) to ensure foreign exchange stability against the backdrop of a vulnerable mono-economy and dwindling value of the local currency

The value of the Nigerian currency, the naira, has over the years declined on account of the country's peculiar economic structure and management template, making the exchange rate one of the most watched macroeconomic indices in the country and a recurrent theme in political commentaries.

The naira exchange rate has not only assumed greater prominence in macroeconomic adjustment, it has also become very well-known to stakeholders, including market women and men, who use it as a reference point in the pricing of goods and services.

However, this has not always been the case as the value of the naira was not one for social discuss when the naira was trading at a stronger value than the United States dollar. As at 1985, the average value of the naira to the dollar was 89 kobo to \$1. People always refer to the 1970s and 1980s when the naira was "stronger" than the US Dollar, or at least, were at par.

As at last weekend, the naira traded at between N580 and N585 to the dollar, making many who were witnesses to the period of a stronger naira crave for such a time again and question what the country is getting wrong in terms of its exchange rate and the value of the local currency.

THE INSATIABLE DEMAND FOR DOLLARS

But the real question to ask is: what was the demand and supply of US Dollar at that time, and what is it today? In the 1980s and 1990s, the number of Nigerians studying abroad, requiring foreign exchange for school fees and upkeep was negligible.

According to data from the UNESCO's Institute of Statistics, the number of Nigerian students abroad increased from less than 15,000 in 1998 to over 71,000 in 2015. By 2018, this number had risen to 96,702 students, according to the World Bank. Compared to the 1980s when those studying abroad were mainly for a degree or an advanced degree.

More Nigerians are sending off their children out of the country for primary and secondary education including tertiary education. In light of this, it is no wonder that foreign education has cost the country a whopping sum of \$28.65 billion between 2010 and 2020, according to the CBN's publicly available Balance of Payments Statistics.

Asides foreign education that was being paid off from the country's reserves, medical tourism has also been calling on the reserves of the country. According to the Nigerian Sovereign Investment Authority (NSIA), Nigerians spend over \$1 billion annually on medical treatment abroad.

This fact is corroborated by a review of the Central Bank's balance of payment data, which indicate that Nigerians have spent \$11.01 billion on healthcare related services over the past 10 years. Over the last 10 years, therefore, foreign exchange demand specifically for education and healthcare has cost the country almost \$40 billion.

This amount is more than the total current foreign exchange reserves of the country, which stands at \$39.32 billion. The foreign exchange demand occasioned by education and health is besides the business and personal travel allowance that also increases the level of demand. Data from the CBN showed that in the nine-month period between January and September 2019, the CBN sold \$9.01 billion to Nigerians for personal foreign travels.

These are however not the only demands that occasioned the devaluation of the naira. Whilst it has not always been so, Nigerians have overtime developed a taste for foreign products, thus increasing the import bill of the country.

In 1980, Nigeria's total imports was \$16.65 billion per annum. By 2014, the country's annual import bill had risen astronomically to \$67.05 billion, though it has gradually fallen to \$54.71 billion as of last year. Similarly, in 1980, food imports cost us \$2.63 billion, as Nigerians were mostly eating what was produced in the country. But as of 2011, food imports had skyrocketed to \$18.91 billion, though it has fallen to \$14.84 billion as of 2019.

In 1980, over 75 percent of the cars driven in Nigeria were made within the country by either Volkswagen in Lagos, Peugeot in Kaduna, or

some other automobile companies. Today, over 99 percent of the cars on Nigerian roads are imported. Also, in 1980, most of the clothes were from Nigerian textile mills in Funtua, Asaba, Kano, Lagos, or other numerous towns and cities. Today, almost all the clothes are from imported fabrics.

A DWINDLING FX SUPPLY

The challenge of the naira is however not only on the demand side as supply has over the years been monopolistic in nature, a source that has over the years proved to be on the decline, unstable and unreliable in times of crisis.

While the country in times past have relied on both oil and non-oil exports, the focus has in recent times been on oil exports which contributes more than 90 per cent of the country's foreign currency earnings. In times of global crisis the impact has always been felt on the crisis.

The last six years have witnessed economic turbulence in the country, marked by two rounds of recession, the debilitating economic effects of COVID-19, and the negative effects of downturns in the global oil market.

The governor of the CBN, Godwin Emeifele, last week at a seminar for finance journalists last week had noted that the recent COVID-19 pandemic impacted economies, and disrupted business activities globally.

"Expectedly, Nigeria like most commodity-dependent countries, was not spared the

deleterious impact of the pandemic, given our dependence on crude oil export as a major source of revenue and foreign exchange.

"These adverse conditions eventually plunged the economy into a recession for the first time in about a quarter of a century. The media space was suffused with news about the depletion of the country's foreign reserves and the depreciation of the Naira. That tough period called for bold and innovative decisions to be taken and we did not shy away from doing what we considered to be in the best interest of our beloved country.

"For us, the CBN was to act as a financial catalyst by targeting strategic sectors that could create jobs on a mass scale and reduce the country's import bills. To solve the immediate and long-term economic challenges of the country, we needed to create an enabling environment with appropriate incentives to empower innovative entrepreneurs to drive growth and development," Emeifele said.

FIXING THE DIVIDE

The Central Bank has implemented various strategies, policies and measures to enhance liquidity in the foreign exchange market and ensure the stability of the exchange rate. It has also implemented various development finance interventions, which have implications for foreign exchange supply and exchange rate stability.

The measures taken are to maintain stability in the foreign exchange market and reduce foreign exchange demand pressure, enhance inflow of foreign exchange and diversification, boost production, non-oil exports, forex supply and economic diversification and provide ancillary measures/interventions in support of foreign exchange management.

Over the last several years, thousands of men have relocated their families abroad but continued to work here in Nigeria. Whilst these men are here earning naira, their major expenses are in dollars for family upkeep, mortgages, car loans, and the likes.

This means that thousands more people chasing dollars every day, every week, every month. Without going into the reasons for their decisions but imagine that they were reversed and their families were here in Nigeria, the naira would be significantly strengthened.

To boost liquidity and promote inflows to the domestic foreign exchange market, the apex bank, in 2019, licensed additional International Money Transfer Operators (IMTOs). This was to engender healthy competition within the IMTO space, aimed at encouraging Nigerians in diaspora to send remittances home and strengthen the sale of foreign exchange cash to BDCs.

The CBN also amended the procedures for receipt of Diaspora remittances on November 30, 2020. To this end, a directive was issued to all International Money Transfer Operators (IMTOs) to pay the beneficiaries of diaspora remittances in foreign currency (US dollars), through designated banks of their choice. The recipients of remittances were also given the option of receiving funds either in cash or paid to their ordinary domiciliary account.

Naira 4-Dollar scheme was also introduced to encourage Diaspora remittance inflows through the formal channel. The scheme entails giving N5 bonus for every one dollar remitted to serve as an incentive for both senders and recipients of money transfers.

The objective is to enhance the supply of foreign exchange and hence, ease pressure in the foreign exchange market. The scheme, which started on March 5, 2021, with an initial terminal date of May 8, 2021, has been extended indefinitely.

As part of efforts to boost Production, Non-oil exports, Forex Supply and Economic Diversification, the CBN had in line with its developmental mandate, initiated several developmental finance intervention programmes targeted at boosting non-oil exports to diversify the economy, increase accretion to external reserves, and create jobs.

It introduced Non-Oil Export Stimulation Facility (NESF) to increase access by export-oriented firms to low-interest financing towards diversifying the revenue base of the economy and expedite the growth and development of the non-oil export sector. The Facility is intended to redress the declining export financing and reposition the sector to increase its contribution to economic development.

It also introduced 100 for 100 Policy on Production and Productivity (100 for 100 PPP) which is to catalyse and transform the productive base of Nigeria's economy by stimulating credit to sectors with potential for growth and job creation. The core objective of the initiative is to reduce the country's over dependence on import for food and raw materials. Cumulatively, the initiative has financed 28 projects in agriculture, manufacturing, and healthcare sectors with about N28.02 billion.

More recently it introduced the RT200 FX Programme, which is Race to \$200 billion in FX Repatriation. It consists of a set of policies, plans and programmes for non-oil exports promotion that will enable the country to attain the lofty goal of \$200 billion in foreign exchange repatriation, exclusively from non-oil exports, over the next three to five years. Specifically, it seeks to reduce the exposure of the country to volatile sources of foreign exchange and to earn more stable and sustainable inflows of foreign exchange.

Getting these policies to work whilst reducing the demand for foreign exchange in the country as well as the reliance on oil foreign earnings will further improve the value of the naira.

Bridging Infrastructure Deficit with Pension Fund Investment

The recent Pension Sector Forum organised by FSS2020 Secretariat witnessed experts across various industries and regulatory environments, sharing their wealth of experience and knowledge for the development of the Nigerian pension industry. **Ayodeji Ake** reports

As part of the campaign to tackle infrastructure deficit with pension funds, the FSS2020 Secretariat organised the Pension Sector 2022 Q1 Forum tagged: ‘Unlocking the Potential of Pension Fund Investment in Nigeria’. The forum provided stakeholders the opportunity to identify and discuss critical issues and prospects of pension fund investment in Nigeria.

One of the select participants and real estate expert, Mr. Olaide Agboola, who is the Chief Executive Officer, Purple, pointed out how to open doors of opportunities in the real estate industry by supporting the industry with pension funds and attracting investors to the sector and watch their money grow with transparency and accountability.

“I’m coming to the table with the practical side of the equation being a practitioner within the real estate and infrastructure space in Nigeria. Take an example out of South Africa of a company called Grit Real Estate Income Plc; they are listed on the London Stock Exchange, with dual listing on the Stock Exchange of Mauritius and they are a South African entity. Grit is a REICO, which has the benefit of REITS; it’s a mixed platform. Of course, it was home grown and emanated out of South Africa from a development to the position where it is today, where it is acquiring assets and developing new ones as it goes along. It was actually promoted and supported by the South African Pension Fund industry to build and develop assets into positions, which then made them list on the Sock Exchange of Mauritius and dual list into the London Stock Exchange. Today, their Gross Asset Value is \$900 million which is equivalent to about half a trillion naira, which is also about four per cent of the N13 trillion of pension industry war chest that we are all talking about here. And that’s just a singular real estate platform out of South Africa.

“If you look at it from that context, you will see that the destination is still very far away in terms of the size of the pension fund industry and also the size of the infrastructure and real estate space. This implies that there is a level of flexibility, not relaxation of roles, but in terms of supporting the progress in achieving a destination and a purpose, and the purpose is making impact while ensuring that safety is paramount. We need to start from a mixed fund perspective before we move into the specialised perspective because

those aspects have to be developed, but somebody has to take the risk and the initial frontline to be able to put those assets in space before we can start talking about individual assets.

“Pensions should be used to support products and platforms, which will help them grow into world scales. By then we can start discussing edge cases within the PFA portfolio. The only way to benchmark yourself successfully is also to begin to have dollar-denominated assets within that portfolio. I believe that there should be a level of flexibility and understanding because economies are cyclical and allow portfolio or investment managers and other platforms to be able to take positions within different jurisdictions to edge their positions.

“Do we you the right product that makes the risk return profile? A risk return profile is a function of yield. Where you have an interest or coupon range regime on five, 10 years’ instrument even around 13 per cent and asking for strictly income generating assets, implies that we should be able to buy an asset at 15 or 16 per cent so that I still have a good spread while delivering returns on a fixed security to the Pension Fund Space. And that is a bit of the challenge because the yield on acquisition of the real estate within the space is about 9, 10 per cent, then how do you acquire assets that are so low and deliver at 13,14 or 15 per cent to the market when you use your guarantee? This is a practical perspective. The only way that could happen within a REICO structure is to have a development asset portfolio. You have to balance out the portfolio.

“It is only when there is balance within the portfolio, then we can start discussing about: dedicated REICO, supermarket, hospital rates etc. The pension talks about rate but doesn’t talk about the REICOs and the Finance Act has obviously made it more enticing and interesting for institutions like us to tap into, which means we would have to be treated like a special company by the PFA and not under the collective investment scheme guidelines of the PFA investment guidelines but more under the corporate side of the equation which means which we need to have some pre-qualifications which we are doing and we have positioned ourselves to do,” Agboola said.

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EXPENSES VARIATION, ADDITIONAL FACILITIES MAY PUSH COST OF 4 INTERNATIONAL TERMINALS TO \$2BN

that the new airport terminals built at the cost of \$600 million (N2.16 billion in 2018) are inadequate for targeted passenger traffic and lacked essential facilities.

The report of the studies made available to THISDAY, disclosed that to provide the infrastructures that are lacking in the terminals, government has to deploy over \$500 million.

This is in addition to the funds needed to destroy and relocate fire service in Abuja and Lagos airports, the control tower, reinforcement of power supply and others.

Details of the report disclosed that adequate feasibility study was not carried out before locating the terminals at the area of the Abuja and Lagos airports where the facilities obstructed the fire service and the control tower respectively.

The studies also revealed that essential facilities that were absent in the new terminals include landside link, which ought to link the new terminal to the old, drop off canopy, access roads, apron and taxiway, water treatment upgrade and power improvement equipment.

Reacting to the studies by the consultants in 2018, the Minister of Aviation, Senator Hadi Sirika, regretted the additional funds that

would be deployed to make the projects fully functional.

Sirika explained that the planning of the project did not envisage that the building would lead to additional works, power and water supply, adding that it was also discovered that the building would block both the control and fire towers which would require relocation, so additional work was required to link it with the existing terminal as well as expanding the apron to accommodate bigger airplanes.

“The contractor has told us some of the challenges he has been facing regarding some of the components of work and some additional works required for this project to be put into use. Unfortunately, some of these components are complex which would delay this job and some of them are from the foundation like that of the sewer and water. There is also the problem of the control tower blocking the access into the terminal apron and also the inadequate nature of the apron itself,” Sirika said.

THISDAY learnt that some facilities have been installed so far in Abuja, however, the fire service and the control tower are yet to be relocated and that explained why the avio

bridges on the runway side of the terminal are yet to be put to use.

Also in Lagos, Accident Investigation Building (AIB) that has been demolished and also Dominion hangar and EAN (Evergreen) hangar have to be relocated before the ramp would be expanded to create enough space for maneuverability of large body aircraft to the apron of the new terminal.

But informed source from the Federal Airports Authority of Nigeria (FAAN) told THISDAY that the fund already expended was yet to hit \$1 billion, although there are a lot of things that would be done that would call for more funds.

“The Chinese were asked to add \$150 million to the project. The money is not yet up to a billion dollars, but the major challenge is that the federal government is not paying its counterpart funds,” the source told THISDAY.

In 2013 Nigeria obtained \$500 million loan from the Chinese Exim Bank with additional counterpart funding of \$100 million to build four terminals at the four major airports in the country, including the airports in Lagos, Abuja, Port Harcourt and Kano.

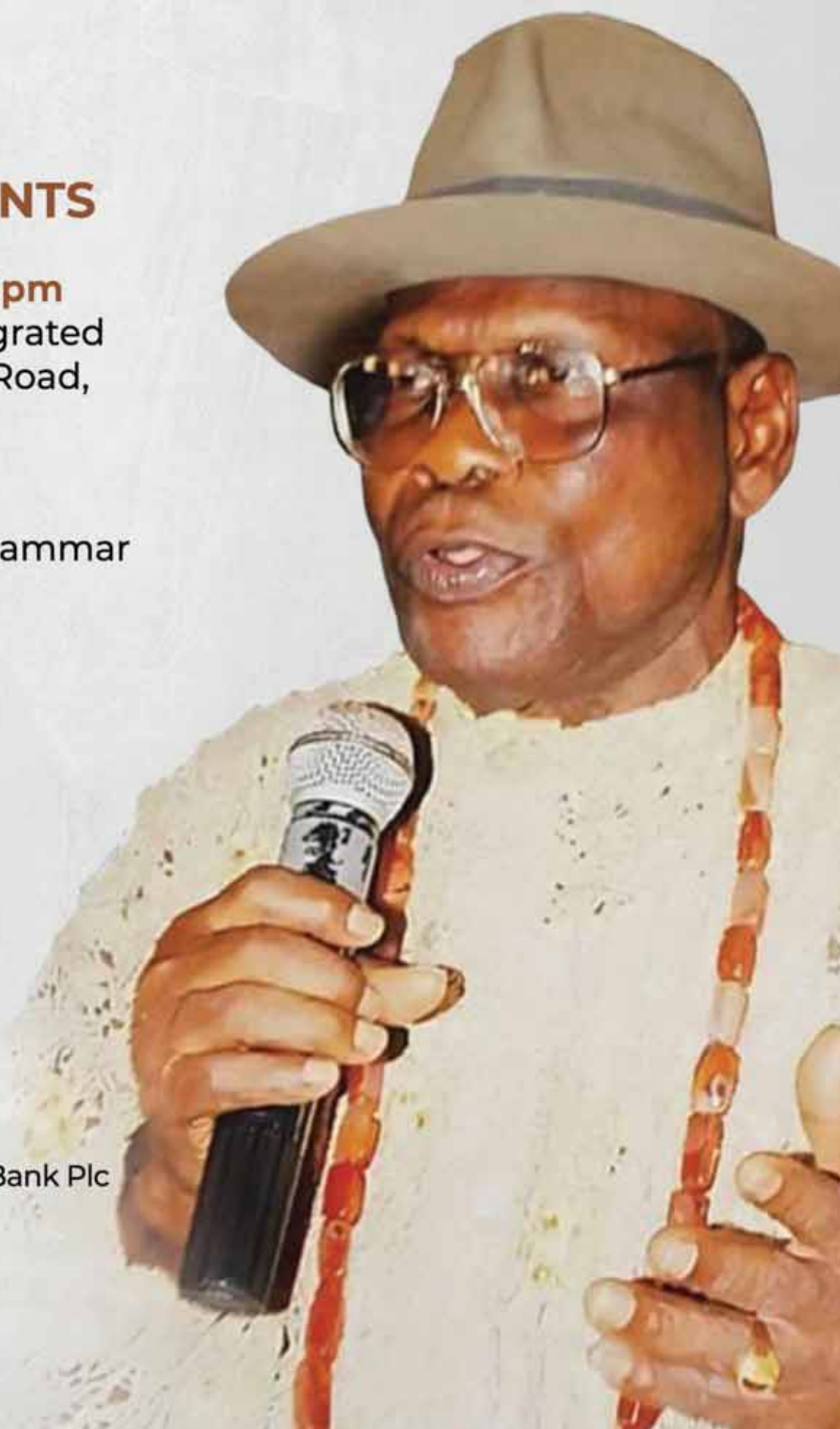

So, a core part of that is also IT continuity management because as businesses are going digital, there is a need to also ensure that whatever you're putting on that platform can last.

How did you find yourself in this field?
As a curious mind, I had interest in a lot of things. How I got here is not common knowledge. After my youth service, it started off as me just looking for a quick job that could help me save to be able to do other personal ambitions that I had. I got an opportunity to work with Guarantee Trust Bank in marketing back in the days. After two years in marketing, I got married, I stayed at Kaduna but my husband stays here in Lagos. I wanted to challenge myself to do something different, so in the bank there, we go through a very elaborate three month training school and one of the topics that was very difficult for me in training school was on trading. Every time my customers wanted to buy, I will always call one of my colleagues to help me explain to the customer. After, there was an opportunity to work in risk management in that area, so for me, it was a way to challenge myself. That's how I got into financial risk management. I started with interest risk management and overtime as I got my knowledge built, I was always curious to learn something new. I decided to get to work very early and sit with my older colleagues and have them to teach me. I will do their report and mine at the same time for teaching me as least I can pay them back with that.

By the time I was done in financial risk, I just found something new everyday and I loved the challenge. I was then deployed to credit risk in the bank which is also a very interesting area as it is detailed and thorough and has to do with lending and documentation. By the time I was doing that for a while, I started seeing myself like I don't want to remain in a certain area of section, I wanted to have a holistic view so I sought for an opportunity to move to Operational Risk where I didn't go to learn Operational Risk, fundamental risk, business continuity and that was how I digressed. After that you will always want to have a new and bigger challenge so I got an opportunity to work with AXA Mansard in a role that served as a leadership middle management role. I took that and I left banking. Insurance is also interesting and a bit more challenging and can be very complex. Everyday you're dealing with something dynamic and new.

How many years did you work with GTB?
I spent about a little less than 10 years in GTB and I have been in Axa Mansard for about six and the half years.

How so you manage to talk to your subordinates who go to the field to market AXA Mansard to the people. How are they able to convince people to put in their funds for their health insurance?
I think actually with health insurance, a lot of people feel when you talk to client and when it comes to insurance, there is a mindset that I am not going to consume it. So take my card insurance for example, I pay my premium and I don't have an accident, I am not likely to consume it but with health insurance on the other hand, it is actually easier to sell because people are more likely to consume it. People find it much more relevant and important because it pertains to your own health or your loved ones. I find that when it comes to the health insurance,

people are much more open to it actually than other areas of insurance. I think one of the challenge is the final power to pay a high premium but today where you can digitalise payment so that people can pay in installment, that also helps.

Most Nigerians are oblivious towards anything insurance. What do you think is the way out?
I think it is not just about awareness, I think we can't take away from the many other challenges Nigerians are faced with. I have customers sometimes who wants to buy a policy, they believe that your insurance product can help them, but they also have other pressing issues. It is also creating channels of convenient. We are moving to an era where customers can also pay their premium as they earn their salary monthly instead of as against yearly that is the norm. Should we say when things change, we got to also change. The whole objective of risk management is so that you come out with better outcomes. As the macro economy and other factors that drive our economy have deteriorated over time, if you want to maintain the same level of outcome as you had in those years, then you have also got to be doing

a lots more in managing the deteriorating risk and by virtue of that amplifies the whole thing.

What method do you get customers feedback?
Customers should be given multiple channels to get feedbacks. If a customer makes a complaint on a product and they are not happy about certain things after they bought the product, now for me that could be a reputational risk because depending on how things go, it could be misconstrued to that customer. So, the concept of mis-selling but even for business growth as well that is also a risk because that means that this customer isn't going to come back. For me, it will be to listen to the customer and listening was actually where I got to understand that in the process of buying the product, certain details were not clarified and of course apologising to the customer and rectifying that but then going back end in bringing different people to come and resolve a problem and at the end of the day we found out that we need to go back to the other side which is the digital product and make some changes on the back end so that the customer can see the changes. Customer feedback helps you to improve the business.

Are you managing the risk for the company

or the client?
Both.

Whose side do you take when at the cross road?
You have to balance it. A lot of time in my role, it is usually not between the devil and the blue deep sea, it always has to come with compromises. In my role, one of the things I have enjoyed overtime is working with people to collaborate but sometimes also having to influence as well and that comes with a lot of conversations and to see the other persons point of view and also getting them to see your own point of view in an amiable manner.

Would you advise young and up coming to get on this career?
Yes, because I really enjoy what I do.

What inspires you?
Knowing that everyday I am going to meet something better. Over the years, I have definitely come to the realisation that I don't like routine, so for me I have found fulfillment in this role as a Risk Manager.

What tactics would you advise up and coming risk managers?
I would say first, curiosity. A curious person will enjoy being here, if you are inquisitive, analytical thinker and explorer then you are on the right track.

Have you ever felt like because I am a woman this is happening. Have you ever been discriminated?
Honestly, in terms of being able to do my work, No. I am not someone who back down easily so I think in that regard, I have not had the feeling. I would probably be interested in why you're not listening to me. There were no moments I felt that way.

What are some of your favourite moments and your motivating factor?
I love the challenge of brainstorming, just looking at a problem and being a problem solver. Sometimes, I find out that the reason a person isn't able to find a solution is actually because they are not looking at the holistic picture. So, it is not working because it is not dependent solely on you and that for me is always interesting.

Another thing that motivates me is seeing the continuous improvement that comes with that process because the risk management process is to first of all identify the risk and analyse it, then mitigate it. At the end of the day what you get is a much more an improved experience.

How do you relax?
I love to read. I grew up around books from historical literature to fiction and non-fiction. I find it relaxing to research too. I can spend hours on Wikipedia.

In addition, your task is very tedious, how do you manage family life in your work?
For me, support is very key and not to hype my husband, he is very supportive. On my own part, I try to find the quality of time. Over the years I learnt how to do things differently. The major thing is really having that support because on some days you don't feel like going on but having someone who is really rooting for you helps.

What other passion would you have loved?
I think it would be teaching. I imagine I might still go and do that. There is a certain sense of satisfaction I get knowing that you can see how impactful your teaching was. For instance, when I point out certain things, I feel joy when the person never repeats the mistake again.

Female Artists Affirm Resilience in New Show at Affinity Art Gallery

In Lagos, five female artists namely Donna Duke, Nene Mahlangu, Roanna Tella, Buqaqawuli Nobakada and Tomilola Olumide worked their paints around the exhibition theme "I AM ... and Nothing Else" without brushing past the fundamental issues of identity, femininity, submissiveness and freedom. **Yinka Olatunbosun** reports

Echoes of cultural norms that were harmful to African women could be heard through the voices of five visionary female artists who collectively showcase their paintings at the Affinity Art Gallery, Victoria Island Lagos. Across generations, women have confronted situations that jeopardise their happiness, freedom or even question their identity. For instance, women are made to dread getting older instead of cherishing it as a blessing. Reinforced by religion and culture, women are taught to be submissive- at the risk of sheer servitude, loss of freedom and right to self-determinism.

To create awareness on these issues and celebrate the International Women's Month, Affinity Art Gallery hosts the exhibition of works of five female artists on the theme "I AM ... and Nothing Else." The show which opened on March 20 revolves around the themes of healing, identity, community, wholeness, and femininity using a variety of materials. Curated by Moni Aisida, the exhibition knits individual artists' perspectives with female storytelling inspired by one of the works of the author, poet and

psychoanalyst, Clarissa Pinkola Estes. The poet often articulates her thoughts using multicultural myths, fairy tales, folk tales and stories.

Back to the wall paintings, the self-taught artist, Donna Duke presents a personal narrative in each piece inspired by the surrealist painter Frida Khalo. Her piece titled "The Seemingly Submissive Dreamer" shows a spiritual side to the issue, rekindling faith and hope. In another piece titled "Within," the artist who is currently pursuing a Masters' degree at the University of the Arts, London taps from her family to reflect the resilience of a woman.

"I thought of my mother and sisters who are now mothers themselves. It is commonplace for a woman's role in the family to be one of a therapist, holding the family together and taking on the weight of the emotional troubles of the family," she revealed. With motifs of power of gold and copper leaf, Duke affirms the need for recognition of power, fortitude and strength in the historical and contemporary context through black female storytelling.

The South Africa-based Nene Mahlangu who is the youngest

woman to design two coins for her country, presents in this exhibition figures depicting vulnerability, healing, confidence and a transcendent sense of power. Pushing through the pandemic, the artist worked on self-portrait paintings in 'Before Midnight', 'Time Stood Still', 'The First of January' and the series titled "Getting Ready."

Roanna Tella creates an alternate reality by situating herself in dreamscapes, providing a visual opening into emotions by examining how people respond and cope with traumatic experiences. She incorporates hand-sewn narrative, embroidering texts along the borders of her paintings in response to the overarching theme with a series titled "Resting in cerulean, ultramarine and purple." With this body of work, she questions the pressure on women and the need to embrace rest.

As for Buqaqawuli Nobakada, her pieces are deeply personal yet universal in the treatment of issues of humanity, sexuality, intimacy and growth. Using laced paper and paint, the South African artist relives the gender role associated with the chore of lace curtain repair. The chore is considered as a

rite of passage and an initiation into womanhood. Some of her pieces include 'Downtime', 'The Girl with The Ginger Hair', 'Never Leave' and 'Coming Undone.'

Perhaps, the most unfiltered take on the theme is Tomilola Olumide's installation titled 'Lamentations of Lips that keep moving.' Made of adire, beads, wire, wood, Pvc and foam, the work challenges female inferiority, intimidation, repressiveness and imposter syndrome.

"In the Nigerian society, oppression of the female gender is rooted in the pleasure of the male ego, which is fragile and dares not be challenged," she said.

At the opening, the curator for the show, Moni Aisida summed up the contributions of the five female artists.

"There is a full spectrum of what it means to be an African woman. Olumide seems to be more direct in her criticism of how society treats women; Nobakada is focused on women being soft, being allowed to be delicate. As African women, we have been depicted as strong, carrying loads on our heads but that is not all that we are. We can be strong and soft, broken and torn. The whole exhibition is about allowing women to just be who they are. That's the motivation for this exhibition," she said.

Neimeth’s Shareholders Approve Management Plan to Raise N5bn Fresh Capital

Shareholders of Neimeth International Pharmaceuticals Plc have approved the plan of the Board to raise the sum of N5 billion through a hybrid offer of Rights to existing shareholders and private placement. The money will be used to finance major long term expansion projects .

The company will raise N3.67

billion through Rights Issue and N1.32 billion through private placement.

The sum of N3,679,618,625 will be raised by way of a Rights Issue at the discounted cost of N1.55k per 50 Kobo share. The company’s shares traded above N1.70 Kobo for most of the month of March, 2022.

To achieve this the shareholders approved the creation of 2,373,947,500 additional Ordinary

Shares which will be allotted at the rate of five new shares for every four shares currently held in the company.

The shareholders also approved that the Company raise equity capital of N1,320,381,375.60 by way of a private placement at the premium price of N2.10 Kobo for 628,753,036 Ordinary Shares. The shareholders gave the approvals at the 63rd An-

nual General Meeting of the Company held in Lagos recently.

Chairman of the Board, Dr. Ambrosie Orjiako said the money is being raised for three key reasons. First, is the construction of a World class factory compliant to World Health Organisation (WHO) current Standards of Good Manufacturing Practice (cGMP) at Amawbia in Anambra State. Second is the completion of the

on going facility upgrade at the Company’s Oregun factory and thirdly to boost working capital.

Pharm Matthew Azoji, Managing Director/CEO, said the capital market is the most viable and cheaper option to source long term funds because of the high cost of funds through other sources. “We cannot finance long term projects with short term funds from banks. That will not be expedient and cost effective.

It will also not serve the best interest of shareholders” He explained that the company considered prevailing economic situation in the country that also affect shareholders before deciding to add the private placement equity. “We did not want to put the entire burden of N5 billion on shareholders, that is why we have decided to add private placement to the fund raise”, he said.

As Pressure Intensifies For Goodluck Jonathan To Declare For 2023 Presidential Election

After the fallout of the National Convention of the ruling party All Progressive Congress (APC) last Saturday/Sunday at Eagle Square in Abuja, groups and individuals have stepped up their game by mounting pressure on the former President Goodluck Ebele Jonathan to throw into the ring his hat and contest for the presidential election in 2023.

Our party, like I said, is greater and stronger with more members by the day," he said.

Expectedly, no one could turn down the president's offer. So when Senator Abdullahi Adamu eventually emerged as the Consensus candidate and National Chairman, it was a fait accompli. Everyone fell into line.

Bagudu went memory line to justify this link of argument when he said that, "We have produced a number of national chairmen by consensus; Bisi Akande emerge as the pioneer chairman of the APC through consensus, John Oyegun emerged by consensus, Adams Oshiomhole emerged by consensus, so the president reminded us of that."

But the untold ultimate strategy that was not revealed by the president and it is still kept in his chest is the fact that the cabal has perfected plan to also, like the Consensus Convention that made other National Chairmanship aspirants withdrew from the race, former President Jonathan is going to be the next Consensus presidential candidate of the party.

It is imperative to note that the president is determined to hand over power to a worthy, dependable and patriotic Nigerian within the ruling party who he believes Nigerians want and he has the requisite credentials to pull this country together from the current brink of explosive agitations along ethnic and religious lines.

The president is fully aware that he cannot

The product was allegedly sold by the Economic and Financial Crimes Commission (EFCC) at an undisclosed amount.

The transaction was however, said to be without the awareness of the Minister of Finance, Budget and National Planning,

Ahmed Zainab.

The Nigerian Navy represented by Real Admiral Sola Oluwagbire, who is the

Director of Operations appeared before the panel yesterday to clear the air on the development.

He told the Senate Committee that 44 vessels loaded with crude oil were arrested in 2021, with 1.6 million crude and 4.6 million petrol.

According to him, 13 vessels

were arrested within first quarter of 2022 with 154,000 of crude oil.

He put the total crude oil seized by the Nigerian Navy between 2021 and first quarter of 2022 at 1.754 million crude oil.

He told the Committee that the seized vessels were handed over to the EFCC, because the

Nigerian Navy was not the prosecuting agency.

He, however, said there was an allegation that the anti-graft agency had disposed the seized crude oil.

However, when the Chairman of the Committee asked the Finance Minister if she was aware of the disposed crude oil handed over to EFCC by the Nigeria Navy, Zainab said she was not aware of how the seized products were handled.

She said, "I am not aware how the seized products were handled."

The Chairman of the Committee, while speaking on the development after the session said his panel had asked the Navy to supply more information.

He also said the Committee would want to know the current situation of the seized products.

Adeola said: "We have asked the Navy to supply us with information, we want to know the current state of the seized products."

"The Nigerian National Petroleum Company is going to appear before us on Monday and we will also invite EFCC."

ACGSF: CBN, FG Guarantees Loans with N129bn

The board chairman of the Agricultural Credit Guarantee Scheme Fund (ACGSF), Mr. Stephen Okon, yesterday in Calabar, disclosed that a total of N129.084 billion had been provided by the Central Bank of Nigeria (CBN) and the federal government in guaranteeing 1,224,795 loans since the inception of the fund up to February 2022.

Making the disclosure while presenting his address at the opening session of a meeting with the board members of the ACGSF and stakeholders, Okon said the federal government contributes 60 per cent of the

funds while the CBN contributes 40 percent.

The ACGSF was established by Decree No. 20 of 1977 to guarantee agricultural credit facilities granted to farmers.

The federal government and the CBN both contribute to the fund in the ratio of 60 per cent and 40 per cent respectively. The CBN however doubles as the managing agent of the Scheme and the Secretariat of the ACGSF.

The ACGSF encourages Banks to lend to those engaged in agriculture by providing guarantee. The scheme mitigates risks associated with banks' lending to agriculture by guaranteeing to pay banks 75 per cent of the net amount in

default in accordance with the provisions of the enabling Act.

Okon said, "the fund provides guarantee in respect of loans granted by any bank for agricultural purposes with the aim of increasing the level of bank credit to the agricultural sector, adding that, "Loan" under the decree includes advances, overdrafts and any credit facility."

He said from the outlined figures, "Cross River State from January to February 2022 has guaranteed a total of 73 loan beneficiaries under the scheme, valued N24.300 million," bringing "the total guaranteed loans in Cross River State from inception of the scheme in 1978

to February 2022 to 18,406, valued N2.305 billion."

Okon said in terms of loan recovery, 10,635 loans valued at N1.065 billion were repaid under the scheme in Cross River State from the inception.

He said the records speak volumes of the level of commitment of the officers in the state, and the determination of the farmers to utilise the opportunities offered by the scheme to empower themselves and improve their lot.

Okon said the ACGSF has proved relatively successful in de-risking the agricultural sector in Nigeria as evidenced in the number of loans guaranteed from inception to date.

Speaking on the importance of the meeting, Okon said the objective was, "to create awareness on the recently amended Act of the ACGSF and provide a platform for brainstorming by Board members, Participating Financial Institutions and the Stakeholders towards improving the delivery of the objectives of the scheme."

He said in response to the challenges to food insecurity occasioned by Covid-19, the federal government and the CBN as well as other Development Finance Institution have continued to develop and implement policies aimed at promoting food sufficiency in the nation.

Soul Patriots... How Bala-Kyari Bond Enriches Nigeria

• *Heads of NNPC, NAPIMS never had it so good*

Mele Kyari and Bala Wunti are two of a kind. They are men of open trust, whose stewardship is shorn of insolence and suspicion. Some have likened them to the healing stems to the public service’s putrid branches. The heads of the Nigerian National Petroleum Corporation (NNPC), and National Petroleum Investment Management Services (NAPIMS) respectively have risen above juvenile credulity in the discharge of their duties. Rather than engage in a cutthroat rivalry, to the detriment of the country, they maintain a wise fidelity to national interest and the laws governing their offices. They have shunned the bewitching delusions and theories of war that set their predecessors apart. Writes **Lanre Alfred**

In former days, there used to be perennial crises of trust between erstwhile heads of the National Petroleum Investment Management Services (NAPIMS) and those of the Nigerian National Petroleum Corporation (NNPC). The fact that NAPIMS is a Corporate Services Unit (CSU) in the Exploration and Production (E&P) Directorate of NNPC notwithstanding, something sinister always triggered fracas between the heads of these all-important two organisations which are central to the wealth of Nigeria.

To put this in proper perspective, the worth and success of Nigeria’s investments in her oil sector are mostly determined by the NAPIMS; as it maximizes return on investments for the country through effective supervision of the joint venture (JV) and production sharing contracts (PSC) companies among others to ensure that Nigeria’s interests are adequately covered. With a portfolio so massive and apparently juicy, there is bound to be some high-handedness from some vested interests.

In times past, if the Group Managing Director of NNPC was not accusing the Managing Director of NAPIMS of insubordination; the latter would attempt to pass a report to the President intimating him of NNPC’s overbearing and some opaque operations that muddled up NAPIMS investments. It was always a cat and dog relationship between those that headed the two organisations.

But all those seem to have paled into insignificance. All the distrust and loggerheads of the past have since been consigned to the bin of history as the two men manning the affairs of NNPC and NAPIMS operate with unprecedented mutual trust and confidence, as they are always on the same page. Mele Kyari, who was appointed by President Muhammadu Buhari as the 19th GMD of NNPC in 2019 to manage the state-run oil corporation, has been having a smooth-sailing relationship with Bala Wunti, who heads NAPIMS. Information has it that the two organisations never had it so smooth between themselves prior to the appointment of these gentlemen and technocrats in 2019.

“Neither of them has ever expressed suspicion about each other,” a source confirmed. They have

always carried on without any bitterness in their hearts - not even when unscrupulous elements in the establishment attempted to cause ruckus between them by fabricating and sharing falsehoods of each to another. It has been as if both of them have sworn to an oath of dismissing tales and rumours and never allowing such to take any roots in them. Their professionalism stands them out, just as their brotherly bond has been exemplary.

Their technocratic credentials as well as their much-celebrated professional transparency have been cited as the reason for their seamless work relationship. Both have been vocal against the opacity that pervaded the running of the petroleum sector. “Between the Nigeria Extractive Industries Initiative (NEITI) – a natural resource utilisation watchdog, and the Auditor General of the Federation, dealing with the NNPC to get it to the account was distressing, the corporation hardly opened up, but with Kyari’s Transparency, Accountability and Performance Excellence (TAPE) agenda, this has changed,” a report said.

“At the outset when the Group Managing Director of the NNPC, Mallam Mele Kyari came

on board with his team, what he laid before the Nigerian public was that he will be transparent and that he will engage,” Umar Ajiya, who heads NNPC’s finance and accounts department said in a report.

With Bala’s calm disposition and personal commitment to transparency and accountability, he has been able to bring NAPIMS to benefit from Kyari’s TAPE, as an outfit that manages Nigeria’s investment interests in joint venture deals in the sector. NAPIMS has leveraged Kyari’s TAPE to pursue transformation and efficiency in its operations. Its commitment has efficiently buoyed indigenous firm, First Exploration and Petroleum (E&P), to start oil production from the Anyala West field in offshore OMLs 83 and 85.

From contract renegotiation, premium payments and rate reductions, NAPIMS has also saved \$1 billion for the country, while raising Nigeria’s oil reserve by 181.5mb of oil equivalent. Unit cost of production is also being pushed down further by NAPIMS to keep Nigeria competitive.

This is what happens when round pegs are positioned in round holes – the country gains and the people rejoice, most especially when such returns on investment are used to fund infrastructure like the present administration has been doing.

Kyari joined NNPC in 1991 and has served in various roles within the Corporation. In 2015, Mr. Kyari was appointed Group General Manager, Crude Oil Marketing Division, where he made a positive impact on NNPC and Nigeria with outstanding achievements that include optimally securing Federation entitlements from production/ fiscal arrangements and resolution of various disputes on PSCs. He also successfully managed the Direct Sales and Direct Purchase (DSDP) arrangement of petroleum products to ensure energy security.

From championing EITI and Open Government Partnership principles, promoting the passage of the Petroleum Industry Act, declaring the Corporation’s first profit in her 44-year history and resolving the decade-long PSC

disputes to unlocking the deepwater, introducing cost discipline, rehabilitating ailing refineries and other critical downstream infrastructure, deepening domestic gas utilization, public disclosure of NNPC accounts, the first in the Corporation’s history, Kyari has championed Transparency and Accountability and Performance Excellence.

Other achievements include rallying shareholders to take the FID for NLNG Train 7, transforming the Corporation into a world-class organisation and leading concerted efforts in driving environmental policies for cleaner energy. Aside from being a Fellow of the Nigerian Association of Petroleum Explorationists (FNAPE), Kyari is also Nigeria’s National Representative to the Organisation of Petroleum Exporting (OPEC) Economic Commission Board (ECB).

On the other hand, Bala Wunti is a thoroughbred oil and gas industry professional with over 30 years of experience covering Technical, Commercial, Managerial and Executive roles across the oil and gas value chain. Since joining NNPC, Bala has held several key positions in NNPC. He previously served as Managing Director, Petroleum Products Marketing Company (PPMC), Group General Manager Corporate Planning & Strategy, Senior Technical Adviser to five different Group Managing Directors of NNPC amongst others.

Bala has led some critical National Assignments including the review and amendment of the 1993 Deep Offshore Act to improve Government Take from Production Sharing Contracts, renegotiation of Production Sharing Contracts after over 2 decades of stalemate, and commercial negotiations for ~30 different LNG related agreements. He has championed several initiatives such as the “Nigasification Strategy” for powering the Nigerian economy with natural gas and condensate, the “P-PIE Initiative” for eliminating the importation of petroleum products, and more recently optimization of upstream operating costs to sub \$10/bbl. Buhari: Nigeria’s 3.4% GDP Growth Shows Investment in Infrastructure Working

●NSIA says N1.26trn projects ongoing under its intervention

President Muhammadu Buhari yesterday said that the recent data released by the National Bureau of Statistics (NBS) that Nigeria’s economy grew by 3.4 per cent in 2021 was a testament that his efforts at revamping the country’s infrastructural base was working. In his acceptance speech at the 7th Edition of the African Road Builders Conference and Trophée Babacar Ndiaye award in Abuja, Buhari stressed that the policies and programmes that had been inaugurated over the years were beginning to bear fruits. The Babacar Ndiaye Africa Road Builders Award is organised by Acturoutes, an information platform on infrastructure and roads in Africa, and Media for Infrastructure and Finance in Africa (MIFA), a network of African journalists specialised in road infrastructure. Sponsored by the African Development Bank (AfDB), the award was created in honour of Babacar Ndiaye, President of the AfDB Group from 1985 to 1995. “Our most recent GDP results of 3.40 per cent, the biggest in the last seven years clearly show that the construction sub-sectors and related sub-sectors of the economy were among the big performers of the growth surge,” the president said.

Buhari, who was represented by the Minister of Works and Housing, Mr Babatunde Fashola (SAN) expressed delight that Nigeria had begun playing her membership and leadership role in African institutions and in the pursuit of achieving their objectives. The president stated that Nigeria’s collaboration with the AfDB had been productive and results are now manifest in projects like the Mfum-Bamenda Bridge that connects Nigeria and the Republic of Cameroon. He acknowledged the support of the bank in financing feasibility studies, consultancies and pre-construction work on the Lagos-Abidjan corridor comprising Nigeria, the Republic of Benin, Togo, Ghana and Cote d’Ivoire which is part of Trans African Highway No. 7 from Dakar in Senegal to Lagos in Nigeria. He listed the Lagos-Badagry corridor, Second River Niger Bridge, the Enugu – Abakaliki to Mfum Highway, the 375Km Abuja to Kano road, the Apapa-Oworonshoki Highway, the Suleja-Minna Highway, the Calabar-Itu-Odukpani Highway as some examples of over 13,000 kilometres of road and bridge construction, expansion and rehabilitation nationwide. “They have been a major boost

for the growth of our economy, keeping people at work; driving a supply value chain, stimulating productivity at quarries, cement factories, steel factories, and the petroleum sectors for lubricants, fuel and bitumen. “Very evidently, infrastructure investment is good for the economy. By building roads, we are building economies,” the president said. Speaking on the Presidential Infrastructure Development Fund (PIDF), Managing Director of the Nigeria Sovereign Investment Authority (NSIA), Uche Orji, said projects worth about N1.52 trillion were ongoing nationwide, but had recently been reworked to about N1.26 trillion. According to him, the ongoing projects are expected to have positive social and economic nationwide impact on the Nigerian economy, including creation of jobs and facilitation of poverty alleviation. “The PIDF will complete four critical projects costing a total of \$5.6 billion (N2.3 trillion). The financing of these projects has the potential to yield between 274, 000 and 616,000 new direct and indirect jobs. “It will boost economic activity and spur an increase in investments, agriculture and

trade between the commercial cities due to the improved and quicker access to market. “The roads will significantly open the economic corridors leading to massive improvement in manufacturing, trading and commercial activities driven by the ease of movement of people, services and raw materials. “They will drive economic growth through diversification: the increased economic activity will contribute to the growth and diversification of the Nigerian economy and attract investments to drive infrastructure development,” he noted. Quoting AfDB and the International Finance Corporation (IFC), Orji stated that for every \$1.00 billion invested in

infrastructure in developing economies, between 49,000 and 110,000 jobs are created. Speaking on: “The Need for Road Investments and Effects on Energy Distribution,” Group Managing Director of the Nigerian National Petroleum Company (NNPC) Limited, Mallam Mele Kyari said that in order to address the plight faced by petroleum product marketers in transportation which affects nationwide distributand, the NNPC recently keyed into the Federal Government Road Infrastructure Development and Refurbishment Investment Tax Credit Scheme. Under the scheme, he reiterated that the NNPC is providing funding to the tune of N621

billion for the rehabilitation of 1,804.6 Km of identified federal roads which are also critical to NNPC’s operations spread across 15 states. He explained that the benefits of NNPC’s participation in the scheme include sustaining energy security through efficient distribution of petroleum products across the country and also improving other economic activities that are dependent on road transportation and social benefits. Kyari said that road infrastructure remains one of the most critical aspects of national development which unlocks many socio-economic benefits for the Nigerian citizens, adding that the NNPC will continue to play its role as an enabler.

FG Urges Citizens to Link NIN to SIM, Rules Out Deadline Extension

The federal government yesterday advised the general public to ensure that they conclude the process of linking their National Identification Number (NIN), with their Subscriber Identification Module (SIM Card) without further delay. The federal government had on December 31, 2021, extended the deadline for NIN-SIM linkage by three months, which elapsed yesterday, and had earlier warned that all SIM cards not linked before the deadline, would be disconnected. However, the government, in a statement yesterday, said it had given telecoms subscribers few days after the March 31, 2022 deadline, to link their NIN to their SIM.

According to the statement, jointly signed by the Director, Public Affairs, Nigerian Communications Commission (NCC), Dr. Ikechukwu Adinde and the Head, Corporate Communications, National Identity Management Commission, Mr. Kayode Adegoke, stated that citizens had been given additional few days from the March 31 deadline, which ended yesterday, to complete the process of linking their NIN to their SIM. The statement read: “The general public would recall that the Federal Government approved an extension of the NIN-SIM linkage deadline to the 31st of March, 2022. In preparation for the enforcement, the Minister of Communications and Digital Economy, Dr. Isa Ali

Ibrahim Pantami urges citizens and legal residents to use the next few days to ensure that they complete the linkage. “To this end, the Minister has further directed that the National Identity Management Commission (NIMC) should offer enrolment services round-the-clock for the next few days. “Pantami also thanks all those who have completed their NIN-SIM linkage. Court Frees Former NNPC GMD of Money Laundering Charge

●Orders release of seized \$9.8m, £74,000 ●EFCC to appeal Yakubu's acquittal

Justice Ahmed Mohammed of the Abuja Division of the Federal High Court, yesterday freed a former Group Managing Director of the Nigeria National Petroleum Corporation (NNPC), Mr. Andrew Yakubu of money laundering charges.

Justice Mohammed in a judgment discharged and acquitted the former NNPC boss after holding that the prosecution failed to prove its allegations against him.

But the Economic and Financial Crimes Commission (EFCC) in a swift reaction, yesterday said it would appeal the ruling.

Justice Mohammed ordered the

federal government to release the alleged proceeds of crime seized from the defendant, amounting to a total of \$9.8 million and £74,000.

Yakubu was dragged to court by the federal government after huge sums of hard currencies were found in a safe in his Kaduna resident.

The EFCC had on February 3, 2017, stormed Yakubu's resident in Kaduna on a sting operation where the sum of \$9.8 million and £74,000 stashed in a fire-proof safe were recovered.

The anti-graft agency had accused the former GMD of failing to disclosed the said funds in his asset declaration form in 2015, as required by the law.

The Commission a month later (March 16, 2017) slammed a six-

count charge bordering on money laundering and false declaration of assets against him.

He pleaded not guilty to all the charges and was admitted to bail.

However, after the prosecution closed its case against the defendant, Yakubu, entered a no-case submission, claiming that the prosecution failed to prove the ingredients of the charge.

In his ruling, Justice Mohammed partially agreed with Yakubu, struck out two of the six-count charge and ordered him to enter his defense in the remaining four.

Not satisfied, Yakubu proceeded to the Court of Appeal, asking the appellate court to set aside the order for him to enter his defense in four counts.

In their ruling however, the appellate court struck out two of the four counts and ordered him to open his defense in the remaining two.

Still dissatisfied, Yakubu proceeded to the apex court, where the Supreme Court in July 2021 dismissed his appeal seeking the retrieval of his forfeited monies — making it the third time that this plea was rejected.

Yakubu had argued that the monies seized from him were gifts and estacodes in different tranches, adding that the sums were gathered within a five-year period.

He explained that he decided to keep the monies in his house pending when he decides to open a business venture of his choice.

In his ruling, the apex court dismissed one of the count leaving just one count for Yakubu to answer to at the trial court.

However, ruling in the remaining one count charge yesterday, the trial court held that the EFCC failed to establish that the defendant received cash

payment beyond the N5 million threshold.

According to the judge, it is one thing to find money in a person's house and another to prove that the money was received all at once.

He described Yakubu's evidence as, "credible" adding that he had no reason to disbelieve it.

The judge added that the EFCC did not do a good job in its investigation.

"The prosecution ought to have investigated the claim of the defendant and subsequently, lead evidence to contradict its claim," the judge held.

"A prudent investigator could have asked the investigator to asked the defendant to provide the names of some of his friends and other individuals who had given him monies as gifts or as goodwill and find out how much each person had given him and thereafter invite them to find out

the truth or otherwise."

Consequently, the judge ordered that the monies deposited in the Central Bank of Nigeria be returned to the former GMD.

Meanwhile, the EFCC said it would appeal the ruling by Justice Mohammed.

The EFCC revealed that in the course of the trial, it called witnesses and tendered documents in evidence, but the defendant filed a no case submission.

Based on the submission, the court struck out two of the six counts. A statement by EFCC explained that two further counts were chalked off upon appeal by the defendant while the appellate court ordered his continued trial on the remaining two counts.

"However, the commission believes the trial judge erred in dismissing the charge and has resolved to test the ruling at the appellate court," it stated.

NAFDAC Puts Fake Medicine in Circulation at 15 per cent

The National Agency for Food, Drug Administration and Control (NAFDAC) has said contrary to report that 70 per cent of medicine in circulation in the country are fake, only about 15 per cent have been confirmed to be substandard.

Speaking at the official inauguration of 73 vehicles acquired by the agency to help in its enforcement operations, the Director General of the agency, Prof. Mojisola Adeyeye said as part of the consideration for certification of the Maturity Level 3 by the World Health Organisation (WHO), NAFDAC had developed capacity to detection of fake drugs.

She said: "There was a rumour that about 70 per cent of medicine in circulation within the country are fake. That is not

true. It is about 13 per cent or 15 per cent because we doing what called risk-based sampling for products that we know can be easily faked.

"It is part of consideration for our maturity Level 3. It is part of the capacity that earned us the Maturity Level 3.

"We have mechanisms in place to go after any product that could be easily faked and then resolve it and know how much of it is there.

"But we are going to be mitigating it. As we speak, our staff are uploading some tools on their laptops and we are going to using a device that cost about \$57,000 each and we need 40 of them."

Adeyeye also spoke on the progress of expansion work at the agency's vaccine laboratory at Oshodi in Lagos state, saying that it will be ready within the next 12 months.

Scientists Sequence Complete Human Genome for First Time

A team of nearly 100 scientists from the Telomere-to-Telomere (T2T) Consortium has unveiled the complete human genome — the first time it's been sequenced in its entirety, the researchers said.

In 2003, the Human Genome Project made history when it sequenced 92 per cent of the human genome. But for nearly two decades since, scientists have struggled to decipher the remaining eight per cent.

"Having this complete information will allow us to better understand how we form as an individual organism and how we vary not just between other humans but other species," CNN quoted, Howard Hughes Medical Institute investigator at the University of Washington and the research leader, Evan Eichler to have said yesterday.

The new research introduces 400 million letters to the previously sequenced DNA — an entire

chromosome's worth. The full genome would allow scientists to analyse how DNA differs between people and whether these genetic variations play a role in disease.

The research, published in the journal Science yesterday, was previously in preprint, allowing other teams to use the sequence in their own studies.

"It turns out that these genes are incredibly important for adaptation," Eichler said. "They contain immune response genes that help us to adapt and survive infections and plagues and viruses. They contain genes that are ... very important in terms of predicting drug response."

Eichler also said some of the recently uncovered genes were even responsible for making human brains larger than those of other primates, providing insight into what makes humans unique.

This remaining nine per cent of the human genome had stumped scientists for years because of its complexities. For one thing, it contained DNA regions with several repetitions, which made it challenging to string the DNA together in the correct order using previous sequencing methods.

The researchers relied on two DNA sequencing technologies that emerged over the past decade to bring this project to fruition: the Oxford Nanopore DNA sequencing method, which can sequence up to 1 million DNA letters at once but with some mistakes, and the PacBio HiFi DNA sequencing method, which can read 20,000 letters with 99.9 per cent accuracy.

Sequencing DNA is like solving a jigsaw puzzle, Eichler said.

Scientists must first break the DNA into smaller parts and then use sequencing machines to piece it

together in the correct order. Previous sequencing tools could sequence only small sections of DNA at once.

With a 10,000-piece puzzle, it's hard to correctly arrange small puzzle pieces when they look alike, much like it is to sequence small sections of repetitive DNA. But with a 500-piece puzzle, it's much easier to arrange larger pieces — or, in this case, longer segments of DNA.

Standard human cells contain two sets of DNA, a maternal copy and a paternal copy, but this team used DNA from a group of cells called a complete hydatidiform mole, which contains a duplicate of the paternal set of DNA. A complete hydatidiform mole is a rare complication of a pregnancy caused by the abnormal growth of cells that originate from the placenta. This approach simplifies the genome so that scientists need sequence only one set rather than two sets of DNA.

Buhari Directs Police, Security Agencies to End Cult Killings in Ogun

President Muhammadu Buhari has called for an end to murders, kidnappings and sexual assault by rival cult groups particularly in Ogun State.

The President, in a statement yesterday by his spokesman, Mallam Garba Shehu, was reacting to reports reaching him on the renewed cult violence, with Ogun state as the new battlefield, directing the police and other law enforcement agencies to confront head on, groups seeking to destroy peace and bring disorder before they

gain strength.

According to him: "What should frighten us is that the deadly cult groups are increasingly attracting lonely, anxious, troubled youth who they trap in unorthodox social practices. Parents and religious leaders must come to grasp with what is going on and halt the radicalization of our youth."

It had been reported that the clashes between the Eiye and Aiye cult groups had persisted, lasting for over a week, following the killing of key leaders of both groups.

Benson said, "The recent attack on an Abuja-Kaduna train is yet another sad and regrettable security breach. As a committee, we are saddened and highly disturbed by the incident and the brazen audacity of the bandits. We believe that Nigerians should enjoy adequate security everywhere they go. We, therefore, see this as a major setback that must be addressed immediately, especially, considering the current fear of traveling by road along that route."

Government Area of Kaduna State, the Deputy Speaker, Hon. Idris Wase, noted that a lot needed to be done to stem the tide of insecurity. He wondered if one report had ever been turned in by the Committee on National Security and Intelligence.

He said, "I don't know one report that has been turned in by Committee on National Security and Intelligence. I don't know," mandating the relevant security committees of the House to step up their oversight functions as well as conclude the reports of their investigations.

Chief Whip of the House, Hon. Tahir Monguno, frowned on the slow pace with which the Committee on National Security and Intelligence carried out assignments.

Monguno said, "With regard to the committee, I can also recall that the first bill that was passed for second reading is my bill, which is the bill on small arms and light weapons. That bill was referred to the national security committee, but up till now, there is no report. Up to the extent that they had to go and appeal to Mr Speaker, which he had to set up an ad hoc committee. That is the extent the committee has not performed."

Edo APC Makes U-turn, to Participate LG Elections

In contrast to its earlier decision not to participate in the state forthcoming local government council elections, the Edo State chapter of the All Progressives Congress (APC) yesterday resolved to take part.

In other words, the provision of the EDSIEC law should not run contrary to the provisions of the Electoral Act. And if the law runs contrary to the Act, the Electoral Act should take precedence.

The National Drug Law Enforcement Agency (NDLEA) has declared that drug abuse among the youths is a time bomb ticking very fast and needs to be addressed.

Youth Parliament, on Thursday in Kaduna.

Gamde said: “Presently one of the main catalysts of the numerous security challenges facing the country is the problem

of drug abuse. Illicit drug trade proved to be an insidious threat that finances terrorism, instigate corruption, undermines economic development and erode state authority.”

According to him, drug abuse is a predisposing factor to the commission of many criminal offences such as murder, armed robbery, rape, cultism, terrorism, kidnapping and insurgency in the country.

He noted that of recent

kidnappers have added the provision of drugs like Tramadol 225mg and Indian hemp as part of the ransom to be paid for the release of abducted persons.

He noted that as a result of the following that the Chairman/Chief Executive Officer of the NDLEA, launched the War Against Drug Abuse (WADA) campaign to create the necessary awareness and reduce drugs abuse which will drastically stem the rising insecurity in the country.

Vigilance Group Inaugurates Four-million Personnel Squad

The Vigilance Group of Nigeria (VGN) has inaugurated its special tactical squad of over four million vigilantes.

Explaining the concept, the National Public Relations Officer of VCN, Mr. Philip Amanyi, said that the training and launch of the special squad was to strengthen the organisation in

assisting the regular security agencies in combating the rising wave of terrorism, banditry, and kidnapping in the country.

Amanyi said yesterday during the inauguration of members of the squad in Abuja, that members of the tactical squad were carefully selected from the data base of over 35 million operatives of VGN across Nigeria.

He said: “We prepare them for the daunting security task they will carry out. We trained them on how to gather intelligence and work to complement the effort of the formal security agencies in tackling insecurity in the country. So we gave them the best of training in collaboration with the Nigerian Army, Nigeria Police Force (NPF), Nigeria Security and

Civil Defence Corps (NSCDC) and the Department of Security Service (DSS). They came from time to time to train them.

“Today, a deputy commander-general will be appointed to head the tactical squad department which is aimed primarily at strengthening the operations of VGN and the operations of the formal security services.”

Makinde Donates N500m for Construction of Airforce Base in Ibadan

Oyo State Governor, Seyi Makinde, yesterday, pledged to donate the sum of N500 million for the construction of the 671 Air Force Base located in Ajia area of Ibadan, Oyo State.

The Maritime Workers Union of Nigeria (MWUN) has disclosed that the federal government is losing huge revenue in the maritime sector over absence of tally clerks and onboard security men also known as on vessels in the nation’s ports.

The workers’ union said their

absence is making vessels laden for Nigerian ports become porous as they are loaded with dangerous cargoes such as trafficking of illicit drugs, arms and ammunitions, as well as give access to stowaways, among others. President-General of MWUN, Adewale Adeyanju, who disclosed this yesterday at a press briefing, said onboard

security men, otherwise known as ‘on board ship gang way security men,’ should be reinstated to restore security onboard vessels in the ports.

He said that a large percentage of vessels coming into the Nigeria ports are porous but with the presence of onboard security men and tally clerks, vessels laden with

dangerous cargoes could be easily spotted and surveillance placed on the vessels.

He denied any involvement with other officials to aid and abet crime that led to their removal onboard vessels but said government’s unfriendly policies has made the very important department to be withdrawn from vessels.

Southern, Middle Belt Leaders Condemn Kaduna Train Attack

The leadership of the Southern and Middle Belt Leaders' Forum (SMBLF) has condemned the attack on the Abuja – Kaduna bound train by terrorists on Monday night, calling for declaration of war against terrorists.

certain amounts in order not to be attacked, what did the government do? When they hoisted their flags in parts of Niger State, and the governor

raised the alarm, nothing was done."

Boko Haram terrorists have been arrested and convicted Enough of bare avowals by the government, the primary duty of government is the protection

of lives and property of citizens, therefore, urgent and extreme steps must be taken to deal decisively with these terrorist groups".

Following moves to stage a protest against the planned re-opening of the Lekki Tollgate by Lekki Concession Company (LCC), the Lagos State Commissioner of Police (CP) Abiodun Alabi, yesterday warned intending protesters against breakdown of law and order.

to re-open.

Given the impasse reached at the stakeholders meeting yesterday, the protesters, mostly the youth, vowed to stage another protest at the tollgate if the government eventually moves to re-open it.

Reacting to the planned protest, in a statement made available to THISDAY late last night by the state Police Public Relations Officer,

SP Benjamin Hundeyin, the CP warned intending protesters that anyone found infringing on the rights of other Nigerians will be dealt with in accordance with the law.

The statement reads in part: "The Lagos State Commissioner of Police, CP Abiodun Alabi has assured Lagosians that the command has put necessary measures in place to ensure

the safety of lives and property, free flow of traffic and a peaceful environment for carrying out their respective lawful duties.

"This assurance has become imperative following news making the rounds that some Nigerians are planning to protest at the Lekki Toll-gate, an action capable of grounding commercial activities and obstructing free flow of traffic.

Super Eagles made appreciable lift in the March rankings released by FIFA yesterday despite failing to qualify for the 2022 World Cup in Qatar.

Nigeria climbed six steps up from the previous ranking and are now in the 30th position. Eagles are also number three in Africa, while Algeria that similarly failed to qualify for Qatar 2022 dropped out of Africa's top five into number seven.

At the global level, Brazil

having spent 4,731 days which is the longest time at the top of the ranking by any team before they dropped down, are now back on top, five years after they were last there.

Their recent 4-0 defeat of Chile at home and another 4-0 away humiliation of Bolivia in the World Cup qualifying series enabled the South Americans to overtake Belgium in the number one position.

Belgium had been on top in the past three years. But their recent 2-2 draw with Ireland may have

impacted in their current ranking.

The March 2022 table is therefore a new chapter in rankings history, but more than that, it will be used to calculate the seeds for the FIFA World Cup Qatar 2022 Final Draw which will take place this afternoon in Doha.

Akanni: Preparations for Nigeria, Ghana Clash was Top-notch

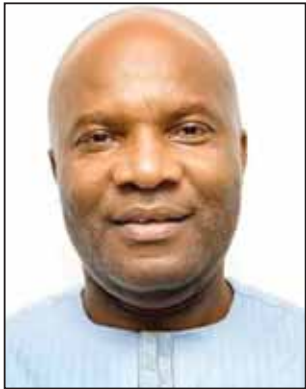

The SA to the President on Sports, Daniel Amokachi, Mary Onyali, the stadium manager, all the directors in the ministry worked round the clock."

So, as a country, we cannot tell the exact volume of petroleum products that we consume on a daily basis" –Minister of State for Petroleum Resources, Timipre Sylva, restating NNPC's dilemma.

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Reliving the Season of Anomie

"Every day, we are worried about what is happening in the North-west..What is happening now in the north-west is what has honestly overwhelmed me.. the same people, 9th the same culture, killing each other, stealing each other's property"- President Muhammadu Buhari

The last time I visited home at Okemesi, the news in town was the abomination of a brother who impregnated his sister whereupon both were banished from the town. This was followed with a ritual cleansing of the community. Compared to what has become of contemporary Nigeria, this abomination looks trivial. I borrowed the title of today's column from a book (the season of anomie) published fifty years ago by Professor Wole Soyinka. The parallel between the narrative of 1966 (and the prelude to the civil war) and contemporary Nigeria is chilling and we can only pray that it is not productive of a similar tragic outcome. "The season of anomie is Soyinka's telling of the legend of Orpheus and Eurydice in a Nigerian context, particularly the chaos in 1966 which led to the Biafra War. It is the story of an advertising genius, Ofeyi, who has produced a brilliant marketing campaign to sell a host of products of dubious quality. However, he discovers the village of Aiyéró, where things are done differently. The people there get on with their work in a community spirit, working together, not seeking personal enrichment. Ofeyi sees this and changes his ways. Unfortunately, the Cartel that controls the country does not like this. The Cartel, with the support of the government and authorities, decides to repress this approach and does so with bloody and brutal violence. Much of the book is taken up with a graphic description of how the Cartel and its gorillas brutally repress the people – burning down churches, savagely slaughtering innocent people, including women and children.."

Fifty years later at the University of Pennsylvania, this was what Soyinka had to say concerning the reproduction of anomie in Nigeria "I have been under a state of shock for a couple of decades. Things have been happening I never thought I would witness.

You wake up, somebody has disappeared, the body is found, the vital organs removed. People kidnapping for ransom everyday, which is what Boko Haram, ISWAP and the others have been doing" At the Obafemi Awolowo University, in Ile-Ife, the anomie manifested in the visceral disputation with the appointment of a new Vice-Chancellor by militants of the local Ife local community. They charged "It is an insult on us that after 61 years, they deemed it unfit to appoint or to elect any of our sons. We are not particular about Ife. Ipetumodu, Lorigbo, Modakeke, and anywhere in the land. We are telling you (workers and students)

today, don't come to work tomorrow (Friday). We won't agree to anything. We will be here with charms, we will be here with masquerades, we will be here with deities. We are appealing to you, don't come to work tomorrow. We will allow you to go now but don't come to work tomorrow." Since he spent a substantial part of his productive life at the same university, I will once again cede the floor to Soyinka for an appropriate response to this wanton display of regression into primitive delinquency. "An Ife person wrote me and say, look at these people disgracing us. I told him go there and disgrace them. You are an Ife person. You should be in the front line. The Ife people should say those people don't belong to us, we don't know where they came from. And they should be dealt with ruthlessly. Why should there be an Ife VC anywhere. I just don't understand what they put in the water these days. It is crazy."

In the recent past and indeed since 2015, Nigeria has increasingly played host to the normalisation of unprecedented absurdities and abnormalities. The supreme irony here is that when you think that Nigeria has hit rock bottom, a new perversion will follow surpassing the bar set by the preceding degradation. Here in Lagos, the prevailing reminder these days is the permanent company of the mutually reinforcing vexation of a searing hot humid weather, steep degeneration of the abysmally low supply of power and skyrocketing price of diesel oil to power individual mitigation from generator plants. The trend of the encompassing national tragedy which recently culminated in the Abuja-Kaduna railroad disaster is what the Yoruba call 'eemo ti wo ilu, eiye o ke bi eiye mo, eku o dun bi eku mo, eniyan o fohun bi eniyan mo' (incomprehensible disaster has befallen society. The voice of the birds, rats and humans have been eerily denatured). If the preceding

presidency of Goodluck Jonathan was bad how then do we characterize the transition to the incumbent presidency of General Muhammadu Buhari? The scriptures affords us a cue "Whereas my father burdened you with a heavy yoke, I will add to your yoke. Whereas my father scourged you with whips, I will scourge you with scorpions." And it is not as if Nigerians were not duly warned of what the re-election of Buhari portends for the country. Dele Shobowale of the Vanguard newspaper recalled the alarm bell he tolled three years ago. "Nepotism/regionalism, unrelenting economic insecurity and increased personal insecurity will follow the re-election of Buhari. On anti-corruption effort, friends receive the hug; perceived opponents get the hammer. Where is the integrity? I had warned you that 'The Next Level Is Pure Anarchy'. Now, My Fellow Citizens, you are reaping what you sowed by voting for Buhari in 2019. The man announced a few months ago that he has done his best. I believe him. So, don't expect anything better till 2023. Instead, prepare for something worse"

On Monday and living up to his billing as the pall bearer of alternate reality, the minister of information, Lai Mohammed typically unloaded "I am proud of our security forces, our men and women in uniform. Despite a myriad of security challenges, they are living up to the billing. As the terrorists and their camps are being decimated, thousands of terrorists and their families are surrendering in droves. The effectiveness of the security forces has been enhanced by the leadership provided by President Muhammadu Buhari and the unwavering commitment of the armed forces and its leadership," In the eventide of the same day, the parallel Nigerian government of Boko Haram, ISWAP and sundry outlaws repudiated the lie with a vicious carnage- this time the proxy victims were the innocent travellers on the Kaduna- Abuja railroad. This disaster left us with the "indisputable conclusion that Kaduna, the gateway to the North for those coming through Abuja has had all its entrances virtually closed by bandits. The train was conveying over 350 passengers as the train service remained the "safest' in recent times as a result of the rampant attacks by terrorists on the Abuja-Kaduna Expressway"

When speculations were rife that Senator Abdullahi Adamu was aspiring to become the Chairman of the APC, the two relevant credentials that best define him came to mind. One is his long standing public theft corruption case with the EFCC and the other is a virulent Northern irredentism. If anyone has gone out of his way to court public attention as a bellicose proponent of a discredited Northern hegemony, few will contest that spot with Abdullahi Adamu. Since the former resume is now worn as a badge of honour by criminally implicated Nigerian public officials I readily discounted it as a disabling factor. Not so the second.

My thinking was that the President need not go this far to push his open Northern agenda by sponsoring such a raw polarising figure for the position of the chairman of a party that fancies itself as a national party. Naivety becomes of me. Shouldn't I have known that the latter quality is precisely the skill set the President was looking for? And let everybody be damned including, for that matter, the governors and leaders of APC from the South who, similarly believed that Adamu is one bridge too far. "Virtually all the APC governors (from the South) were unanimous that Adamu could not be entrusted with the party's leadership, owing to his alleged aversion to the southern part of the country. We have nothing personal against Abdullahi Adamu except for the fact that he has demonstrated an undiluted hatred for the South. Recall that this man rubbished the call for zoning and went ahead to use insulting words on our leaders who spearhead zoning"

In another bridge too far and calling out the impotence of the Niger Delta people to the bargain, it is no longer news that there has been a virtual take over of the Nigerian National Petroleum Corporation, NNPC, by the Northern ruling caste with Mele Kyari as the class captain. What is news is that Kyari recently called a press conference to inform on the wherewithal of the toxic fuel that recently poisoned the Nigerian atmosphere. At the occasion, Mr Kyari indicted some fuel importers, namely Duke Oil, the trading arm of the NNPC, MRS, Oando, and a consortium comprising Emadeb/Hyde/AY Maikifi/Brittania, for bringing contaminated fuel into the country. But it turned out that such was the egregious nature of his mendacity that "four of the oil companies accused by the Group Managing Director of the Nigerian National Petroleum Company (NNPC) Limited, Mele Kyari, of importing substandard petrol have all in writing denied the allegation. In their separate publications, the four companies – MRS, Emadeb, Brittania-U and Oando – vehemently denied importing the high methanol petrol.

Surprisingly, the NNPC boss has been silent about the renunciations by the companies he earlier accused of importing the toxic fuel. It was learnt that NNPC itself (via Duke Oil) is the most likely source of the entire bad fuel and that Kyari was trying to be clever by half, by lumping it on the other suppliers". It is of course inconceivable that these private Oil companies will have the temerity to publicly controvert the NNPC were they guilty as charged. So here we are with Kyari coming out to deliberately tell a brazen lie to the Nigerian public. The question then remains that If he can get away with this blatant falsehood how many lies are we being fed on the operations of the corporation including what is reported as Nigeria's oil production per day?
