

Zenith Bank's Growth Accelerates with 22% Rise in Gross Earnings in Q1

Zenith Bank Plc has announced its unaudited results for the first quarter (Q1) ended 31st March 2022, with an impeccable growth of 22 per cent in gross earnings, from N157.3 billion reported in Q1 2021 to N191.5

billion in Q1 2022. From the unaudited statement of account presented to the Nigerian Exchange Limited (NGX) yesterday, the strong double-digit growth in the topline culminated in an increase in the bottom line, as the Group recorded an 11

per cent year-on-year (YoY) increase in profit before tax, growing from N61.02 billion in Q1 2021 to N67.99 billion in Q1 2022. Its profit after tax also grew by 10 per cent, from N53.06 billion to N58.19 billion over the same period. The growth

in the topline arose from both interest income and non-interest income. Interest income grew by 25 per cent, from N101.12 billion in Q1 2021 to N126.38 billion in Q1 2022, while non-interest income grew by 12 per cent, from N51.20 billion to N57.23

billion. The growth in interest income and non-interest income arose from the combined effects of an improvement in interest income on loans and advances (as risk assets continue to grow and pricing is gradually improving) and an improvement in non-

interest income as the bank continued to deploy its retail strategy, thereby acquiring more customers and expanding its electronic banking income from the increased volume of transactions across all its

Train Attack: Terrorists Release Photograph of Baby Delivered in Captivity By Abducted Woman

● Umar expresses dismay, appeals for international community's intervention

The photograph of a new-born baby girl delivered in a terrorists' den by a mother abducted during the March 28 attack on an Abuja-Kaduna-bound train has been released by the abductors.

Former military governor of Kaduna State, Col. Abubakar Umar (rtd.), told THISDAY the development was "so sad and very unfortunate."

Umar reiterated his call on the international community to intervene in the matter. He also faulted a portion of the bill seeking to amend the Terrorism (Prevention) Act, 2013 that

prohibited payment of ransom to kidnappers in the country.

He stated, "The world must know what is happening. This government is trying to cover up this and we all must keep talking about this. Before you know it, these people would spend 10 years, like the Chibok girls. There are thousands of kidnapped victims in northern Nigeria, but the governments don't want people to talk about it."

"Twenty-four hours ago, the senators passed a bill that anybody that pays ransom would be jailed. Can you imagine that? If the

Again, NNPC Failed to Contribute to Federation Account in March

The Nigerian National Petroleum Company (NNPC) once more failed to remit any money to the federation account, a joint pool operated by the federal, state and local governments in the country in March.

With the inability of the national oil company to contribute last month, it means that since this year, the NNPC has not funded the statutory joint account at all.

On Wednesday, the Federation Accounts Allocation Committee (FAAC) shared a total sum of N725.57 billion among the three tiers of government, as federal allocation for last month.

The amount was a 23 per cent increase from the N590 billion shared by the three tiers of government in February, with statutory revenue representing

N521.16 billion and Value Added Tax (VAT) being N204.40 billion.

At the meeting, the federal government received N277.10 billion, states got N227.2 billion while the local government areas got N167.91 billion.

But of the amount, although the NNPC did not pay anything, Petroleum Profit Tax ,Oil and Gas Royalties contributed to the FAAC distribution while Import and Excise Duties, Companies Income Tax and Value Added Tax all recorded increases.

An analysis of the NNPC presentation to FAAC showed that while subsidy would gulp N671.88 billion in April due for sharing in May, the oil firm has failed to pay anything out of its budgeted annual N1.473 trillion.

It showed that the NNPC spent N210.38 billion, N219.78 billion and N245.77 billion as subsidy on

petrol in January, February and March 2022 respectively, totalling N675.93 billion on petrol.

Despite increasing international prices of crude oil, Nigeria has failed to take advantage as it imports all products from abroad,

on which it will expend N4 trillion this year, almost a quarter of its N17.1 trillion budget for the year.

Nigeria’s external reserves has shed \$840.6 million in the last 116 days from January 1, 2022, to April 26, according to official

data, falling to \$39.67 billion as of April 26, down from the \$40.518 billion posted on January 1, 2022.

In the first quarter of 2022 ending March, the reserves dipped \$971.36 million from \$40.518 billion on January 1, to \$39.55 billion on

March 31.

The Muhammadu Buhari-administration recently deferred the implementation of the full removal of subsidy by 18 months, effectively pushing it to the next government which begins in May next year.

ASUU: NLC Threatens 3-Day Warning Strike

The Nigeria Labour Congress (NLC) has issued a 21-day ultimatum after which it would commence on a three-day nationwide warning strike if the federal government continues to ignore the demands of the Academic Staff Union of Universities (ASUU).

The congress also said it would hold a national protest within the 21-day ultimatum issued to the federal government.

The NLC President, Ayubba Wabba, stated this yesterday, during a pre-May Day rally held in Abuja.

He said the 21-day ultimatum would be for the federal government to meet the demands of ASUU and the

three – university-based unions: Non-Academic Staff Union of Educational and Associated Institutions (NASU), Senior Staff Association of Nigeria Universities (SSANU) and National Association of Academic Technologists (NAAT).

The NLC president said: "Within the span of the subsisting 21-day ultimatum given by Congress, the NLC will hold national protests against the current strike action affecting students of Nigeria’s public universities and occasioned by government’s failure to honour agreement reached with trade unions in our universities.

"The protest is to draw the attention of government to the inherent catastrophe in the emerging culture of social

apartheid in our society especially as marked by prolonged lockout of students from working class and poor homes from our public universities while the children of the rich continue their academic pursuits uninterrupted.

"If at the end of the national protest and the 21-day ultimatum, the federal government still fails to resolve the industrial crises in Nigerian universities, the Congress would be left with no other option than to embark on a 3-day nationwide warning strike action in solidarity with our affiliates in the universities and with Nigerian students whose future and wellbeing are being robbed."

ASUU had on February 14,2022, announced a four-week roll-over strike following the inability of the

union and the federal government to reach a common ground on the demands of university lecturers.

Some of ASUU’s demands include the release of revitalisation funds for universities, implementation of the renegotiated 2009 FGN/ASUU agreement and the release of earned allowances for university lecturers.

Others are deployment of the University Transparency and Accountability Solution (UTAS) for the payment of salaries and allowances of university lecturers.

Following the expiration of the initial four weeks of the warning strike, ASUU went ahead to declare another eight weeks strike, saying it was giving the government more time to meet its demands.

FG to Assist Victims of Imo Refinery Explosion with Relief Materials

The federal government yesterday revealed that it would assist victims of last Friday fire explosion at the site of an illegal refinery in Abaezi, Ohaji- Egbema local government area of Imo State.

Minister of Humanitarian Affairs, Disaster Management and Social Development, Sadiya Umar-Farouq, who said this, also condoled with the government and people of state over the inferno which led to the death of no fewer than 110 persons.

She also conveyed federal government’s condolences in Owerri, during a visit to access the scene of the explosion and ascertain the level of damage.

Umar-Farouq, represented by the Director, Relief and Rehabilitation of the National Emergency Management Agency (NEMA), Mr. Alhassan Nuhu, said the government would assist victims of the disaster with relief material after due assessment of its impact.

She described the incident as preventable and cautioned against illegal activities so as to avert possible future recurrence.

The minister called on operators of the refinery to approach appropriate authorities to seek legal means of refining crude oil.

She also called on stakeholders and security agencies to collaborate with regulatory bodies in the oil and gas sector to nip the ugly trend in the bud.

"This visit is to condole with Imo people and access the extent of damage so as to ascertain the volume of relief for the victims.

"We implore increased collaboration with NEMA and security agencies to crackdown on illegal refineries and oil bunkering activities," she said.

Also speaking, the State Governor, Hope Uzodinma decried illegal bunkering activities in the area, saying that the incident affected both human and aquatic life.

IMF: FUEL SUBSIDY CAUSING DETERIORATION IN FISCAL BALANCE IN NIGERIA

The Washington-based institution stated this in its latest Regional Economic Outlook for Sub-Saharan Africa titled: "A New Shock and Little Room to Maneuver," released yesterday.

It stated: "Net commodity exporters can receive fiscal windfalls only if they contain subsidy expenditures. For example, some oil exporters provide expensive and generalised energy subsidies to the domestic population which could lead to a deterioration in fiscal balances despite the revenue increase associated with higher export prices in Nigeria.

"Therefore, removing generalised subsidies is crucial to ensure that the rise in commodity prices generates fiscal savings. It is then essential that these savings are directed largely to strengthening fiscal sustainability supported by strong governance frameworks, given the precarious conditions faced by many countries."

The fund reiterated that the country’s foreign exchange policy was weighing on its growth, distorting investment, encouraging rent seeking. It also noted uncertainties in the Nigerian economy.

The multilateral institution also pointed out that Nigeria’s growth was stronger than anticipated due to increase in manufacturing and agriculture.

"For countries with limited reserves, authorities have sometimes offered favorable rates, including to specific sectors. But the resulting parallel market for foreign exchange in Nigeria and Zimbabwe can weigh on growth distorting investment, encouraging rent seeking, and adding to uncertainty.

"The decision to return to a more unified framework is often difficult, but experience suggests that the shift to a market-clearing official rate is not in itself likely to lead to a sharp increase in inflation, as prices in the real economy tend to reflect the less-favorable parallel exchange rate; and removing exchange-market distortions can give a substantial boost to development, by reducing uncertainty and strengthening competitiveness.

"In this regard, the exchange reform implemented in South Sudan last year prompted a significant appreciation of the parallel market rate, helping to reduce inflation and insulating the country from rising global

food prices," it added.

The report further reiterated that Nigeria’s economic growth was expected to reach 3.4 percent in 2022, falling back to 2.9 per cent from 2024 onwards.

It added: "Nigeria’s growth outlook has improved through higher oil prices and a stronger-than-anticipated recovery of manufacturing and agriculture. Growth is expected to reach 3.4 percent in 2022, falling back to 2.9 percent from 2024 onwards.

"The outlook is subject to high uncertainty associated with oil prices and financial conditions. Moreover, low vaccination rates, rising security risks, and elevated price pressures weigh negatively on the medium-term growth outlook. Diversification away from oil will be critical to raise growth potential sustainably and reduce volatility."

On his part, the Director of the IMF’s African Department Abebe Aemro Selassie, while speaking on the report during a virtual media briefing at the ongoing IMF/World Bank spring meeting yesterday, noted that the recovery in sub-Saharan Africa picked up in the third quarter of 2021 and held up despite the onset of a fourth COVID-19 wave at the

end of the year.

He said Sub-Saharan Africa’s estimated growth in 2021 had been revised upward from 3.7 per cent to 4.5 per cent.

He said: "Higher oil prices may generate a windfall gain for the region’s 8 oil exporters. But for the other 37 countries, they will worsen trade imbalances and increase living costs.

"Indeed, over the past couple of months we have increased our inflation projections significantly lifting the regional average for 2022 by a full four percentage points, and representing the worst outcome since 2008.

"This year, eleven countries will face double digit inflation; almost all of these have flexible exchange rates, and almost half of these are fragile.

"For most countries, the new crisis comes at an extremely difficult time as the COVID-19 pandemic enters its third year, fiscal and international buffers are already under strain, and policy space is limited.

"Looking beyond the pandemic and current geopolitical tensions, creating jobs and meeting the Sustainable Development Goals will require strong, inclusive, and sustainable growth in sub-Saharan Africa."

TRAIN ATTACK: TERRORISTS RELEASE PHOTOGRAPH OF BABY DELIVERED IN CAPTIVITY BY ABDUCTED WOMAN

federal government cannot avert kidnapping and cannot rescue these people, what do you do?"

The terrorist group suspected to be Ansaru, a breakaway group from Boko Haram, THISDAY gathered, released the picture of the new baby seen yesterday, on Wednesday night.

ARISE News Channel and THISDAY had two days ago reported the birth of the new baby by the abductee in the terrorists’ den. A family member of the woman had first hinted that she had been delivered of her baby, although the identity of the new-born child was not disclosed until the terrorists released her picture.

Clad in a thick pink dress and a light lemon sweater cap, with her eyes closed, the baby looked healthy, with credible sources saying the terrorists invited a doctor to take the delivery of the infant.

Out of the 63 abducted train passengers that were under

captivity, only one passenger, Managing Director of the Bank of Agriculture (BOA), Alwan Hassan, has so far been released after, allegedly, paying a ransom of N100 million.

THISDAY reported on Tuesday that one of the two pregnant women among the passengers kidnapped during the attack by the terrorists had been delivered of her baby.

The state of the other pregnant woman was not known by yesterday.

The terrorists, who attacked and abducted the passengers, had earlier this week released four different pictures of their victims, numbering 62, with the group allegedly insisting that they were not after a ransom, but an exchange of the abducted passengers with their commanders, who were in government custody.

Minister of Information and Culture, Lai Mohammed, had at a recent media briefing revealed

that the federal government was working behind the scenes to secure the release of all the hostages currently languishing in captivity.

Nine persons, including a young medical doctor, were killed during the attack, with scores injured and over 60 passengers kidnapped.

Reliable sources said the terrorists appeared organised and coordinated because of the way they were able to get medical supplies into the forest, a development they described as still shocking to both government and security operatives.

Umar had on Wednesday appealed to the federal government to do more to secure the release of victims of the Kaduna train abduction. In a statement issued in Kaduna, Umar had said the pictures of the victims, which trended on the social media, was disturbing. He appealed to the international community, especially the

International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC), to assist in the negotiations with the terrorists to secure the release of the victims. He prayed God to touch the hearts of the kidnappers to show mercy on their innocent and vulnerable victims.

Umar had stated, "The pictures, to say the least, are most disturbing, particularly as they show exhausted and frightened women and children under the most harrowing conditions.

"I appeal to the federal government to do more to secure the immediate release of these innocent victims.

"I also appeal to the international community, particularly the International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC), to assist in the negotiations which will be needed to effect that release.

"May God touch the hearts of the kidnappers to show mercy on these innocent and vulnerable victims. Amen."

FG Puts Total Value of Nigeria's Gas Reserves at \$803.4trn

The federal government yesterday stated that Nigeria's 206 Trillion Cubic Feet (TCF) of gas is now valued at \$803.4 trillion.

But this was despite its inability to meet both local and international demand, with pressure recently increasing on the country after it failed to increase supply to Europe in spite of the continent's demand for more supply on the back of the Ukraine-Russia war.

Speaking at the 2022 Annual Public Lecture of the Nigerian Society of Engineers (NSE) Bwari Branch, Abuja, Minister of State, Petroleum, Mr. Timipre Sylva, insisted that the growth of Nigeria's gas reserves was a critical lever to achieving the

government's "Decade of Gas Initiative", aimed at transforming Nigeria to a gas-powered economy by 2030.

He admitted that government has a key role to play in energising the private sector to act so that Nigeria's economy can compete with the rest of the global economy, listing its three major priorities as security of supply, economic competitiveness, and a reduction of greenhouse gas emissions.

"At present, only gas can meet all three priorities simultaneously. This puts Nigeria with approximately 206.53 trillion cubic feet (TCF) of proven gas valued at over \$803.4 trillion and potential upside of 600TCF of gas, the most extensive in Africa, and in the top 10 globally.

"And luckily for Nigeria, the European Union has proposed labelling natural gas as a 'green energy' source, a development that could translate into huge economic value for Nigeria.

"The decade of gas is a decade of opportunities – ranging from a decade of elimination of gas flaring, a decade of more domestic Liquefied Petroleum Gas (LPG), a decade of fully gas-powered economy and natural gas," the minister said.

With the theme: "Inclusive Energy Transition: Key Issues, Investment Opportunities and Barriers Towards Achieving the Decades of Gas Initiative in Nigeria," the minister stated that Nigeria has made strong commitments to embrace the energy transition, pledging to significantly reduce its greenhouse gas emissions by 2060.

Sylva posited that Nigeria was following a transition pathway that combines technology, investment, business strategies, and government policy that will enable the country to transition from its current energy system to a low-carbon system with natural gas playing a pivotal role over

the next generation.

He noted that natural gas would play a critical and long-term role in achieving energy security and enhancing environmental outcomes for Nigerians as the global energy sector undergoes unprecedented change.

According to him, Nigeria was well positioned to pioneer future natural gas technology and compete in global markets that are constantly changing as it has huge natural gas reserves and a highly skilled workforce.

To make that happen, the minister noted that individual, corporate Nigeria and professional associations like the NSE as well as governments at all levels, must develop a new enlightenment, an energy literacy that includes a profound understanding that energy pervades all aspects of life.

He stated that engineering skills would be vital towards achieving the aspirations of many of the 17 Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) especially SDG7 that calls for "affordable, reliable, sustainable and modern energy for all" by 2030.

He urged engineers to

leverage on existing and widely deployed technologies and future developments including next-generation mobile broadband, the Internet of Things (IoT), artificial intelligence, 3D printing and others, to provide the tools for integrated solutions of the decade of gas.

"The NSE needs to lend its voice to the contributions of engineers in progressing the decade of gas initiative. Through its network of national and international engineering member institutions, the NSE should be able to contribute to the discourse on the role of engineering and engineers in the development of technologically and environmentally feasible solutions for Nigeria," he said.

He assured that the ministry of petroleum resources was ready to collaborate with the NSE on the decade of gas journey because engineering is about the knowledge and practice of solving problems.

"We need to partner in this journey to deal with the energy poverty in the country. We must find a way to unlock the natural gas potential of Nigeria and drag

millions of our people out of energy poverty.

"Markets alone will not drive the energy transition at a sufficient pace or scale to address the climate challenge from an investment standpoint," he contended.

Sylva insisted that Nigeria requires fossil fuels as its base-load energy source because only renewable energy as the sole pathway to energy transition is a source of concern for country and African countries that are still working to achieve industrialisation, address energy poverty and ensure reliable power supply.

According to him, the president's assent to the Petroleum Industry Bill (PIB) on August 16, 2021, has marked the end of decades of inaction, ambiguity, indecision, and under-investment in Nigeria's petroleum industry.

The minister reiterated the need for Africa to plan to establish an African Energy Bank (AEB) to address its own peculiar energy related crisis and take Africans out of the doldrums of energy poverty in line with SDG No 7.

CBN Sensitises Imo Citizens on its Development Finance Initiatives

The Central Bank of Nigeria (CBN) has continued to urge Imo State citizens and Nigerians in general to embrace its intervention programmes so as to promote financial, economic stabilisation and growth.

CBN's Director of Corporate Communications, Mr. Osita Nwanisiobi said this at the opening session of a two-day fair organised by the bank in Owerri, on Wednesday.

Nwanisiobi, who was represented by the Deputy Director, Corporate Communications Department, Mr. Sam Okogbue, said the intervention programmes were aimed at business emancipation and poverty reduction. Speaking on the theme: "Promoting Financial Stability and Economic Development," Nwanisiobi said the CBN had rolled out interventions in the agricultural, manufacturing and several other sectors.

He added that the CBN's Anchor Borrower's programme was the nation's saving grace for increased availability of rice during the lockdown that was occasioned by the COVID-19.

"During the COVID-19 pandemic, rice was the most single popular

component of our palliatives. This is a result of the CBN's Anchor Borrower's programme for rice farmers," he said.

He, however, decried Nigeria's over-dependence on importation, a factor which he said was responsible for the fall of the exchange rate of the naira.

He described the manufacturing sector as a life wire for economic development adding that, "no successful economy thrives on promotion of imported products over the exportation of locally manufactured products."

In her presentation, Mrs. Uchenna Onyene of the Currency Operations Department, CBN, called on Nigerians to handle the naira with care, in line with the provisions of Section 21, Sub-section 4 of the CBN Act 2007.

She urged Nigerians to embrace the CBN's cash-less policy so as to reduce risk and promote seamlessness of transactions adding that the bank was committed to ensure innovation in payments for better customer experience.

The sensitisation programme which was also held virtually with the participants in Awka, Anambra State had many bank customers in attendance.

Nigerian Breweries to Invest N56bn on Ama Brewery Expansion

The Nigerian Breweries Plc has disclosed plan to spend a total of N56 billion on the expansion of its Ama Brewery facility in Enugu State.

The company also said in 2021, it paid a total of N423.9 million to the Enugu State government in Pay-As-You-Earn (PAYE) taxes as well as a withholding tax of N5.68 million, making it the most consistent corporate tax payer in the state.

The Chairman of Nigerian Breweries Plc, Kolawole Jamodu, who made this known yesterday during the inauguration of the Ama Brewery Expansion Civil works said the impact of the expansion would lead to improved revenue and increased economic activities in the state.

Jamodu explained that the project would be executed in two phases, with the first phase to be completed in 2022, in full compliance with international environment and safety standards.

He noted that when completed, the brewery capacity would be boosted from three million hectoliters to 4.8 million hectoliters in the first phase and to 5.3 million hectoliters in the second phase.

He maintained that the company has 840 staff who contribute to the growth of the state via tax payments and other levies, adding that in 2021, it was awarded the most consistent corporate tax payer to the Enugu State government by the Enugu State Internal Revenue with payments

"We are expanding our business because we see ourselves playing

a major role in Nigeria's future," he said.

"We are also happy with the support we have received from the Enugu State government which has provided an enabling environment for our business to thrive over the years".

He thanked the state government for positioning itself as an investment hub, making it conducive for business.

He maintained that over the years, the company has invested hugely in health, education, sports development and community infrastructure in its host community which is part of its corporate social responsibility.

Speaking during the event, the Governor, Central Bank of Nigeria, Mr. Godwin Emefiele said the plant expansion would not have come at a better time than now

"We are committed to supporting measures by private sectors such as the NB towards improving the Nigerian economy.

"We call on the company to take advantage of the CBN's interventions for further expansion of other projects, beyond the Ama facility as we work to build an economy beyond the oil sector," he added.

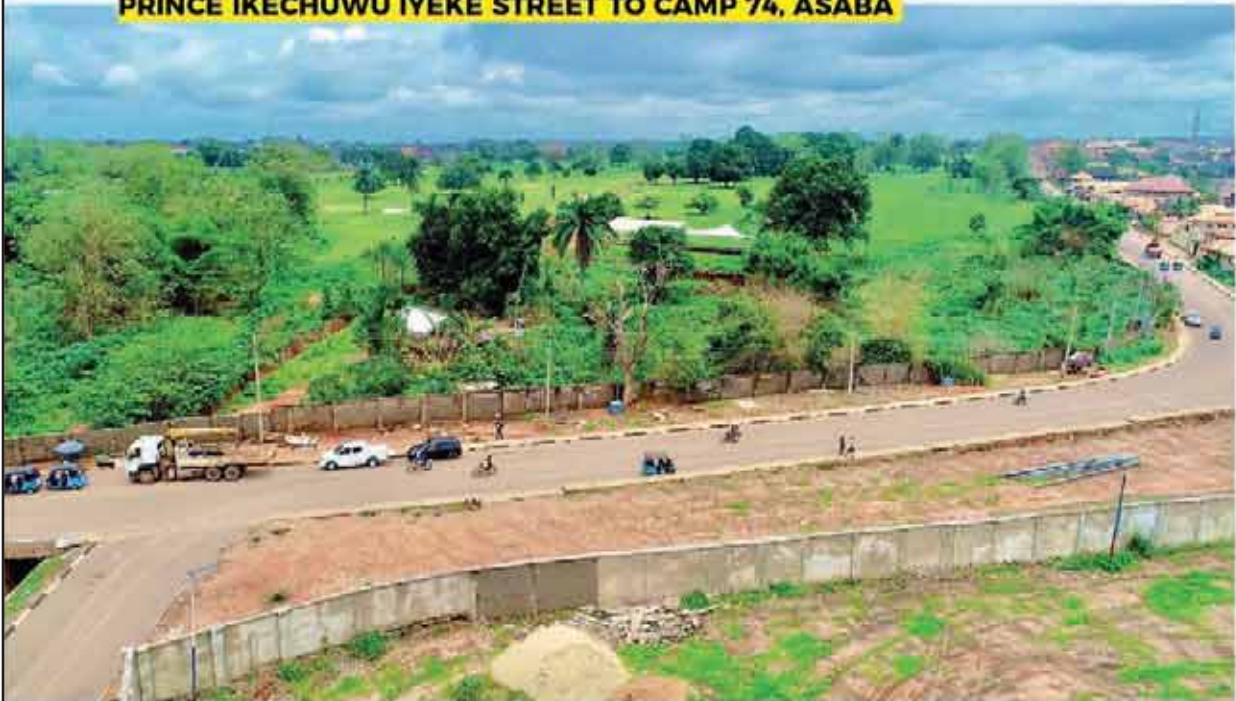

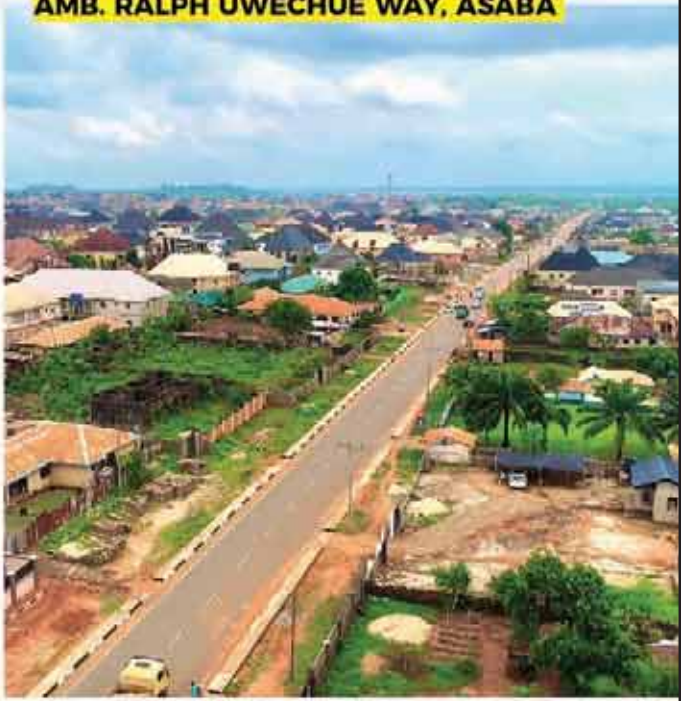

Elumelu: Anarchy Reigns where Hopelessness, Poverty Prevail

The Founder of Tony Elumelu Foundation (TEF), Mr. Tony Elumelu, has declared that it would be difficult for Africa to attain social and political stability in the midst of economic hopelessness, gender inequality and abject poverty because anarchy reigns where hopelessness prevailed.

Elumelu made the declaration yesterday at the United States Institute of Peace and the Heritage Foundation where he stated that what Africa needs is economic prosperity that would bring peace and reduce conflicts.

He said: "Lack of economic opportunities, poverty, joblessness and gender inequality are issues that create political instability. We cannot have political

stability if we do not address these fundamentals. So, it is a problem and we hope and pray that it stops there, and serves as wakeup call for political leaders to sit up and prioritise the young ones by addressing these social and economic problems so that prosperity, or at least a drastic reduction of poverty, will help to reduce instability."

Elumelu added: "I preach always that poverty anywhere is a threat to all of everywhere. We can't have stability if people are hungry. We cannot have stability if people are starving. We cannot have stability if there is no economic hope. People can endure and say okay that the way things are going, within three to five years things will be okay.

"But wherever there is

hopelessness, anarchy reigns. That is what we are seeing. So, the solutions are good governance, prioritisation of our people, especially the young ones in particular, and engaging with the private sector to increase its ability

to create jobs on the continent so that we can engage (employ) these people while making sure that we run an inclusive society that brings food to the table."

"That is the solution," he said. Elumelu, however, noted that

it is not the role of the private sector to mediate conflicts but to create jobs that would help to avert them.

According to him, "the private sector is not trained to be involved in conflict negotiation.

However, we can play a role to prevent it. For me, rather than dealing with consequences, we should be making sure that it does not happen in the first instance. And the private sector can play a role there."

Police Arrest Rivers Federal Lawmaker at PDP Secretariat

At at the time of filing this report, efforts to get the State Police Command react on the arrest proved abortive.



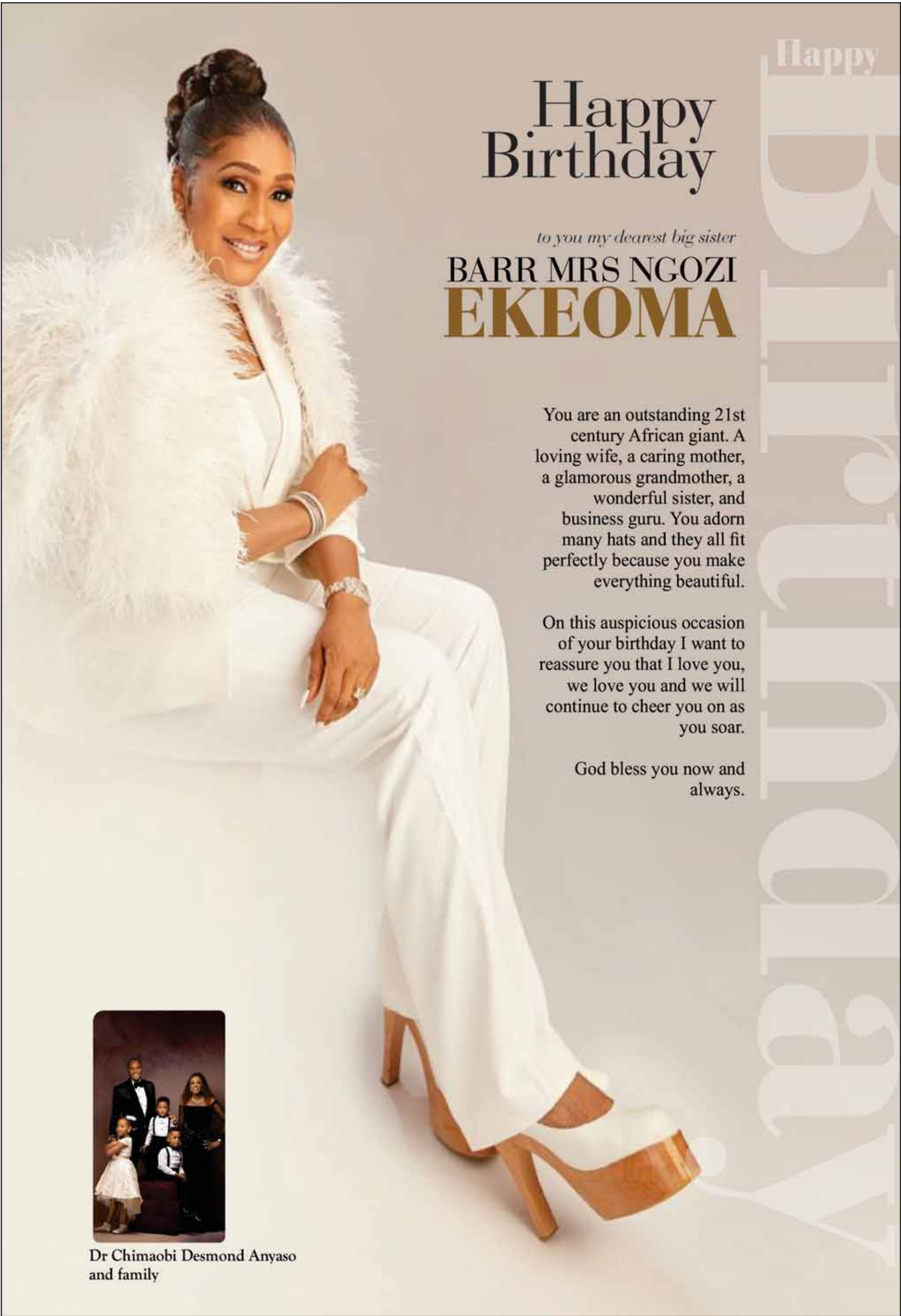

2023 Edo North Senatorial Race: Resisting Ethnic Champion Called Oshiomhole

Erasmus Ikhide argues that former Governor of Edo State, Adams Oshiomhole's aspiration to represent Edo North in the Senate may meet stiff opposition

At the moment, Edo North Senatorial sweepstakes is on the boil, courtesy of Mr. Adams Oshiomhole who chose to become a leader in Hell than to be a servant in Paradise. It's the way of primitive ethnic warlords who never imagined themselves to scale obscenity of abject poverty, recluse, and perilous scourge of retardation.

In 2011 for instance, the venerated Reverend Peter Obadan, a former Deputy Governor of Edo State pioneered a group in collaboration with other Owan and Akoko-Edo prominent politicians with a mandate to mirror Oshiomhole's lopsided political appointments in the state in favour of Etsako people. From the report, a total of 123 persons were appointed from Etsako, while 28 persons were appointed in the two Owans and Akoko-Edo Local Government Areas respectively, (68) sixty eight persons were appointed in Edo South with seven Local Government Areas and 42 were appointed from Edo Central, comprising five Local Government Areas.

Trust Oshiomhole's proclivities for cloak and dagger politics with a lethal sledgehammer, his ritualised gesture of obeisance and forced capitulation of people when he sensed that Reverend Obadan's Afenmai's renaissance movement will crumble his 2013 second term reelection bid.

Swiftly, he called on a few pliant Afenmai political leaders for a meeting in Government House where Mr. Agogundade, and others were in attendance. That was the last time the Afenmai group ever held their meeting after Oshiomhole band wad of cash around. Like kids, he deceived them, shot their eyes to the political reality of marginalisation – never to mention de-marginalisation – with the believe that the tactile evidence of irridentism and ethnic egoism will simply fade away! As a poor student of history, Oshiomhole believes that self-interest is the foundation of morality.

As he regressed into fighting for one third of his former position as Governor, the wheels come off the mobilizing vehicle. He's now confronted daringly with his ugly past of politics of exclusivism, outlandish bazaar of splashing dirty, illicit money to buy political support, without depths and ideological stand point.

Despite Oshiomhole's pretentious claimant to progressivism and appearances to the contrary, he's not different from the dubious and conservative phalanx he seeks to supplant. Apart from the fact that Senator Francis Alimikhen and Mr Oshiomhole come from the same Etsako axis, can anyone tell the difference between Senator Alimikhen and Mr Oshiomhole when it comes to ideological disparity? Can anyone ascribe rudimentary ideological or any intellectual attribution to Oshiomhole? What bills did Oshiomhole tell Afenmai and Nigerians in general that he will be sponsoring as a Senator?

Part of Oshiomhole's tragic and outdated politics is the underpinning blustering that foisted the serpentine betrayal and medieval



tyrant called Godwin Obaseki on Edo people as Governor. Oshiomhole is good at supplanting the best of us for the worst of us. The calculation and agreement he entered into with both Obaseki and Alimikhen, and a few of his political sons fell flat on his

face. Obaseki reneged on all the pacts he had with Oshiomhole; ditto Alimikhen whom Oshiomhole signed a deal with to rig out Prof Julius Ihonvbere in 2014 Senate primary election in the believe that Alimikhen will resign as Senator and hand over to him in 2016

as soon as his second term in office terminates as the Governor of Edo State.

Oshiomhole is the only 'Comrade' in history who assumes he attained stardom all by himself and tendenciously refused to build fortresses of Comrades around himself from the same constituency who will host the pragmatic banners of solidarity around him. It's rightly in my place to exorcise the unappeasable demon of self-annihilation from Oshiomhole in order to save him from himself.

It's time to sweep Oshiomhole off his feet before his horse of irreconcilable agenda bolted from the stable because he's driven by self-consuming personal ambition, treachery, perfidy and quicksand of ethnic dominance.

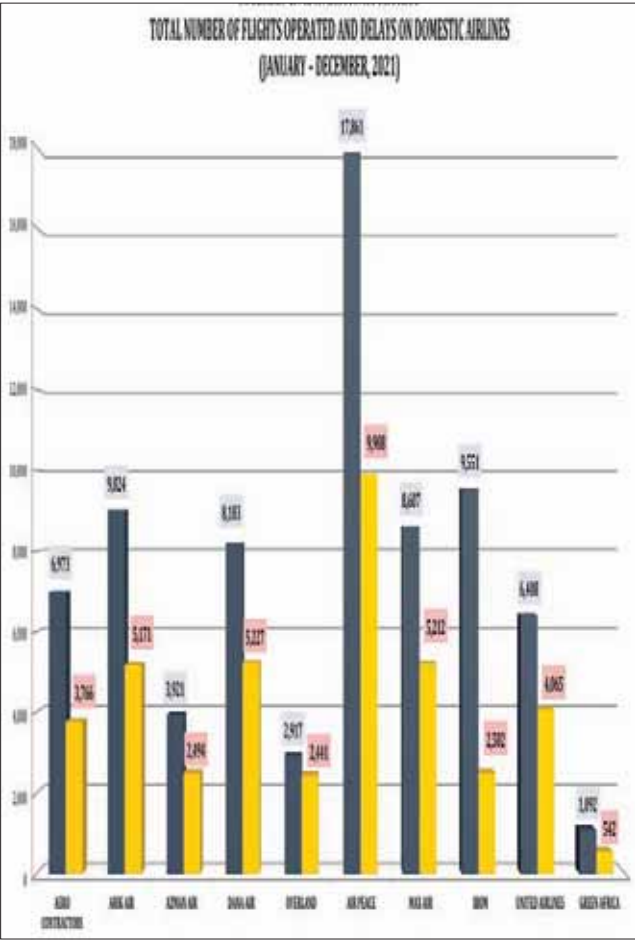

Excitement as Domestic Air Travel Picks Up after Passenger Traffic Slump

There are indications that air travel has picked up again as the low period of February and March, when airlines barely had full flight, is over, a development that has brought excitement among industry stakeholders.

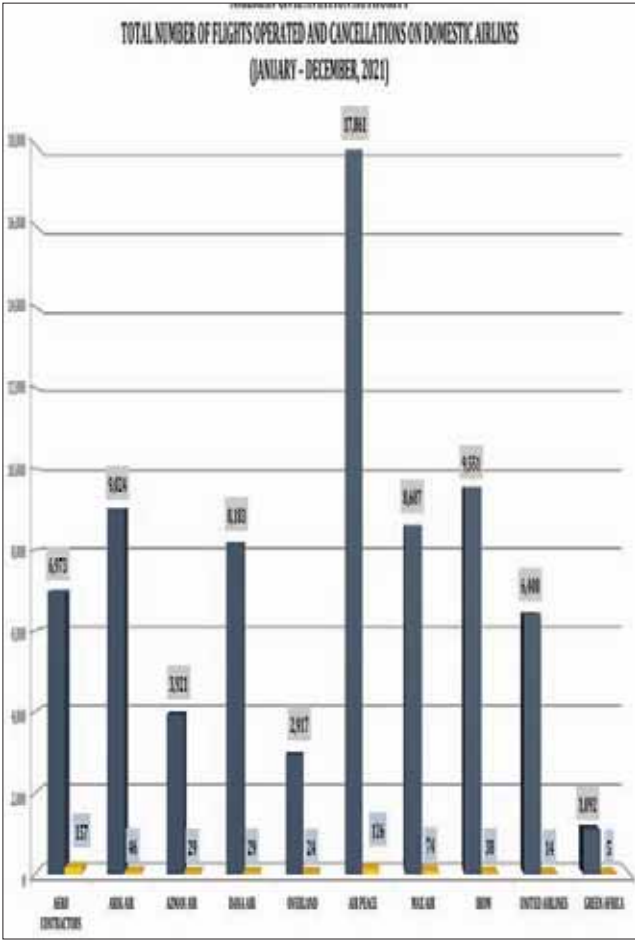
Airline operators attributed the improvement to the Easter holidays and the fact that many travellers who shunned the airports when airline increased base fare to N50, 000, have made a turnaround and have started travelling by air, as insecurity has

made road travel more precarious.

Head of Communication, Dana Air, Mr. Kingsley Ezenwa, told THISDAY that passenger traffic had improved, especially Abuja, Lagos and Eastern destinations, noting that the airline is attracting passengers with good service, its loyalty promos, which the airline made flexible for passengers.

With benchmark fare of N50, 000 per ticket, Ezenwa said that each airline brings in innovation and marketing strategy to attract more customers.

Green Africa, last week, introduced



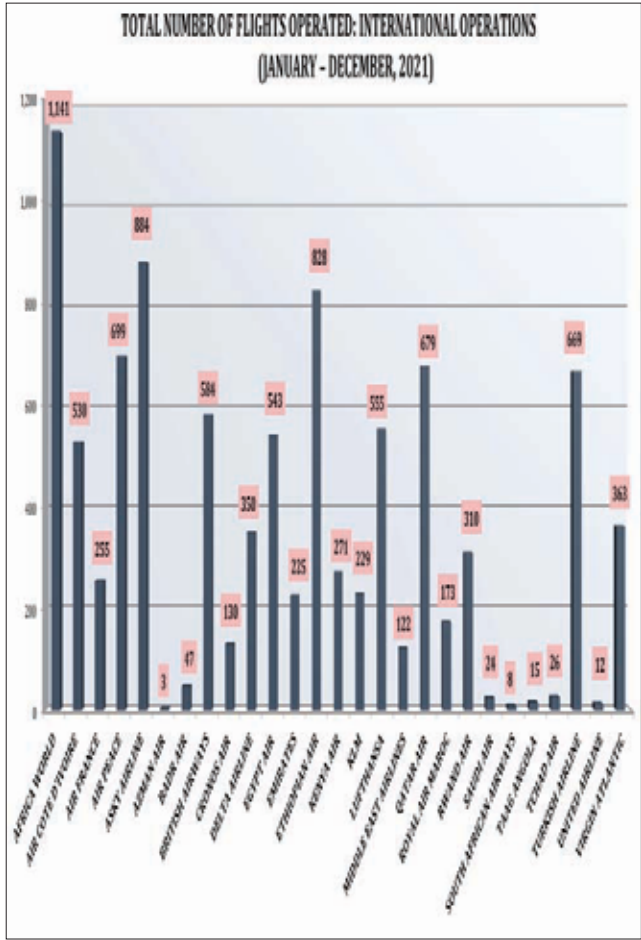
special fares for travellers in the season of Ramadan starting from N27, 500 only across all routes. It explained that these special fares would be available for bookings between April 20 and May 4, 2022 and travel between April 21 and June 30, 2022.

According to Ezenwa, "There is benchmark in fares but Easter was very good for us, but the improvement in passenger traffic has continued after Easter and even two weeks before Easter. People have seen the benefits of loyalty promos. We made it flexible for our customers;

that if you build up your loyalty you can even get a free ticket. But compared to last year, the traffic is yet to meet the figures of last year; it has not been spectacular.

"I must admit that traffic has been good before and after Easter. A month to Easter we were doing 80/90 per cent load factors and it has continued like that after Easter. In Dana Miles we give people bonuses, as member of our frequent flier programme and people are beginning to realise the benefits."

Ezenwa said many people shunned the airports after the



increase of base fare, but traffic bounced back almost immediately, but initially they took it like a shock; now the patronage has increased.

"People are getting more enlightened and that makes it easy. If you have approved point you can fly for less. So it is about strategy now; we have to apply strategy. Enlightenment and strategy," he further said.

In the same vein, Spokesman of Arik Air, Mr. Adebunji Ola, admitted that there is slight improvement in domestic air travel but noted that it is still below that of last year, the

same period.

He said Easter partly enabled the increase but Easter and Ramadan came at the same period and ironically during Ramadan people don't travel much.

"Yes, traffic has improved but not up to what we witnessed last year at the same period," Ola said.

Former Managing Director of the Nigerian Airspace Management Agency (NAMA) and the former CEO of Aero Contractors, Captain Ado Sanusi, told THISDAY that traffic

Finance Act 2020: Customs Agents Declares Duty, Levy on Motor Vehicles Illegal

Licensed customs agents in the country have called on the federal government to reverse the duty and levy on motor vehicles approved in the Finance Act of 2020.

In a petition to President Muhammadu Buhari, the agents said the duty contravenes the National Automotive Council

(NAC) levy of 15 per cent assessed on Motor Vehicles by Nigeria Customs Service (NCS).

National President of the National Council of Managing Directors of Licensed Customs Agents (NCMDLCA), the umbrella body of customs agents in Nigeria, Lucky Amiwero, in the petition said the amendment of the first Schedule to the Act is amended by inserting and replacing as the

case may be, "Duty on Tractors (Heading 8701) From 35 per cent to 5 per cent, duty on motor vehicles for the transportation of more than 10 persons (HS Heading 8702) From 35 per cent to 10 per cent, levy on motor Vehicles for transportation of persons (Cars) (HS Headings 8703) from 35 per cent to 5 per cent and duty for Motor vehicles for transportation of Goods (HS

Heading 8704) From 35 per cent to 10 per cent."

The Finance Act, they added, provides for 5 per cent levy for motor vehicles of Chapter 8703 (that is cars) adding, "there is no provision for NAC levy of 15 per cent in either 2020 and 2021 Finance Act passed by the National Assembly and signed in to law."

The agents added, "NAC

levy was not part of the 10 year implantation plan of (NAIDP) approved by the Federal Executive Council (FEC) on the 2nd of October 2013, which is expected to expires in 2023 and never being included in the process of duty assessment and levies.

"Under the National Automotive Design and Development council (NADDCC) Act Section subsection 1-(a) specifies 2 per cent as

collection and not part of the Finance Act 2020 and 2021, which was referred in the circular by Nigeria Customs Service.

"But with the collapse of the auto policy in 2021 and the removal of the protective regime of duties and levies, there is the needs for a total reviews to ascertain the possible shut fall within the seven years of the implementation of the auto policy."

Items presented to the homes included rice, beans, noodles, spaghetti, beverage, detergents and bed sheets.

The airline’s Head of Corporate Communications, Adebajani Ola who led the team on the visits noted that the company has always supported the less privileged in the society and chose the Easter period to make the donations because of the significance of the period.

At the Uyiosa Orphanage Home, Benin City, Mrs. Usenbor Elizabeth who received the items thanked the management of Arik Air for the gesture stating that it was very rare to have such donation coming from an organization at this time when the country’s economy is not so healthy.

Speaking on the purpose of the donations, Arik Air’s Chief Executive Officer, Captain Roy Ilegbodu said: “We attach a lot of importance to CSR activities in our organization and we believe it is one of the best ways to connect with our communities. We will continue to identify with the less privileged in society to make life better for all”.

EXCITEMENT AS DOMESTIC AIR TRAVEL PICKS UP AFTER PASSENGER TRAFFIC SLUMP

has started picking up, remarking that this was expected because this is a political period, which demands a lot of travel and others are travelling for business, noting that government would release funds for the second quarter and that would trigger a flurry of economic activities.

However, Sanusi said airlines were finding it difficult paying for the leased aircraft because although they are making money, they earn their revenue in Naira, while they pay for the lease in dollars.

“Airlines are making money but you are selling your ticket in Naira but lease rate is in dollars. This has made lessors to be jittery because they fear airlines might not be able to pay for the lease, knowing that it is difficult to source dollars and the fear is heightened when they learn about foreign airlines’ blocked funds, which is about \$300 million now. So lessors have started weighing the country risk.

“Until we tackle the problem of foreign exchange in the aviation sector, we will continue to have challenges. Without tackling this problem, development and progress of the aviation sector will continue to be hampered; whether you flow a national carrier or you bring Emirates or Qatar to operate in the domestic market, they will still face the same problem, the development in the sector will still be stifled. Leasing aircraft, buying spares, buying insurance are done with foreign exchange; it is only manpower that is settled with local currency,” Sanusi said.

Some Nigerian carriers have been finding it difficult to pay for their leased aircraft, which they acquired to increase capacity for the high passenger demand during the Christmas season.

The financiers of some of these leased aircraft are finding it difficult to pay the expected rates, so they are taking the aircraft from airlines that are unable to pay for the lease as they did with Aero recently when one of such aircraft was taken from the airline.

The Managing Director of Aero Contractors, Captain Abdullahi Mahmood, told THISDAY that some of the leased aircraft came at high rates and with a slump in passenger traffic, some airlines could not cope paying for it.

“When an airline leases an aircraft, it pays for the agreed hourly utilisation of the aircraft, which can be some hours per month. You pay for the minimum agreed hours, irrespective of whether you use up to the agreed hours or not. Utilisation is usually calculated in block hours not in flight hours. Block hours mean from the time when the engine starts to when it goes off and flight hours means from take-off to landing.

“One of the reasons why Aero was unable to continue paying for the aircraft is that there is a slump in passenger traffic, yet, you are paying for the lease of the aircraft at the rate of \$3,000 per block hour. By the time you make payments for the lease, you would realise that there is nothing left,” Mahmood said.

As Travellers Lament Poor Air Conditioning at Lagos Airport

In what seems to have become a perennial problem, air travellers have thumbed down the poor facilities at the international wing of the Murtala Muhammed Airport, now known as old terminal.

Those who travelled through the terminal in the last two weeks have severely complained about the poor cooling system, forcing some passengers to remove their clothes while going through the check in process at the airport terminal.

Over the years the facility has been known for power hiccups, which plunges the whole terminal into darkness even at most critical period in the night when most of the international airlines are processing their passengers.

THISDAY gathered that airlines have secured recharge lamps always waiting for the inevitable power outage and even officials of the Federal Airports Authority of Nigeria (FAAN) have acquired rechargeable fans to augment when there is outage. But such auxiliary support cannot replace the needed air conditioning system that ought to be at the airport.

An official of FAAN whose office is at the international wing of the airport, told THISDAY that almost every year new air conditioners are procured but they break down too often because contractors awarded the procurement contract usually buy “inferior ones that cannot stand the rigour of serving the terminal for 24 hours, so they break down too often.”

When THISDAY visited the terminal, many passengers on the queue to check-in were fanning themselves with anything they could lay their hands on. The handling company officials were using support fan tucked at corners in the counters. A Nigerian Customs official told THISDAY that it was not because there was no air conditioning, but that the heat was too much and remarked that FAAN could have envisaged the heat at this period and fortified the air conditioning system at departures.

At the public affairs department of FAAN, one of the officials told THISDAY that the heat was too much because of prevalent hot weather, noting that even at individual homes, people find the heat unbearable; that sometimes “air condition and fan blows hot air.

“We will continue to upgrade our equipment. This is heat period that even when you put A/C in your place it brings hot air at some time,” the official said.

The FAAN officials confirmed that there was no plan to move all the operations to the terminal because there are a lot to be done in the new facility before it could provide comprehensive service, which include expanding the ramp. Currently only airlines with small body (single isle) aircraft that can facilitate passengers from the new terminal and that is why the big carriers still use the old terminal.

“I have been travelling through this airport for years and the air conditioning has remained inefficient. I recall a time I travelled from here and the air condition was working very well. We commended those managing the airport and hoped that they would continue to maintain that level of efficiency. But you know Nigerian government thing, good things don’t last and here we are still complaining of the same thing,” the passenger who craved anonymity, said.

However, the General Manager, Public Affairs, FAAN, Mrs. Faithful Hope-Ivbaze, told THISDAY that work has started to revamp the air condition system.

“I understand that work has started to reinforce the air conditioning. We hope that the problem will be solved soon,” she said, adding that moving to the new terminal would be a gradual process.

THISDAY investigation revealed that the old terminal is characterised by myriads of problems, which include the absence of charging pots, no enough seats, no efficient wifi and the most challenging problem besides poor air conditioning is the dilapidated baggage conveyor belt (carousel).

THISDAY also learnt that the baggage conveyor belt is not working. It breaks down after every two days. Recently passengers waited for a long time before they could collect their baggage and there were times baggage handlers had resorted to manual movement of the bags from the aircraft to arrivals, which was cumbersome.

Recently industry expert and Managing Director of Flights and Logistics Solutions Limited, Amos Akpan, told THISDAY that infrastructure facilities at the Lagos airport are bad, noting that the airport is not passenger friendly.

He observed that having a functional airport indicates that passengers would feel comfortable while in the terminal and that many things one could find at major airports in Africa or elsewhere are lacking at the airport.

“If you watch the video of how passengers’ bags are thrown about by handling company workers, you will agree with me that the airport is not passenger friendly. The checking in system is bad. The infrastructure is totally bad. Airports are built for the comfort of passengers, their luggage, cargo and for airlines. Any airport that does not meet this requirement is not worthy to be an airport. So after safety the next is customer comfort. How comfortable are the passengers? The Lagos airport is not friendly.

“It is only those that enter VIP lounge that have some comfort so the airport is segregating passenger comfort for a class of passengers. Ideally avio-bridges should have maintenance calendar but here they have to breakdown down before you think of replacing or rehabilitating them. FAAN is still concentrating on kinetic for aviation security when other airports are concentrating on bio-data, profiling and technology. They are talking of giving guns to aviation security personnel,” Akpan said.

Esezobor: NBC is Deliberate About Developing its People, Creating Opportunities

People & Culture Director, Nigerian Bottling Company (NBC) Limited, Juliana Esezobor, in this interview with **Eromosele Abiodun** speaks about the guiding principles that drive the culture at NBC, its diversity and inclusion policy and NBC’s role as a major provider of employment in the private sector

Tell us about yourself and the career journey, which has led you to NBC?

I started my career as an engineer and had a first foray into the workplace when I interned at NBC in my fourth year in university, this was about twenty-four years ago. My experience in NBC then as a teenager helped me decide the path I wanted to follow. I decided to pursue another path even though I had a background in engineering.

My career has been quite colourful. Colourful in that, yes, I have worked in HR, but I have also held several non-HR roles. I have had the privilege of having a high-level view to business, working as a consultant, a strategist, a program director and building and running a business. I have been involved in several strategic projects, providing executive support across various industries in Nigeria across both the private and public sector.

What sold NBC to you and what was your first impression on joining the organisation?

As I said, my first real work experience was at NBC, as part of the internship program that engineering students needed to go through. This experience widened my worldview as I got to see how the iconic Coca-Cola brand which is loved by many (myself included), is made. I got to see how the business operates, which made a strong first impression on me several years ago. Upon the completion of my university course, even though I worked elsewhere, I am proud to state that my first impression of the company which stayed with me through my career for many years, is what led me back to the company in 2022.

Another fact is that when you look at Nigeria and businesses that have thrived since I was a little child and perhaps before my parents, NBC would come on the radar. It is very commendable for a business to have stood the test of time, continued to thrive, and add value not just to consumers alone but to the country at large. Also, I considered the core ethos of the business – and part of what made me fall in love was the emphasis on diversity, the emphasis on women and the fact that as a business, NBC is going out of its way to create opportunities and platforms for women to thrive. You would agree with me that there are very few organisations in Nigeria that are this deliberate when it comes to diversity and inclusion.

NBC is deliberate about its people, it is deliberate about its women, as well as all its stakeholders. NBC has been at the forefront of empowerment campaigns geared towards women because we understand the exigency of not leaving them out of the value chain, as they remain key contributors to success. This is why over the course of our operations in 70 years, the organization has continued to roll out impactful initiatives to enrich the lives of women in Nigeria. When you look at the business, this is totally in its orientation; we don’t only say it, we actually do the things that we say and for me, that is critical.

You talked about diversity and inclusion; many forward-thinking organizations are pushing more for this. Can you talk more about what this means for your organization and for you as the People and Culture Director?

I completed my MSC a few years ago and one of the projects that I undertook involved in-depth research on the value of diversity in boards and management; research has proven that any organisation that has a diverse board or management has the advantage of being more productive, more innovative and of creating products and services that are more in tune with the needs of their stakeholders.

Diversity is extremely valuable, and it is something that NBC has realised – as a company whose customer base is made up of a significant number of women. For example, in my family I’m the one who shops for all our household items. Thus, it makes absolute sense to create platforms and opportunities for women to have visibility. For us, building an enterprise that is frontline when it comes to female visibility is critical. In fact, as a Group, we have a target to increase the number of female managers in CCHBC by 2025, till we have 50%-50% representation. We see very good opportunities to close this gap in Nigeria and are implementing initiatives to do so.

However, what we do in the area of diversity is beyond just having female inclusivity. It means that as an organisation we are open, we create equal employment opportunities irrespective of your religion or background. We are a very family focused organisation; we cater to men and women. What we are interested in is having the best people, the people who are passionate, are committed to their future and to their work.

Looking at overall diversity, why is it important? Well, at the end of the day we need to have a full view of the stakeholders that we are ultimately serving, who are those that are the decision makers and influencers concerning what we sell and the type of impact we want to make. We know that with the right passion and

commitment, diversity brings unmatched value to the business and that’s what we’re all about.

You talked about attracting committed people. NBC is recognized as a major provider of employment in the private sector. Can you give an insight into the size, spread and importance of NBC as a top employer?

I would like to take these from a completely different perspective so that we have a sense of what impact this business makes in the society. As you know we are in the business of being the 24/7 beverage partner for the nation. Whatever the occasion, we want to be a partner for good. So, who are these stakeholders that enable the realization of this vision? We have our customers, distributors, large and small-scale service providers, teams of business developers and our suppliers. We see this as the ecosystem that we support and that is how far we go in terms of contributing to employment in Nigeria. For example, in 2019, about 58,000 jobs were created across our value chain.

As a business our full-time employees number almost three thousand. And beyond this, we have thousands of partner employees that work with us. There are the mom-and-pop shops, the small, medium and large-scale enterprises that we support that also speak for themselves in terms of numbers. You may know also that our factories are spread across eight locations in Nigeria, and we have 14 depots in even more locations.

On joining the business, I was really pleasantly surprised at the scale. Having worked for several years as a consultant for different businesses I can tell you that very few businesses have this footprint in terms of the number of people we hire or the number of people we empower on a monthly basis in terms of business opportunities.

What are the guiding principles that drive the culture at NBC?

You can classify those principles into three. Number one is why do we exist? We exist as a business ultimately to support our customers and that is why our vision speaks about being the leading 24/7 beverage partner. It is about partnership with our customers and with all the stakeholders that I have mentioned including the government. When you look at our sustainability blueprint, it reveals a consciousness that we have a responsibility to our community and are willing to work with the government to create an environment conducive for collective growth.

The second thing is how do we work? We see ourselves as an organization that is focused on integrity and doing the right thing. We pride ourselves on being learning-focused. Hence, we provide opportunities and platforms for our people to learn, to add value for themselves. We provide platforms for employees to learn and acquire knowledge on an ongoing basis, and we support them in using different platforms and models.

Collaboration is also critical for us, we see ourselves as one big family, as a very strong force working together to deliver; and we drive this collaboration across the various spheres of

the organization. Needless to say, that whatever we do we believe in doing it extremely well, so excellence is a core part of our culture.

Lastly and by no means the least is our emphasis on nurturing our people. At the end of the day, our people are the most critical assets that we have. They are extremely important. If I don’t have an engaged Business Developer or sales force, I cannot sell. If I don’t have an engaged technician I can’t produce. So, for us it is about creating that environment where people feel safe, heard and empowered and where they know that they have a future. It will interest you to know that in this organization, we have people that have been here for thirty years. They grew through the ranks and some of them are in leadership positions. Very few organizations can boast of this, but we have them and they intend to remain and retire from here.

There are ongoing issues and conversations surrounding the need to retain talent because often times people who have been heavily invested in by a company jump ship. According to a recent report by Korn Ferry, a global organizational consulting firm, by 2030, 85 million jobs could go unfilled globally due to the lack of skill to fill those positions. How is NBC preparing for this possible future, and still managing to build winning teams while retaining strong talents across its operations?

This is a reality, it’s true. We know that many skills are going out of fashion quickly and as they do, new skills are required on an ongoing basis. As a business we try to focus on data and leverage analytics. We are clear in our minds on what the next set of skills are, and we have plans to ensure that those anticipated skill sets are addressed in our learning and development system to ensure that we are positioned to bridge the gap. For example, we now have a fully functional, world class Sales Academy as well as a Supply Chain Academy to equip our people for the future. So, what is important is to anticipate what is coming and having very clear plans to ensure that our people are ready for the transformation long before it happens.

According to Gallup, just 33 percent of American workers are engaged by their jobs. Fifty-two percent say they’re “just showing up,” and 17 percent describe themselves as “actively disengaged”. What advice do you have for variously sized organizations to mitigate against a disengaged workforce?

So let me start by saying that our engagement scores are over 90%; and this means that we are doing a number of things right.

Engagement is a deliberate effort; it does not happen overnight. You need to be aware of the elements that drive engagement, what are those things that are peculiar to my sector? How do I ensure that on an ongoing basis, I am feeling the pulse of the people and as people give me feedback on what they want and what needs to change, am I consciously addressing those things? Am I keeping my word? Am I bringing the improvement they seek? Am I creating a trustworthy environment where people can talk to me? Before I come, can I encourage people to proactively share relevant information that the business requires? And those are some of the things that we’ve done as an organization.

Statistics suggest that engagement is a function of creating a psychologically safe environment. Can your people speak up? Are there avenues where they can share information without feeling that somebody is going to take advantage of them or that there are going to be consequences. For us as an organization we have speak up channels and governance programs where we encourage our people to share their views and listen to them.

If would interest you that in this organization, we have fortnightly webinars where the entire management team connects with the thousands of employees, and they have opportunities to ask questions or share their observations and we take their feedback seriously. We take the webinars beyond the business to even functional levels and function heads engage their people; feedback is directed to the relevant team and they are acted upon. Another factor that drives engagement is around growth opportunities. People would stay not just because of the money but because they feel that they have a future. Do your people feel they have a future? Is there progress they can look up to? Are there opportunities for them to learn new skills? I am happy to say that we provide these types of opportunities for our people. In this organisation you can have somebody moving

from HR and going into sales. You can have someone moving from sales to procurement. We have created opportunities where, depending on what your interests are, what your talent is and how you have developed yourself, you can actually create your own path and you are encouraged to do that.

The next thing is around the value proposition beyond the obvious compensation and promotion. It is providing an intrinsic reward system. By intrinsic, I mean those things that money cannot buy, those things that differentiate us from any other businesses. You asked me about those things that made me look at NBC. First of all, if my experience as a teenager was not right, I wouldn’t even think about coming back to this organization. So, I had the very best experience as a teenager. So, for example we believe in volunteering, we believe in enabling our employees to add value, to do good.

Our drive around sustainability is mostly from our employee base, coming up with ideas and innovations for us to help the environment move forward. You have things like a strong culture and value system that resonates across board. In coming back, I see my personal value system is very closely aligned with the organisation’s. So, when you give all these to people and they are able to wake up with joy every day, the engagement level will be high.

Following the pandemic and rapid changes shaping our world today, how do you see the role of HR changing in the future, and how can organisations begin to embrace that shift?

Some will agree that part of HR’s role is to be a bit more predictive in terms of how the future is going to evolve. Long before COVID, there was a lot of propositions about the future of work and what COVID-19 did was accelerate that. With that acceleration came the realization that brick-and-mortar is not always the answer. Business models are shifting and changing. Today, businesses are looking at the digital space and how to use it to sell, do you need to have vehicles and move all over the place when you can have a different channel or system? Thus, what this is bringing about is first, a different way of thinking, which is then enabled by a different way of working. As a business for example we are quite flexible. We realise that some people are doing their very best job despite not being in the office. Productivity level is going up. You are able to manage by objectives and you are getting what you need plus the advantage of less stress, less time spent commuting.

However, it’s important to also realize the need to balance this new model of work. One factor to consider in balancing this is the question of how to drive team cohesion. As a business we realize flexibility is important and we enable it, but we also ensure that our teams have routines that enable them to be cohesive. One of our values is performing as one and we are very deliberate about that.

The reality is HR needs to be a bit more predictive, we need to understand the trends and we need to be in a position where we can support our businesses contextually. What do I mean by contextually? A consulting business can afford to have all of his employees to operate remotely, a manufacturing business cannot do that. The reality is that you need to still have human beings in the plant working. However, we can seek ways to build in some flexibility around how that work is done.

What aspects of working with NBC and the organization as a whole are you most proud of?

One is the fact that the business is deliberate about developing its people and creating opportunities. Part of what we’re doing is to ensure that we promote as many people internally as possible. Some other organizations will prefer to go outside but for us our first recourse is - let’s create opportunities for people internally. That’s why you have people who have been here for thirty years. They started on the factory floor and today they are leading teams because this business gave them that opportunity. In this business they went to school and sharpened their skills. Some of them are plant managers because they’ve grown within the system and the system enabled it. That for me is loyalty towards your people and being there for them and it’s really important.

What advice do you have for young women who aspire to reach the top of their fields like you have done?

Based on my own experience there is no glass ceiling. I mean sometimes we think there is, but there are no glass ceilings. The thing that can limit us as women is the belief that we cannot achieve big goals. You need to firstly believe that you can.

Stakeholders' conversation with editors emphasises the need for persistent advocacy, writes **BOLAJI ADEBIYI**



ENLISTING MEDIA SUPPORT FOR LOCAL GOVERNMENT AUTONOMY

The table was actually not round at the media executives' roundtable organised on Thursday by the Partnership to Engage, Reform and Learn, a non-governmental organisation that supports how governments organize their core business of making, implementing, tracking and accounting for policies, plans and budgets used in delivering public goods and services to the citizenry, and how citizens themselves engage with these processes.

Organised in collaboration with another NGO, Democracy Vanguard, with the support of the UK's Foreign, Commonwealth and Development Office, it was to provide a platform for key leaders in the media to reflect on contemporary governance challenges and reforms in the country, especially at the subnational level.

Proceeding from the theme, "Enhancing Governance and Service Delivery at the Subnational Level: Leveraging on the ongoing Constitution Amendment Exercise," the organisers highlighted the key bills that survived the fifth alterations to the 1999 Constitution as altered at the National Assembly and wanted to know how the media could help to project them for passage by the state Houses of Assembly.

After some false starts, the National Assembly had eventually passed 44 of the 68 bills intended to alter the provisions of the constitution that inhibit service delivery at the subnational level, particularly at the local councils. Of more interest are those bills that would strengthen local government administration by enhancing and deepening its administrative and financial independence.

The significance of local administration as a catalyst for the rapid and wholesome development of the nation has always been known. Indeed not a few development experts have argued that given its nearness to the larger population of Nigerians, any talk of concrete growth and development without reforming the councils for greater efficiency in service delivery would be a loose one.

In spite of this general awareness of the positive potential of the councils, the states have continued to undermine them, usurping not only their constitutionally guaranteed responsibilities but also arresting the finances that could have been used by them for service delivery. When the states are not refusing to hold elections into the councils as mandated by the constitution, they are busy dissolving the few ones that have been democratically elected.

Concerned by the destructive arbitrariness of the states, the federal government tried to restore sanity through President Muhammadu Buhari's

Executive Order 10 of 2020, which sort to assert the authority of the constitution by instructing the Accountant-General of the Federation to ensure that the council's share of the Federation Account gets to them directly. Unfortunately, the Supreme Court upon a suit filed by the states struck down the executive order as unconstitutional.

In an obvious response to this judicial strengthening of states arbitrariness and popular clamour for council autonomy, the federal legislature in its fifth alteration to the constitution passed two bills to remedy the situation. Bill No 1 is An Act to alter the CFRN, 1999 to abrogate the State Joint Local Government Accounts and Provide for a special account into which shall be paid all allocations due to Local Government Councils from the Federation Account and from the Government of the State and for related matters. It altered Section 162 and related clauses, which provided for the joint account that the states had used to strangle the councils and made fresh provisions to grant them financial independence.

Bill No 2, An Act to alter the provisions of the CFRN, 1999 to establish Local Government Councils as a tier of government and guarantee their democratic existence, tenure; and related matters, alters Section 7 and makes it clearer in its intention to enshrine democracy at the tier. It insulates the councils from the overbearing control of the states by guaranteeing their tenure and making explicit their functions.

The two bills along with the 42 others

have now been sent to the state Houses of Assembly for passage. To pass, 24 of the 36 houses have to approve them to meet the threshold. The challenge now is the opposition of the state governors who have a stranglehold on the assemblies and may bully them to decline concurrence.

This is why PERI and its allies have turned to the media, asking what it could do to rein in the recalcitrant and essentially not-fit-for purpose governors who are bent on derailing the alterations at the state level. The call for help from that quarter makes sense given the historical impact of the media on public policy formulation and implementation in the country. This much was made clear by Soni Irabor, media icon and communication guru, who, despite just recovering from ill-health, still delivered a well-researched keynote address, which specified the role of the media in the matter as holding the governors to account by persistently highlighting the bills as substantial palliatives to the serious governance issues of the moment.

The challenge to the execution of this mandate, as Reuben Abati, another media guru and public policy analyst, puts it, however, is the timing of the consideration of the bills, which falls within the 2023 electioneering period. Not only would the politicians be busy with politicking, the media would also be preoccupied with the coverage of the campaigns. So, what is to be done?

Editors in the hall after receiving insights from an array of experts gave useful pieces of advice, principal among which is that stakeholders would have to keep the issues alive by sustaining the conversations around concrete activities, including monitoring the assemblies' consideration of the bills for active media coverage.

Overall, it was a useful conversation, which laid bare the significant milestones of the fifth alteration and the challenges ahead that the media needs to help tackle in the belief that everyone stands to gain from its successful outcome.

It is also important that the point was made and understood that the media on its own could do nothing unless the stakeholders generate the activities and the content for it to use to agitate the minds of the public for the necessary support for the desired outcome. A point appreciated by NERL's Adiya Ode, who promised to keep the conversation alive through further engagements with the media.

In spite of this general awareness of the positive potential of the councils, the states have continued to undermine them, usurping not only their constitutionally guaranteed responsibilities but also arresting the finances that could have been used by them for service delivery

NNAMANI AND APC'S SEARCH FOR A STATESMAN

Deep down, as the world evolves, Nigeria is confronting several layers of challenges that only a statesman is capable of providing practical answers; by diagnosing the problems first not through perception and political idiosyncrasy but by strategic critical thinking. One (a candidate) that has been sharpened through past leadership roles and reliable records in defence of democracy. Such should be a candidate within the mould of a democrat, statesman and who also understands the urgency of a market economy that pans to both the states and the needs of the have-nots.

Perception proceeds reality. More often than not, it creates our reality. For many people in the society we live in, the perception of politicians borders on everything negative the mind can conjure. Sometimes too extreme and unjust, the behaviours of a vast majority of our so-called ruling class have made this universal judgement a fair one. I for one, understand the power of perception and frankly my thoughts about politicians, especially in Africa, isn't far from the general belief. Self-centered, cunning, deceitful, unpatriotic. Politics is a serious business in Nigeria, writes

THE BUSINESS OF POLITICS

The April 20, 2022, announcement of the costs of expression of interest and nomination forms for the 2023 general elections by President Buhari's All Progressives Congress (APC) sparked widespread backlash from citizens and groups.

Afenifere, the pan-Yoruba socio-cultural and political pressure group, described it as the height of political insensitivity and an open invitation to thievery. The Human Rights Writers Association of Nigeria (HURIWAN) advised that anyone who purchased the forms at such 'scandalous amounts' should be arrested and handed over to the police or anti-graft agencies for investigation into the source of their money.

Even the state-owned broadcaster, Federal Radio Corporation of Nigeria (FRCN), widely seen as the official mouthpiece of the APC controlled federal government, would go against the grain on this occasion. The station,

But he was immediately trolled and lampooned by others, apparently, young Nigerians. Some of the tweets went as follows: "You go still do abi you no go do again?" "But on a serious note, how could this man declare to run for presidency under a party while he's yet to know the form's price? Just vibe. This shows he's not even serious with his ambition. I even doubt he's a registered APC member." "Adamu, kindly contest for Whatsapp admin. It is not very expensive."

Those who did not know that politics is a serious business in Nigeria should now have a rethink; do a deep soul searching. You think those big politicians in Abuja and our state capitals who labour day and night, sweating, sacrificing and even getting high blood pressure in the process are doing easy work? If you thought so, better have a rethink.

Did Adamu Garba think that because



in a stinging rebuke of Nigeria's political class, especially the ruling APC, carried an in-house commentary on April 23 in which it described the presidential system as "bogus and expensive."

While decrying the fact that the APC pegged the cost of its presidential nomination forms at "a whopping N100 million," the editorial expressed the fear that aspirants who finally win elections under such circumstances would "become corrupt in order to recoup their money." As a result, "Public service for common good of citizens will suffer as the preoccupation of the elected will be on how to get their money back with interest."

The broadcaster noted that the exorbitant costs of nomination forms and maintaining the National Assembly were among the factors making public spending on governance an unbearable drain on the nation's dwindling economy. "It has now become clear that the nation may not sustain this political jamboree [in the National Assembly] while the people they so represent continue to wallow in inexplicable squalor and denial," FRCN maintained.

Therefore, the National Assembly should be reduced to only one chamber, with members working part-time. On the whole, cutting down the cost of governance must begin with reducing the costs of nomination forms to make them affordable to all aspirants so that the electoral process and politics are made all-inclusive.

One of the youngest APC presidential aspirants, Adamu Garba, was aghast on Twitter when he found out about the costs of the forms. "N100 million for the form. WOW!" he exclaimed, and continued, "If we don't come together and use our collective power to save this country from the strangulation of the moneybags, we are doing a great disservice to our generation and that of the future. We cannot continue to buy political offices in Nigeria, we

President Buhari signed the 'Not Too Young To Run' bill into law it automatically opened up the political space to all Nigerian youth? In this capricious game of seeking and holding onto political power, sometimes laws are merely promulgated to serve the exigencies of the time. In which case, even the paper on which the 'Not Too Young' law was written may have been worth more than its letter and spirit.

After signing the bill into law on 31 May, 2018, President Buhari told the overjoyed youth who were assembled from the 36 states of the country: "You can aspire for President but please postpone your campaign till after 2019." In their excitement, the coalition of the about 40 civil society youth organisations who had pushed for the enactment of the law could not decipher the double-speak imbedded in those words.

Mr. Buhari was simply implying that, first, he was signing the bill to gain their support towards his second term bid. Second, after he has his way in 2019, he could not assume them that they would reap the benefits of that law. Now we all know better.

Because politics is a serious enterprise in Nigeria, making huge investments in order to gain a firm foothold on the political turf in order to make it yield maximum returns are very paramount. But are these not some of the golden rules of business? In short, the higher the profit, the larger the stakes. You can confirm this from the richest black man in the world, Aliko Dangote.

Therefore, if you think that the cost of buying the APC's presidential nomination forms is too expensive, you should have a rethink. After all, is there anything that is still cheap in today's Nigeria? So why should the ticket to such a once-in-a-lifetime position of sheer splendour be an exception?

'humble' political system



ONLY NIGERIANS CAN SAVE NIGERIA

There was great hope when Nigeria and others African nations gained political independence in the late 1950s and early 1960s. Nigeria is virtually a failed nation today. Yet, it can be worse.

Lillian Okenwa, a lawyer, a journalist, the publisher of Law & Society Magazine, published an article entitled: "Who will save Nigeria from this impending implosion?" as a Guest Writer on the back page of the Guardian newspaper, Wednesday, February 23rd, 2022. To her lamentation, fear, genuine concern and the question she posed by the title of her article, I say, I believe very strongly that only Nigerians can save Nigeria especially when all Nigerians are mobilised for learning and industrialisation. The state of Hawaii of the USA is 4,400 km (2,800 miles) in the sea from continental USA. That demonstrates that it is the pride of belonging to a great nation that keeps a people together. We need to build a great nation to live together happily. The Britons built Britain. The Americans built the United States of America. The Chinese built China. Nigerians would have to build Great Nigeria; non-Nigerians would not build Nigeria for Nigerians. Our problem is inability to build the nation Nigeria. Great nations are built by great minds. The people with great minds are not common. Yet all Nigerians would readily build the great Nigeria when we combine the small greatness in 200 million of us.

This article is part of my contribution to the needed effort for making Nigeria a great nation. I am Emeritus Professor of Technology Management. I commenced a curiosity-driven research in 1986 to establish the scientific basis of the present global distribution of wealth and power and how nations develop. The research has been blessed abundantly. I have summarized the highlights of the results in a seven-book series. The eighth book is in the press. I believe that the results of our research constitute a special God's gift-package to mankind.

Nigeria needs to mobilise all her citizens for learning and industrialization. Why? We need to mobilise all citizens for industrialization because it is industrialization that would transform all aspects of life of Nigerians from poverty and hopelessness into life of satisfaction, peace and joy. Britain, America, Japan China and all other industrialised nations were poor village-nations confronted by unemployment, poverty, high crime wave, other evils, before they became industrialised. Industrialisation changed their sad situation into the enviable status of today.

Our research showed that learning (education, training, employment and research, integrated) is the primary basis of achieving capability-building growth and industrialization (CBIGI). Education, alone, coexists with mass unemployment and poverty. The higher the intensity of learning, the sooner the learning person or nation achieves a desired target. Industrialised societies have many millions of knowledgeable, skilled, competent and employed people. They produce many scientific products. The highest learning rate a nation can achieve is to mobilise all her citizens for learning. Nigeria should mobilize all her citizens for learning so as to achieve rapid industrialization. In a nation where the entire population is mobilised for learning, no one is left idle, there is no unemployment, no insecurity, growth of CBIGI is rapid, wealth creation is rapid, poverty vanishes speedily. The Nigerian economy would be transformed in a few decades. The learning-nation will develop

simultaneously and rapidly, all the wealth and power she needs to crush all divisive forces.

Japan's origin dates to 300 BC. The nation mobilised all her citizens for learning 1886-1905 and achieved industrialisation. The origin of China dates to 1000 BC. The nation mobilised all her citizens for learning in 1949 and achieved industrialization early 1980s.

Some people have asked me who would ensure that all Nigerians are mobilized for learning. My answer is that my suggestion is highly innovative. So, the power of innovation would encourage a people destined for life and greatness to adopt it. Second, the choice Nigeria must make now is also a compelling encouragement for the mobilisation. Today, Nigerians must choose between saving Nigeria and leaving it to break-up.

Nigeria must adopt a more humbled political system to make rapid economic and political progress. Why? First, Nigeria does not have political parties today. President Dwight Eisenhower (1956) of the United States, reflecting on the issue of political parties, said, a political party deserves the approbation American, only as it represents the ideals, the aspirations and the hopes of Americans. If it is anything less, it is merely a conspiracy to seize power. About 20 years later, Daniel Boorstin (1973), American historian, again reflecting on the issue of political parties, said, a political party is organized for a purpose larger than its own survival; a political machine exists for its own sake, its primary purpose is survival. I agree with President Eisenhower and Boorstin.

Political groups in Nigeria do not represent the ideals, the aspirations and hopes of Nigerians; they exist for their members. Six decades after political independence, more than 70 per cent of Nigerians are very poor today; 31 per cent of Nigerians were poor in 1960. It is clear Nigerian politicians either have no plan to develop Nigeria or do not know how to develop Nigeria and do not care about the dangerous status of Nigeria today. Our parliamentary / presidential experiments have failed completely.

The second reason is that a nation that cannot promote economic growth in terms of increased employment and wealth creation cannot promote peace and security. Increased employment promotes orderliness but mass unemployment and poverty coexist with insecurity.

The third reason Nigeria needs a more humbled political system is that history shows that the political route to growth and development of a nation is usually very long, uncertain, prone to violence, risky, etc. The Europeans and Asian nations drifted for about 2000-3000 years before the people acquired scientific knowledge, skills and capabilities and transformed all aspects of life including politics. There is no sense continuing with glamorous politics.

A fourth reason for my suggestion that Nigeria needs a more humbled political system is that our presidential politics in 2023 cannot be less of a do-or-die affair than that of 2019. President Muhammadu Buhari (PMB) said he was afraid of 2019 elections in 2017 or so. Nigeria is much worse in all aspects now than before 2019.

RISING FATALITIES FROM LASSA FEVER

Government leaders could do more to ensure the virus is contained

It is obvious that many Nigerians are not paying attention to the growing fatality rate of Lassa fever, a deadly disease that took its name from one of our communities. In the past few months, Lassa fever has claimed the lives of dozens of our citizens, going by figures from the Nigeria Centre for Disease Control (NCDC). The latest alarm is coming from the Minister of State for Health, Olorunnimbe Mamora, who announced that the fatality rate of Lassa fever in the country has hit 19.1 percent. He also put suspected cases at 3746 in 23 states and 681 confirmed cases, with 132 deaths already recorded. Sadly, there have been more fatalities since his announcement. Only yesterday, no fewer than 76 suspected cases and six deaths were reported in the Kaltungo local council of Gombe State.

Lassa fever has been a serious health challenge in Nigeria since it was first diagnosed in Lassa (the village for which it was named) in Borno State in 1969. Even though there have been efforts in the past to contain the scourge, the country has been witnessing frequent outbreaks in recent years. This, according to the World Health Organisation (WHO) could be attributed "to reduced response capacity in surveillance and laboratory testing." The symptoms, which include fever, sore throat, vomiting, back pain, cough, abdominal pain, restlessness, and general body weakness, usually appear six to 21 days after contact with the virus.

The onset of the disease is usually gradual, starting with fever followed by headache. However, because the symptoms of Lassa fever are so varied and non-specific, clinical diagnosis is often difficult, especially early in the course of the disease. For that reason, steps should be taken by

the government at all levels to emphasise routine infection prevention and control measures. Healthcare workers should also be advised to always be careful to avoid contact with blood and bodily fluids in the process of caring for sick persons.

Experts have advised that people should ensure their food (cooked or uncooked) is properly covered while regular handwashing should be adhered to. The bush around the home should also be cleared regularly while windows and doors of houses should be closed especially at night. The public should also be adequately enlightened on the dangers posed by rats in their homes. This should be the responsibility of both the federal ministry of environment and that of information which can

deploy the National Orientation Agency (NOA) for a public awareness campaign on the issue.

Against the background of repeated commitments by various stakeholders to prevent a recurrence of this disease, what the current outbreak has shown clearly is that if indeed there have been any preventive strategies, they were not implemented. We therefore believe that the authorities need to do more if we are to rid the nation of the disease that claims the lives of hundreds of our citizens on an annual basis.

With effective coordination, the disease can be contained quickly before it becomes another national epidemic. But the real challenge is to work towards its total eradication as it has been done in many other countries. We hope the authorities will take both preventive and long-term measures this time around so that we do not continue to lose our citizens to the virus that has for decades been an emblem of shame.

Assessing Nigeria's Back Sit Role in Lucrative International Air Transport Market

Nigeria is not benefitting from the lucrative international flights to different destinations in the world, which are known for providing the highest yield in Africa. In terms of revenue, partnership, employment, manpower development or technology transfer, Nigeria remains a loser, as foreign airlines record high load factor out of different airports from the country, writes **Chinedu Eze**

What is unique about Nigeria's international air travel market is that while South Africa, Morocco and Egypt may record higher passenger traffic made largely of tourists and others, Nigerian passenger traffic is made up of 99 per cent indigenes and has been a consistent market since the last 40 years.

Nigerians are known as very mobile people who like to travel, so because of their penchant to travel they have remained the most attractive market for airlines, as travellers from the country willingly pay relatively high fares, dubbed to be the highest airfares from any African country.

Nigerian aviation expert, Nick Fadugba, observed that what is unique about the Nigerian travel market is that passengers fill the aircraft from the first cabin to the last. In other words, in Nigeria, airlines fill up their first class, business and economy cabins regularly. This has made Nigeria a unique market, which made Ethiopian Airlines former country manager describe Nigeria as the most competed market in Africa. Industry analysts have posited that Nigeria gives major international carriers the highest profit per flight in Africa.

British Airways in 2015 adjudged Nigeria as its biggest market for air transport business, as the airline records the highest passenger seats among international carriers that operate in Nigeria.

According to records from the Nigerian Civil Aviation Authority (NCAA), in 2021 British Airways operated 587 flights to Nigeria, Emirates 225 because it stopped operating to Nigeria most of last year due to the impasse United Arab Emirates had with the federal government over COVID-19 Protocol. Ethiopian Airline operated 828 flights; Kenya Airways operated 271 flights, KLM, 229, Lufthansa, 555 flights; Qatar Airways, 679, Turkish



Airlines, 669, Virgin Atlantic, 363 and Delta Air Line, 350. These are major carriers that operate to Nigeria during the period and the total number of flights during the period was 9, 675. NCAA also disclosed that the number of outbound passengers in 2021 was 1, 112, 884; while inbound passengers was 1, 086, 395, making a total of passengers that travelled to international destinations to 2, 199, 279.

Writing in Moguldom Nation, an online medium, Kelvin Mwanza wrote that Nigeria's Lagos and Abuja routes are the most lucrative destinations for airlines operating in Africa due to the high load factor that even rivals developed markets like New York.

"The west African country load factor is usually high from top to bottom meaning that

the first and business classes in these airlines fill up first before the economy. This makes it one of the best destinations for premium airlines such as British Airways, Emirates, Virgin Atlantic, Air France, KLM, Delta Air Lines and Lufthansa. It is estimated that British Airways makes more revenue from three flights to Lagos than it makes from 10 Flights to New York," he wrote.

Mwanza also wrote that this could be explained by the fact Nigerians are class-conscious flyers that prefer travelling in the first and business class. Normally carriers earn more per seat for the few seats in first class and business class, than hundreds of seats in the economy class.

He also observed that most of these

expensive seats snapped up by Nigerians are paid by government, corporate institutions and well to do Nigerians.

BENEFITS

But the big question is, what is Nigeria benefitting from this market that is profitable to many foreign carriers? Is Nigeria getting anything in terms of technology transfer, manpower development, code-share between local airlines and international carriers, which will enable the domestic airlines earn more revenue? Travel expert and organiser of Akwaaba African Travel Market, Ambassador Ikechi Uko, told THISDAY that aviation agencies said they are sustained by the revenue they earn from foreign carriers, which promptly pay their charges. But beyond payment of charges, which is obligatory in every part of the world, including not so profitable destinations, what else does Nigeria gain from its profitable routes dominated by foreign carriers?

Uko recalled that many years ago, the German mega carrier, Lufthansa trained many Nigerian aviators in the 1980s that became the fulcrum of aviation management in Nigeria and those still alive have continued to make invaluable contribution to the sector. Few years ago when Delta Air Line started operation to Ghana it built terminal facility at Kotoka International Airport, Accra. None of such has happened in Nigeria.

Today many of the workers for British Airways and some other mega carriers in Nigeria are on contract arrangement. Many foreign airlines have moved their operation administration from Nigeria, leaving only marketing managers. Many of them are operating their Nigerian services from South Africa.

"In doing this they have reduced their expenses

in Nigeria while increasing their revenue from the country," said an official of the Federal Airports Authority of Nigeria (FAAN).

AIRFARES

Nigeria pays relatively the highest fares in the operation of these mega carriers in Africa. Ambassador Uko argued that this could be due to market forces because there is always passenger surge on the Nigerian route. Charging Nigeria higher fares had led to imbroglio some years ago when the then Director General of NCAA, Dr Harold Demurenquestioned the outrageous fares charged on the Nigerian routes by BA and Virgin Atlantic Airways, especially in first and business classes. He moved to stop the exploitation but his protest was mired in controversy, as Nigerians erupted from everywhere to defend the British carriers. Then it was posited that the airlines charged Nigerian passengers higher for six hours flight from Lagos, Abuja to London while it charges less for Johannesburg to London, which is about 11 hours, 10 minutes flight.

Director of Operations, Cargolux Airlines and the President of Association of Foreign Airlines Representatives in Nigeria (AFARN), Kingsley Nwokoma, told THISDAY on Wednesday that the cost of doing business in Nigeria is very high when compared to other countries.

"The explanation of the high fares is very easy. The cost of doing business in Nigeria is extremely high vis a vis other countries. Airfares in Ghana are even cheaper. It is the same with cargo rates. The ease of doing business in Nigeria is full of obstacles. There are a lot of charges airlines must pay to the aviation agencies like NCAA, FAAN, the Nigerian Airspace Management Agency (NAMA), which are very high comparatively," he said.

CODE-SHARE

Ambassador Ikechi Uko said that it would be difficult for Nigerian airlines to have successful code-share agreement with foreign carriers because of the inability of local carriers to sustain on time performance. Foreign airlines would want to partner with local carriers that are consistent with their operational schedules.

The General Manager, Public Affairs, NCAA, Sam Adurogboye, told THISDAY that the regulatory authority has done many things in the past to encourage code-share between Nigerian carriers and their foreign counterparts.

"Why not, we encourage code-share between Nigerian and foreign airlines. You can recall that NCAA once paid IATA (International Air Transport Association) N10 million years ago to conduct gap analysis for all the airlines designated on foreign routes. That was a supportive idea meant to have the IOSA (IATA Operational Safety Audit) audit conducted by IATA so that they can partner mega carriers. This is because no mega carrier will partner without knowing your safety status. So, we have always encouraged the airlines with the hope that it would enable them generate forex as income. Our boss will always say, you can't be wrong supporting your own," Adurogboye said.

A country manager of one of the foreign airlines in Nigeria told THISDAY that the way foreign airlines deal with Nigeria is the way they also deal with any other country they operate in; that nobody provides anything extra. He said that foreign airlines can locate their regional office anywhere, just as many companies locate their customer service in Philippine, remarking that it was wrong to describe Nigeria as lucrative route because it is the airlines that make it lucrative by the service they render to their passengers, observing that Nigerian carriers that operate international destinations are not as successful as foreign carriers due to their mode of operation.

He said that for Nigeria to attract more people to travel through the country it has to build state of the art airports with transit facilities, stressing that now people move from Togo, Benin Republic to Ghana and Code d'Ivoire to connect flights. He also regretted that NCAA couldn't regulate FAAN, which to him explains why the airport terminal without good facility could be allowed to exist.

"Your airport has to be good. There was a time I travelled to Tamale in northern Ghana.

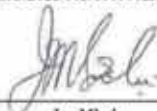

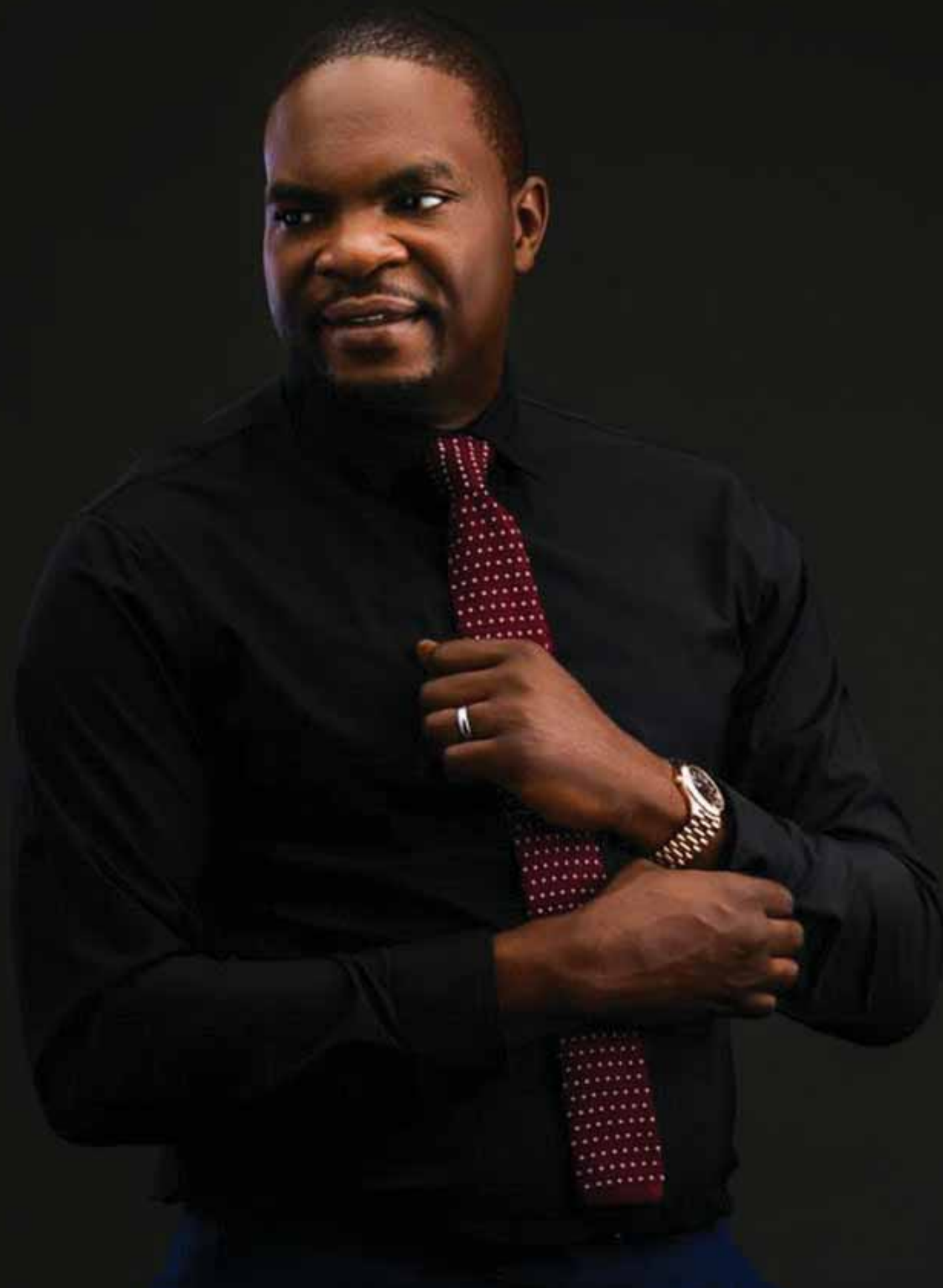

Currently working on new initiatives such as the Balmoral School of Event, the training subsidiary of the Balmoral group to help the hospitality business explore some proven processes, patterns and principles, Dr. Ezekiel is currently fine tuning plans to hold a heritage festival known as Lagos Independence Festival of Excellence. With the acronym L.I.F.E, it is a first of its kind festival to appreciate Nigeria’s rich history while showcasing Lagos as a Centre of Excellence and the Entertainment Capital of Africa. Curated by Balmoral Group and The Temple Company, LIFE will be an annual celebration of diversity, unity, culture and our Independence from September 30 to to October 2, 2022. Amongst other things, he brings **Chiemelie Ezeobi** up to speed on the heritage festival and the inherent numerous potential for the hospitality sector

How did L.I.F.E come about?

L.I.F.E came about when Ogidi Studio just opened and I went to visit. I’m an idealist so when I got to Ogidi studio, I felt like this studio is actually one of the best studios in West Africa. This studio should actually be churning out a lot of talents. How do we get the talents to know about this place apart from marketing? I always feel like the best form of marketing is experiential marketing. People need to come out and experience what you have and then see what they can do.

Since I own an events company, the largest network of venues here in Lagos, if not in Nigeria, I said, why don’t we come together and pull up an event where we can be actually turning our talents from this studio? We have the venues. With the venues you can do live events while the studio is to nurture the talent. We got talking with Idris the CEO of Temple. We asked how come we don’t even have heritage events anymore because before now we used to have the Lagos Carnival which was a very heritage event. We used to have Eyo Festival as well. Those were festivals that were heritage festivals. Nowadays, you find out that when people want to do shows, it’s only mainly music or comedy.

In another two months after that comedy show, you’ve forgotten anything even happened because it was not impactful; it’s nothing much based on the fact that we do a lot of events as well. I realise that people like South Africans, come out to do Nickelodeon festivals. The kids come out. We don’t have any family entertainment pretty much here. So we came together and said, you know what on Independence Day nothing really happens apart from the speech at 7am. After that one, everybody is looking for what to do.

July 4th in America is being celebrated all over the world. So how come in Nigeria, we don’t have that and a thought came to me. So we just thought, let’s make October memorable again and where else can we do it if not in Lagos the Centre of Excellence. So we started turning on our idea then we brushed it down. That’s where the LIFE birthed. And we felt like for us to do something of this magnitude and with the excellence that Lagos is known for, we need at least a year to organise and plan it.

So we started off by doing a press conference last year on October 1st to start planning for this event. It’s been in the works for over a year now.

Why the acronym L.I.F.E?

L.I.F.E means Lagos Independent Festival of Excellence. We came about different names. So we just thought L.I.F.E is catchy. Everybody knows what life is about- Enjoy and Explore Life and the acronym L.I.F.E just makes sense. It’s a Lagos-themed name. We wanted to show the excellence of Lagos since it’s known for excellence. So Lagos Independent Festival is actually beyond an event.

We intend to put this event on the map or calendar of events around the world and have the kind of effects all around the world so that when there will be talk about Independence all over the world, you know that something happened in Nigeria. It’s also going to be a hybrid event. So in case you live all around the world and you can’t be there, you can get to watch it online.

Any plans to rotate the event to other cities?

As the years go by, we intend to move it to New York. We intend to move it around the world. However, we are starting with Lagos.

Who does this cover?

It’s for your children, teenagers, younger children to the adults; everyone is fully covered in this. Like we said, it is a full family entertainment. I remember when we were growing up as children, we had things like Tales by Moonlight and different things. If you ask most kids now to mention the 36 states of the country, its a problem for them. The Africa spirit has to start with us changing the narrative from here. So for us, this is a Lagos excellence and it will

be fully African. The stories will be African. Everything we are doing is really celebrating Nigeria and what Nigeria brings to the table.

It’s commendable how you are trying to curb capital flight through tourism because when it starts people can come in from all over the world, how will the Hospitality Sector gain from this?

We want a case where come October 1st, the whole hotels are fully booked. Yes. That’s how it’s done all over the world. Trust me, the journey of a thousand miles begins with just a step in the right direction. Little things can springboard something major in the future.

It’s an entertainment event where we are not looking at just Lagosians coming to enjoy this event. That’s why we strategically picked the Federal Palace Hotel. This hotel was where we got our Independence Ball. So it’s actually a strategic location for us. It’s also very central.

There’s a hotel there, too. It means that if your family lives in Port-Harcourt and you want to enjoy this, you can actually come and stay at the hotel.

We have daytime entertainment. We also have night time entertainment. There’s music. There’s comedy. There are different talents that will be discovered at the event. Remember I told you from the get-go, it was because we wanted to raise talents. So what we are looking at is the case where when we discover some talents at this L.I.F.E, we nurture these talents for a whole year. So by next year, we’ll bring this person and you remember this person? He’s now a star.

So it’s a platform for us where we can use to, in our own way, give back to the society as well. We want a case where people will ask for the best place to look for bigger talents and they will say let’s wait for October 1st because that’s where you have the best of the best. It’s also synonymous with our Independence as well too. It was a no-brainer for us.

Events is a booming and growing industry. When you think about it, I feel like what we are lacking is the exhibition and international money and involvement. Otherwise, the wedding industry is huge. The party industry is huge. Those are internal. What brings money into the economy is the meetings you have with global people coming here.

No country develops fully without foreign direct investments. That’s the reason we have thought about this particular event. In order to be educative and impactful, we need the foreign direct investments.

Dubai is big for what it is because a lot of all the major meetings in the world happen in Dubai. Like I said, people will not fly from all over the world to watch an artiste perform because most times, these artistes move around all over the world. But if it’s an artiste performing in something that is impactful, educational, and a festival, they will be here. So we decided let’s start looking at heritage events like L.I.F.E.

What are the security checks in place to ensure your visitor’s safety?

We could have moved this to a beach or anywhere else that is bigger but we chose the Federal Palace Hotel because it’s secured. We’ve put together a lot of facilities in place, where even when your kids come in there’s a code we will give everybody. It’s international standard- you can’t get any kids or anyone missing. Even in the evenings, we have maids and nannies you can get. So it’s been well thought of. In the evenings, we have tales by moonlight and the kids can come together while the parents can be having their own entertainment. Nobody walks in and out of the hotel without going through the security. The hotel has only one way in and one way out. So we have thought about it.

Nonetheless, we’re still actually going to invite a lot more security. We believe that Lagos State will be part of it. We believe that the police, army and everybody will be part of it. It is not about Balmoral Temple event; it is a Lagos-Nigeria event.

Vehicles with swooshing wipers drove past Epe Council, the venue of the book presentation. Those light showers preceding that Saturday didn't stop the gathering of school mates, friends and families of young writer, Chukwuebuka David Nworisa gathered. At the heart of the serene neighbourhood in Epe is where the confident young writer was born and raised. The child author is a product of a literary club at his school where reading and writing skills are nurtured. During the pandemic lockdown, Chukwuebuka-being an only child-made the best of his solitude in writing short stories in this new collection of 15 stories. These include 'Ada, the

truant,' 'The Lucky Farmer,' 'The Poison Woman' amongst others. In a review by Dr. Tayo Popoola, a lecturer at the Augustine University, Epe, who was represented by Dr. Segun Oke, he gives glowing remarks on the book which he described as 'reader-friendly.' "Chukwuebuka scored a very high point in the area of choice of words. He uses simple and straight forward English in putting his ideas across," he said. Although the Lagos State Commissioner for Education, Hon. Folasade Adefisayo was unavoidably absent, her representative Mrs. Abiodun Mosunmola Adefuye defied the downpour of the day to witness the public presentation of the book. She commended the author, his teachers and the parents

for their support. "This current dispensation supports education and good legacies like this. We hope that other young ones can emulate this young boy to advance their academic performances. Since this commissioner came, Epe has stood out. In the 2020 WAEC result, Epe had the best result in Lagos state with 93% passing including Mathematics and English. They achieved this due to the conducive environment for learning. I will relate this new book to our academic performance in Lagos," she said, adding that one of the 12 comprehensive schools in Lagos for academic and skills acquisition is situated in Epe. In his remarks, the young writer who is a J.S.S.3 revealed the motivation behind writing these stories

of varied human experience. "I started writing at six and seven years old. I gathered the stories during the Covid-19 lockdown since there was time since all schools had been closed. My dad helped to get it published. I grew up around older ones. I didn't expect it to get to this point where Oba of Epe would get to know about my book," he said. A brief presentation was executed by the author's school mates Olayinka Tofunmi, Moshood Opemipo and Olayinka Tomisin as well as the duo of Olayinka Yetunde and Anjorin Anjolaoluwa. The programme was wrapped with the goodwill messages from the Commander of NDLEA in Lagos, as well as the principals of Vivid Minds Secondary School and Eucharistic Secondary School, Ibowon, Epe, Lagos.

287 POETS COMPETE FOR \$100,000 IN NLNG'S LITERATURE PRIZE

287 poets will race for the \$100,000 Prize at The Nigeria Prize for Literature, sponsored by Nigeria LNG Limited (NLNG). Last week in Lagos, the entries received were handed over to the panel of judges by the Chair of the Prize's Advisory Board, Professor Akachi Adimora-Ezeigbo. In addition, the Advisory Board also handed over 87 entries for the NLNG's Prize for Literary Criticism. Professor Sule Egya leads the panel of judges. A professor of African Literature and Cultural Studies at Ibrahim Badamasi Babangida University, Lapai, Niger State, Professor Egya is a renowned poet and novelist who writes under the pen name E. E. Sule. Professor Egya has written over one hundred scholarly articles and literary essays. His first novel, Sterile Sky, won the 2013 Commonwealth Book Prize for the Africa Region. His poetry volumes include 'What the Sea Told Me,' which won the 2009 ANA/Gabriel Okara Prize. Other judges are Toyin Adewale-Gabriel and Dike Chukwumerije. Adewale-Gabriel is a Poet and narrator. She has worked as a literary critic in The Guardian, Post Express and The Daily Times. She is often described as "the most beautiful and outstanding voice of the new African poetry." Dike Chukwumerije is a Nigerian Spoken Word and Performance Poetry artist and an award-winning author. He has published several books and is the brain behind Night of the Spoken Word, a live Poetry show and a theatre production, Made in Nigeria Poetry Show. He is also the winner of 2013 Association of Nigerian Authors (ANA) Prize for Prose Fiction.

Speaking at the hand-over ceremony, NLNG's General Manager for External Relations and Sustainable Development, Mr. Andy Odeh, said some significant strides have been recorded in the Nigeria Prizes. He said NLNG recently launched the website which is a one-point information hub for the Prizes. "This site served as the submission portal for entries received this year. Our goal with this new gateway is to make information about the Prizes, process, governance, and winning works and winners readily available to members of the public. Also, based on feedback from various stakeholders, this year, the Advisory Board appointed two judges that are practitioners, not from core academia. But be assured that their credentials are solid and they speak to their craft and contributions to the Literary World," he added. In her remarks, Professor Adimora-Ezeigbo, urged the judges to use the opportunity to put Literature on a pedestal and make it an enabler of development in the country. Other members of the Advisory Board are Prof. Olu Obafemi and Prof. Ahmed Yerima. The Nigeria Prize for Literature, Africa's most prestigious literary award, rotates yearly amongst four literary categories of prose fiction, poetry, drama and children's literature.

Nolstagia in Morakinyo's Debut Solo Exhibition at Mydrim Gallery

The tick-tocking pendulum clock, the sight of an old volkswagen beetle car and the alphabet slate will likely trigger memories of the past three and four decades before digital disruption. It is against this backdrop that Oluwafemi Morakinyo sets off a cross-generational show that revives nolstagia. From May 1, the week-long show at the Mydrim Gallery will chronicle the artist's childhood and those of his viewers. The exhibition is the artist's first solo show after over a decade of painting and participating in group exhibitions. Morakinyo is a senior art director at a leading advertising company but studied painting at Yaba College of Technology (YABATECH) where he graduated in 2010. Titled, "Stamps of Memory," the exhibition is a revival of experiences, a story that transcends generations. The artist owes much to his background for inspiration. "It is just like archiving experiences and memories. Growing up, my dad

was a banker who used to collect stamps," he recounted. "I used to draw the stamps because I found them very interesting. I lived with my grandma as well. She was a collector of fabrics and vintage plates. So all these experiences initiated my idea

towards. So many of these articles of history are still in their custody. The idea for this show is to revive the memory about some particular things or stories that we have from our past." With 13 works, Morakinyo brings

back memories of vinyl record player, sewing machine, old vehicles and architecture as well as fashion elements of the 80s and 90s. "Although we now live in a fast-paced world, we cling to these memories as a stamp to a package, transporting ourselves every now and then to simpler times," he said at a recent press preview of the works. One of the works titled "Sunday Service" is a throwback on how the artist's mother used to wait by the car every Sunday while the children got set for church. While the painting titled 'Je le O Sinmi' recounts a visual tale of many children's first taste of formal education and how that process was seen as a rite of passage of sorts-giving respite to parents. Other works include 'Daily Bread,' 'New Release,' 'Good Luck Charm' 'Contemplation' and 'The Pianist.' Although the artist said he has embraced the convenience that technology brings, he still appreciates the memories the past years hold and how that period deepens his appreciation for new technology.

Jonathan and the 2023 Temptation

It first came as a rumour, then as a suggestion, and now a near reality: that former President Goodluck Jonathan is seriously considering taking another shot at the presidency, eight years after he quietly handed over power to President Muhammadu Buhari, after losing the 2015 elections.

It is not certain what the attraction is. But it is certain there is a strong pull and pressure to lure Dr Goodluck Ebele Jonathan into the political loop again. His experience in the political arena should tell him that the herbalist does not go plucking every leaf in the forest.

Many of those cheering him on now are those banking on the gains thereof, even as many of them do not have a PVC.

Already, there are many amorphous and unregistered hitherto unknown pressure groups, nay, hangers on, who are already baying for Jonathan to join the presidential train. He seems to be at a confused junction, not knowing which way to turn: to reject the pressure or to give in to it.

The only time he spoke on this was when he addressed some hurriedly cobbled youths who carried lots of placards in Abuja, begging him to join the race.

He had told them that he has not made up his mind. But his body language seems to be saying, "go and prepare the ground, I am coming". Early this week, more and more indications are confirming that he is set to throw his hat into the ring. It is said he has given one condition before he would join the presidential race under the platform of the All Progressives Congress (APC). And the condition is that Mr President (Buhari) should endorse him as the party's flagbearer. And then pronto, he'd join the race. There has been no denial of this request.

And that is where I have a problem. Is former President Jonathan actually warming up to come join this presidential race? Truly, politics is not only a dirty game, it is even weird. Those who seek to deodorise this belief are quick to quoting that in politics, there are no permanent friends, nor permanent enemies. only permanent interest. What they do not talk about is issues of integrity. It does not look like whether in politics, self esteem and brain get re-formatted every now and then. Were it not so, all the odious things said about then President Jonathan to deface and demonise his candidature would have come to mind. Was it not the APC spokesman at the time, Lai Mohammed, now minister of Information, that labeled Jonathan as

"clueless"? That badge of infamy stuck and resonated like a town crier's echo.

Jonathan was practically blamed for everything, including men who could not impregnate their wives. More than three years after the Buhari administration had taken off, Jonathan was still the easy beast of burden: the reason why Nigeria wasn't working.

That same Jonathan has suddenly turned such a beautiful bride that is being pulled from every corner to come rescue Nigeria from the deep economic and security miasma it has been plunged. The same Jonathan! As Shakespeare would caution, "there is dagger in men's smiles".

Jonathan had been a PDP-brought up, right from his days as Deputy governor, then governor, and then as Vice President and eventually as President. So, what is the attraction in the APC today that is such an allure to Jonathan? When the PDP scattered with the formation of nPDP, led by Rotimi Amaechi and some other seven PDP governors et al, the APC was the eventual beneficiary of that friction. Now the father figure of that same political papacy, so to say, is about dumping the platform that had propped him up to the vortex of his political career to adopt the one that not only traduced and troubled him, but also pulled him down, just less than eight years ago. Politics!

But more curious is the demand for a presidential adoption and endorsement, as a condition for jumping ship. Ha! First, does, President Buhari have the powers to foist Jonathan on the APC, without the party shaking and scattering? For a party that is already selling expression of interest and nomination form for presidential aspirants at the cost of N100million, which some have already bought, would suddenly be coerced into another consensus option? Buhari will be reminded that this is not national party chairmanship.

How can Jonathan be asking for such automatic endorsement? Does it not amount to planning to reap from where he did not sow? Pray, what would happen to the ambition and effort of all the founding fathers of the APC like Bola Ahmed Tinubu, Chibuike Rotimi Amaechi, Bisi Akande etc? I recall very clearly how in 2011, Jonathan presiding over the NEC of the PDP, at Wadata plaza, had angrily thrown out the application and request of

the party chairman at the time to allow Mr Timi Alaibe who just returned to the PDP, from Labour Party, to run for the governorship of Bayelsa State. Jonathan had argued that Alaibe should queue from behind and not browbeat party chieftains who had been loyal to the party. Jonathan had stormed out of the meeting and left for Brazil that night. And that was it. Alaibe was denied the chance to fly the party's flag at the time. So, how can the same Jonathan now want to so aggressively shunt from the extreme back to the foremost front?

Some people are suggesting that Jonathan is being set up for ultimate disgrace in a political chess game that could ultimately damage his brand. He had remained a respected elder statesman ever since he peacefully handed over power to President Buhari in 2015, without a fuss. He has been a shining example of a new spec in African democratic struggle. Should he not cherish and uphold that spectre of honour?

What point does he still want to prove returning to power? It is even a hundred times worse scenario today than he left it off in 2015. There is no delusion that should make people think that suddenly Jonathan has the magic wand to redeem Nigeria. He does not. Perhaps nobody does. Many of the vices and weaknesses Jonathan was accused of are still inherent in him. A Jonathan will not suddenly turn a messiah, especially in a climate that is so deeply messed up and despoiled by the narrow and odious malaise of nepotism and criminal indifference. It is a pity that the dismal performance of Buhari has suddenly transformed Jonathan to the coveted Knight with the shining armour.

Worse still, a returning Jonathan will not have the privilege of a second term. He had done his first term (2011—2015). Fixing Nigeria will surely require far more time than four years. The only probable consolation will be the comic relief Jonathan's wife, Madam Patience, will offer Nigerians, to laugh away their sorrows, unlike some First Ladies that are so vexed with the state d'affaires and had chosen to be ensconced in far away Dubai. 2023 is a standing temptation that Jonathan should pray to be delivered from.

Well, I did not say so. But it is like a war. The front liners have to spend huge, while the rest of the crowd will have to do the clapping and the cheering.

The sensitization programme, which was also held virtually with the participants in Awka, Anambra State had many bank customers in attendance.

Thisday Afrinvest 40 Index Up 0.5%

The Thisday Afrinvest 40 advanced 0.5% to 2,188.55 index points due to buy pressure on **MTNN** (+0.9%), **ZENITH** (+1.7%), and **FBNH** (+0.8%). Cumulatively, these stocks account for 16.7% of the index.

Gains in Bellwethers Bolster Performance... ASI up 0.5%

Yesterday, gains in bellwether stocks – **SEPLAT** (+9.1%), **MTNN** (+0.9%), and **ZENITH** (+1.7%) bolstered performance on the local bourse as the **NGX-ASI** rose 0.5% to close at 48,837.76 points. Accordingly, YTD return advanced to 14.3% from 13.7% while market capitalisation gained ₦143.4bn to ₦26.3tn. Meanwhile, trading activity improved as volume and value traded rose 207.9% and 138.6% respectively to 759.6m units and ₦5.5bn.

Mixed Sector Performance

Across our coverage sectors, performance was bullish as all indices gained. The **Oil & Gas** and **Insurance** indices gained 5.2% and 1.1% respectively on the back of bargain hunting in **SEPLAT** (+9.1%), **AIICO** (+5.7%), and **CHIPLC** (+8.6%). Similarly, the **Banking** and **Consumer Goods** indices rose 0.9% and 0.7% respectively due to buying interest in **ZENITH** (+1.7%), **UBN** (+2.5%), **GUINNESS** (+5.1%), and **DANGSUGAR** (+2.7%). Price upticks in **MTNN** (+0.9%), **CAP** (+9.8%), and **MEYER** (+6.8%) drove the **AFR-ICT** and **Industrial Goods** indices higher by 0.4% and 3bps respectively.

Outlook

Investor sentiment, as measured by market breadth, strengthened to 0.28x from -0.07x recorded previously as 34 stocks gained, 17 lost and 61 were unchanged. Today, we expect the bullish momentum would be sustained on the back of the improved investor sentiment.

An ETF (Exchange Traded Fund) is a type of fund which owns the assets (shares of stock, bonds, oil futures, gold bars, foreign currency, etc.) and divides ownership of those assets into shares. Investors can buy these ‘shares’ on the

floor of the Nigerian Stock Exchange.

A REIT (Real Estate Investment Trust) is an investment vehicle that allows both small and large investors to part-own real estate ventures (eg. Offices, Houses, Hospitals) in proportion to their investments. The assets are divided into shares that are traded on the Nigerian Stock Exchange.

Offer price: The price at which units of a trust or ETF are bought by investors.

Bid Price: The price at which Investors redeem (sell) units of a trust or ETF.

Yield/Total Return: Denotes the total return an investor would have earned on his investment. Money Market Funds report Yield while others report Year- to-date Total Return.

NAV: Is value per share of the real estate assets held by a REIT on a specific date.

2023: Buhari's Ministers Remain Unfazed as Deadline for Mandatory Resignation Nears

● Tomorrow is 30 days to primary ● Senior lawyers still divided over clause 84 of amended Electoral Act

Some of President Muhammadu Buhari's ministers and other political appointees believed to be eyeing political offices in 2023, have remained unperturbed over the controversial Section 84 (12) of the amended Electoral Act, which compels them to resign their current portfolios before aspiring to any elective office.

Tomorrow is 30 days to the primary elections of ruling All Progressives Congress (APC), when the appointees ought to resign ahead of the general election.

Interestingly, prominent lawyers, mostly Senior Advocates of Nigeria (SANs), have also remained divided over the interpretation

of Section 84 (12) of the amended Electoral Act. The seeming confusion has tended to encourage the continued stay in office of the appointees, who are aspiring to either become president, governors or senators.

The National Working Committee (NWC) of the All Progressives Congress (APC) had on Wednesday released a new guideline, which stipulated that all political appointees desiring to participate in its primary elections at all levels must resign at least 30 days before the conduct of the primaries.

Section 3(i) of the APC final guidelines for the conduct of primaries, states, "No political appointee at any level shall be a voting delegate or be voted for

the purpose of the nomination of candidates. Any political office holder interested in contesting for an elective office shall leave office 30 days prior to the date of election or party primary for the office sought."

But there are indications that the ruling party may soon issue an updated guideline.

Despite declaring his intention to contest the Kebbi State governorship election, Attorney General of the Federation and Minister of Justice, Abubakar Malami, like other ministers in the Buhari cabinet, has refused to resign his position.

Others in his shoes are Minister of Transportation, Rt. Hon. Chibuike Amaechi; Minister of State for Education, Emeka Nwajuba; and Minister of Labour and Employment, Dr.

Chris Ngige, who had indicated interest to contest for president in 2023.

Considering the fact that the APC presidential primary was scheduled to hold between May 30 and June 1, Saturday marks the end of the 30 days' grace given by the party for the political appointees to resign.

According to the schedule of activities released by the party, the governorship primary election is scheduled to hold on May 18, that for the House of Representatives is scheduled to hold on May 22, while the Senate primary poll is fixed for May 24.

By implication, therefore, Malami, a lawyer and SAN, ought to have resigned, but he is still holding on to his position.

A party source told THISDAY that the leadership of the party

might withdraw the new guideline, which mandated the political appointees to resign.

"Yesterday I heard that the party is withdrawing the new guideline you are referring to, because normally if an aspirant buys the nomination form, they also give him the guidelines, but they've stopped doing that now," the source stated.

National Publicity Secretary of APC, Mr. Felix Morka, informed THISDAY that the ruling party would issue an updated guideline soon, though he did not give details.

According to him, "The party will issue updated guidelines soon, after that we can discuss."

Reacting to the development, some lawyers insisted that by the provisions of the new Electoral Act, 2022, any political appointee,

who wished to vote or be voted for at the party's convention or congresses, must resign from office 30 days to such conventions or congresses.

Speaking to THISDAY, a Lagos-based constitutional lawyer, Mr Femi Falana, SAN, stated that any aspirant, who did not resign now risked disqualification.

Falana said this had become expedient because the judgement of the Federal High Court in Umuahia nullifying the amended section that bars political appointees from participating in the party's conventions and congresses, has been suspended by the Court of Appeal.

He stated, "The judgement of the Federal High Court they are relying on has been suspended

Head of Service Seeks to Partner National Assembly on Cybersecurity

The Head of the Civil Service of the Federation, Dr. Folasade Yemi-Esan has assured members of the National Assembly of the readiness of the service to collaborate with them on ICT and cyber security.

She gave the assurance yesterday when she received on a working visit to her office, members of the Senate Committee on Information, Communication and Technology (ICT) and Cyber Security headed by Sen. Yakubu Oseni.

She welcomed the free sensitisation workshop for civil servants to be facilitated by the National Assembly through the private sector and reiterated the efforts of the Office of the Head of the Civil Service of the Federation (OHCSF) in ensuring that government services go digital. She informed the Committee that out of the six thematic areas of the Federal Civil Service Strategies and Implementation Plan 2020-2025 (FCSSIP 2020-2025), four are ICT-based; Capacity Building, Integrated Personnel Payroll and

Information System (IPPIS), Enterprise Content Management (ECM) and Performance Management System (PMS).

She added that the Office had gone far with the National Information Technology Development Agency (NITDA) in the digitalisation of work flow with the digitalisation of files. She noted that, as a major first step, the Office has completed the development and digitalisation of Standard Operations Procedures (SOPs) for all its Departments and Units, which necessitated NITDA to give approval for the Enterprise Content Management (ECM) take off.

Speaking earlier, Senator Oseni explained that the committee has been mandated to ascertain the level of compliance on ICT in all the MDAs. He said this is in preparation for the future, as Nigeria is ready to move along with the rest of the world by going digital.

He disclosed further that in order to achieve this objective, it was decided that there would be pro bono sensitisation workshops for management cadre officers in the civil service.

Peterside: Poll Shows 40% of Nigerians Have Lost Confidence in APC, PDP

The Founder of Stanbic IBTC Bank and Founder, Anap Foundation, Atedo Peterside has revealed that an independent poll recently conducted showed that a growing number of Nigerians were displeased with the two biggest political parties in the country – the All Progressives Congress (APC) and Peoples Democratic Party (PDP).

He also said concerned Nigerians have been using the GoNigeria initiative, which is a non-partisan initiative to boost and encourage youths to fully participate in the electoral process by registering to vote, voting and take part in party politics also.

Peterside said this yesterday while featuring on 'The Morning Show' on Arise News Channel, a sister broadcast station of THISDAY.

He explained: "In 2015 an

opinion poll by ANAP Foundation showed that Buhari was very well ahead of Jonathan. You know what the opinion polls show today? It shows that 40 per cent of Nigerians don't want APC or PDP. Now, we are following that trend.

"And I think that 40 per cent may keep rising, but it is in the hands of APC and PDP. If every day, they do more foolish things, the 40 per cent will be increasing and each of them would keep diminishing.

"Take a single thing like APC asking for N100 million, it shows many that they have lost their moral compass and that they are far detached from the reality."

He added: "I'm just talking reality now and between the two of them, they cannot muster 60 per cent and if they go on misbehaving between now and February next year, which is a long time, that's the only path of self-destruction.

"Please don't forget elections are more than president. So, if this trend continues, many

of the big names in the Senate and House of Representatives may find themselves being flooded by even other parties, because they are unpopular."

He also noted that in developed countries, if youths who are unhappy vote en masse, they usually vote against establishments, noting that there are some polling units across the country where youth who are up to voting age were being frustrated not to register youths.

He, however, expressed optimism that more Nigerians would vote in 2023. Speaking on zoning, he said it was not proper to end an unwritten agreement, saying the other zones could be marginalised.

He said: "I think everybody accepts, and if you think I'm wrong, correct me, that zoning was supposed to be a temporary arrangement from the beginning. PDP came up with the concept and their language, implied power rotation and they said it

was meant to be temporary. But the issue to discuss really is, is this the correct time to end the temporary arrangement?

"The issue we are debating is when do you end the arrangement? I asked the party for those who say after everybody has tasted it, as one logic second argument that I've seen party for is those who say, even if we know we must end it, the worst time to end it is after we have just had a very divisive regime. That has made so many geopolitical zones angry through their actions and inactions. So what they're saying is that the worst time to end something is after it has been badly managed. So you almost need somebody to manage it well first, when you manage it first, tempers cool down because somebody will feel there has been fairness."

"If people felt that you just finished manipulating the system for eight years and then now, you're telling me it's time to end it?"

Mineral, Non-mineral Resources Contributed N12.8trn to Nigeria’s N28.02trn Revenues in Three Years

- *Federating units’ over-dependence on federation account hits 71%*
- *81% of allocations to states spent on recurrent expenditure*

Revenues from minerals and non-mineral resources contributed N12.84 trillion (56.61 per cent) and N6.57 trillion (28.97 per cent) respectively, the Nigeria Extractive Industries Transparency Initiative (NEITI), disclosed yesterday.

Also, Value-Added Tax (VAT) accounted for N3.27 trillion (14.42 per cent) of the federal government’s income between 2017 and 2019.

According to the organisation, four agencies generated a total of N28.02 trillion during the period under review, including the Nigerian National Petroleum Corporation (NNPC); Federal Inland Revenue Services (FIRS); Department of Petroleum Resources (DPR) and the Ministry of Mines and Steel Development (MMSD).

Out of the amount, NEITI in its latest Fiscal Allocation and Statutory Disbursement (FASD) report, stated that N22.68 trillion was remitted to the federation account.

The cost of collection and Joint-venture cash calls deductions by revenue generating agencies accounted for the differences between revenue generated and remittance, it stated.

NEITI’s FASD audit examined total extractive industry revenue remitted into the federation account, tracked allocation and disbursement from the account to statutory recipients as well as utilisation and application of the funds by the beneficiaries between the years 2017-2019.

It stated that the audit covered four federal revenue generating and 11 beneficiary agencies that are involved in the management of extractive industries funds.

The report also covered nine selected states: Akwa-Ibom; Bayelsa; Delta; Gombe; Imo; Kano; Nasarawa; Ondo and Rivers states.

It revealed that FIRS generated the sum of N13.48 trillion within the period under review with Petroleum Profit Tax (PPT) accounting for N5.80 trillion

(43.09 per cent), while VAT and other taxes accounted for 32 per cent and 24 per cent respectively. The organisation recorded highest revenue collection of N5.02 trillion in 2018.

It disclosed that a total sum of N8.82 trillion was generated by the NNPC within the period with breakdown showing that N4.55 trillion came from domestic crude sales, while export receipts accounted for N4.27 trillion.

It further stated that N5.33 trillion was deducted at source for JV cash calls and others, leaving the net amount of N3.49 trillion as transferred to federation account.

“During the period under consideration, a total of N8.82 trillion was generated. However, only N3.49 trillion (39.55 per cent) was remitted to the federation account due to deductions at source by NNPC for JV cash calls. The deductions at source by NNPC negate the principle of federation account,” the NEITI report stated.

From the report, the defunct DPR, NEITI stated, generated N3.53 trillion in the three years under review, with royalty payments accounting for N3.40 trillion (96.41 per cent). The agency however transferred N3.53 trillion to the federation account. The audit established that the surplus of N6.72 billion was as a result of unremitted receipts from prior year.

According to NEITI, the ministry of mines and steel development generated N12.498 billion within the three years period. A breakdown showed that the Mining Inspectorate Department (MID) contributed N6.43 billion while Mining Cadastral Office (MCO) accounted for N6.06 billion. From the total revenue generated by the ministry, a sum of N7.56 billion was shared to the three tiers of government in 2019.

On the Niger Delta Development Commission (NDDC), NEITI said that N755.96 billion was generated by the commission within the period

under consideration.

A breakdown showed that N551.08 billion (73 per cent) was contributed by oil and gas companies, while the balance of N203.90 billion (27 per cent) was federal government’s contribution to the commission.

The report further revealed that the total expenditure by the commission during the period under review was N882.3 billion with an analysis of the expenditure showing that N778.29 billion (88.20 per cent) was expended on development projects, while operational cost accounted for N104.07 billion (11.80 per cent) of the total.

Furthermore, an analysis of project execution in member state ranked Delta state highest in terms of development projects undertaken by the commission to member states with total expenditure of N40.46 billion (26 per cent) of the actual expenditure within the period, while Edo received the lowest development projects of about 5 per cent.

NEITI audit established that there was a gap between actual development projects expenditure as per audited financial statements and project monitoring list provided by the commission in the sum of N522.60 billion.

“While N679 billion was reported in NDDC’s financial statement, the project monitoring list reported expenditure of N157

billion on physical projects among the nine member states” the NEITI audit report revealed.

The report however, disclosed that 40 oil and gas companies defaulted in their payment obligation to the commission. It also disclosed that the commission did not receive any monies from the Ecological Fund as stipulated by the law throughout the three years under review, saying it obviously negatively affected revenue inflow into the commission within the period.

On the Tertiary Education Trust Fund (TETFund), NEITI reported that the fund realised N644.19 billion within the three years under review. It also established that the actual funds available for disbursement by TETFund in the three years period was N624.32 billion.

The report also disclosed that the sum of N102.14 billion (46.55 per cent) was disbursed to the universities, while N46.12 billion (21.35 per cent), N49.97 billion (21.97 per cent) and N27.09 billion (10.12 per cent) were disbursed to Polytechnics, Colleges of Education and other tertiary institutions programmes respectively.

NEITI noted that the process of accessing the fund was cumbersome and called on TETFund to simplify the process to enable more universities access the funds.

The Petroleum Technology

Development Fund (PTDF) revenue for the period under review was put at N155.34 billion and 95 per cent came from signature bonuses paid by oil and gas companies which is the main revenue source of funding by the agency.

The NEITI report revealed that out of N86.34 billion utilised by the agency within the period under review, N59.84 billion was spent on core operating expenses while N26.35 billion and N143 million was for personnel/ administrative expenses and capital respectively.

The report noted that the PTDF extended funding to 125 approved institutions, 43 locals and 82 foreign institutions. According to the NEITI report there was low expenditure compared with the revenue released during the years under review as only 56 per cent of revenue was utilised.

NEITI report put total receipts by Nigeria Content Development and Monitoring Board (NCDMB) for the three years under review at N126.73 billion. It

For the Nigerian Sovereign Investment Authority (NSIA), NEITI disclosed that the total financial flows for the three year period were N1.33 trillion while that of the defunct Petroleum Product Pricing Regulatory Authority (PPPRA) was N27.68 billion as federal government subvention for the three years period.

The Ecological Fund (EF)

recorded a total sum of N170.15 billion during the period under review with statutory allocation accounting for the 93.43 per cent of the total revenues.

It revealed that the North-central received the highest projects in the sum of N36.08 billion, while South-south received the lowest projects delivered amounting to N10.93 billion. The report also revealed that National Emergency Management Agency (NEMA) received N34.04 billion from the Fund.

The report disclosed that the three tiers of government shared N19.01 trillion mineral revenue during the period under review. A breakdown showed that the government received the sum of N8.85 trillion while N5.80 trillion and N4.36 trillion were received by the 36 States and Local Governments respectively.

A comparison of allocation per geo-political zones revealed that south-south states received the highest allocation during the period under review in the sum of N5.17 trillion (26.54 per cent) while southeast received the lowest allocation of N2.12 trillion (10.91 per cent).

A state by state analysis of revenue allocations within the period under review shows that Delta state received the highest allocation of N1.24 trillion while the Federal Capital Territory received the lowest allocation of N110 billion.

The French energy giant would look to offload its 10 per cent interest in a firm that holds 20 onshore and shallow water

permits in the West African country, Chief Executive Patrick Pouyanne said on a conference call Thursday.

Shell Plc, the operator of the licenses, was already considering bids from four local firms for its 30 per cent shareholding in the company, Bloomberg reported.

Oil majors have been selling onshore and shallow water assets to Nigerian independent producers for more

than a decade. That process is accelerating, with Exxon Mobil Corporation agreeing in February to sell some of its Nigerian assets to Seplat Energy Plc for at least \$1.28 billion.

International firms want to focus on deep-water fields away from the difficulties of operating in close proximity with local communities. Total also operates four other onshore and shallow water licenses in

Nigeria Accounts for 115 Million Cases of Genital Mutilation Globally, Says FG

The Minister of Women Affairs, Mrs. Pauline Tallen yesterday said Nigeria has the highest number of cases of Female Genital Mutilation (FGM) in the world, accounting for about 115 million out of 130 million circumcised women worldwide.

Speaking at the launch of the "Movement for Good to End Female Genital Mutilation in Nigeria," held in Abuja, yesterday. The launch of the 'Movement for Good to End FGM' was organised by the Federal Ministry of Women Affairs in collaboration with UNICEF.

Speaking on the challenges posed by the practice, the Minister

said: "Available statistics show that Nigeria has the highest number of cases of FGM in the world accounting for about 115 million out of 130 million circumcised women worldwide."

Tallen said the South-south zone with 77 per cent among adult women has the highest prevalence practice in Nigeria. "This is followed by the South-east zone with 68 per cent and South-west zone with 65 per cent. The northern part of Nigeria is also not free from this practice," she said.

She said the continuous practice of FGM denies girls and women the right to quality education, opportunities for decent work and their health particularly sexual

and reproductive are threatened.

According to Tallen, eliminating FGM was crucial to realising many of the other Sustainable Development Goals, (SDGs), including targets on health and well-being, quality education, gender equality, decent work and economic growth

On her part, the United States Ambassador, Leonard Mary Beth said the United States Agency for International Development (USAID) voted the sum of \$10 million for surgery, family planning and obstetrics programme currently implemented in in three states of the Federation including the Federal Capital Territory (FCT).

She said the program was for

the strengthening the health sector by training care providers and improving the training curriculum they need to help victims.

"It also raises awareness in communities about the dangers of FGM and on where to access care," she said.

FGM is a traditional practice

inflicted on girls and women worldwide and it was widely recognised as a violation of human rights, which is deeply rooted in cultural beliefs and perceptions over decades and generations.

The procedure involves the partial or total removal of the

external female genital causing injury to the female genital organs.

In places where it is practiced it is seen as a rite of passage of a girl-child to womanhood and this is encouraged by family members in the fear and belief of societal sanctions.

Osinbajo in Delta, Promises to Return Nigeria to Pride of Place

Asaba monarch wants security, economic challenges addressed

Vice-President Yemi Osinbajo, yesterday, in Asaba, Delta State, met with delegates, and reiterated his determination to return Nigeria to its pride of place by bringing to bear, his vast experience as a public servant with seven years experience as the country's number-two citizen.

Osinbajo, who was at the Palace of the Asagba of Asaba, to pay a courtesy call on the monarch, Obi (Prof) Chike Edozien, stated that it has always been his intention and desire to serve the nation with every breath in him and to do so creditably well so as to take Nigeria to the next level.

He, therefore, appealed to the delegates to support his ambition with their votes in the interest of the families and the progress of the country at large.

The Director-General of the National Biosafety Management Agency (NBMA), Dr. Rufus Ebegba has declared that Genetically Modified Organisms (GMOs) foods are safe for human consumption having certified by the agency.

This as the federal government agency has also stated that there are multiple benefits in patronising GMOs which include consistent availability of foods and enhancement of nation's economy.

A coalition of civil society organisations recently condemned the use of GMOs for production of foods in the country.

However, speaking at a one-day sensitisation workshop on biosafety in Nigeria, which was organized by NBMA in Port Harcourt, yesterday, Ebegba said GMOs go through various scientific test before they are finally certified for usage by the agency.

He condemned those disabusing the minds of the public against the federal government intentions to produce genetically modified organisms that are safe.

Ebegba revealed that the National Biosafety Management Agency was established by the NBMA Act 2015, to create and implement a regulatory framework for the practice of modern biotechnology and the use of its products in Nigeria.

He stressed that since coming into existence, the NBMA has put in place regulations, guidelines and policies to ensure that the products of modern biotechnology (genetically modified organisms) can be deployed safely in Nigeria

He added: "One thing I want to make you understand is that there are about 11 reserve institutions in this country: our universities are doing genetic engineering. All these institutions have to come up with products that will enhance advancement of the economy of our nation.

"We want to let the public know that all genetically modified organisms that will be ever released in this country, safety is assured.

Edo Court Stops Obaseki from Demanding, Collecting Land Use Charge

The Edo High Court Sitting in Benin City, has stopped Governor Godwin Obaseki and the Edo State Geographic Information Service (GIS), from the collection of land use charge in the state, describing it as unconstitutional, null and void.

The judgement which was delivered by Justice Peter Akhihero on April 25, 2022, was sequel to suit brought before him by the claimant, Chief Ferdinand Orbih.

Justice Akhihero held that land use charge was an exclusive matter for the 18 local government areas in the state.

In the Judgement with suit No B/99D/2022, counsel to the claimant, Kinsley Obamogie had argued that by Section 7 (1) (5) of the Constitution of the Federal

Republic of Nigeria, 1999 (As Amended), the collection of what the Edo State government through a Law called Land Use Charge was the exclusive duties of the 18 local governments of the state specifically donated by the constitution, which does not allow any derogation whatsoever.

Obamogie specifically made reference to Paragraph 1(j) of the Fourth Schedule of the Constitution of the Federal Republic of Nigeria, 1999 (As Amended), that the Land Use Charge Law, 2012, was enacted by the Edo State House of Assembly in flagrant breach of Section 7 Subsection 1 and 5 and paragraph 1(j) of the Fourth Schedule to the constitution.

He submitted that the local governments cannot give up powers given to them

by constitution to collect tenement rates through an agreement between the 18 local governments and Edo State Government, being an obligatory duty imposed by the constitution and he asked the court to grant the reliefs sought by the claimant.

Delivering the Judgement, Justice Peter Akinhiero, held among others that there was no written agreement presented to the court between the 18 local governments and the Edo State government delegating the powers to collect tenement rates to the state government.

The court then held that it was the ouster of express powers provided by the constitution, for the Land Use Charge Law to give powers to the Edo State Government using the Edo GIS to collect Tenement

Rates expressly donated by the constitution.

The court subsequently declared the Edo State Land Use Charge, Law 2012, which purports to take the powers from the local governments in Edo State to collect tenement rates was null and void

"Sequel to the foregoing, I hold that in the light of the provision of Section 7, sub-section 1 and 5 of the constitution of the Federal Republic of Nigeria, 1999 (as amended) and paragraph 1(j) of the fourth schedule to the aforesaid 1999 constitution the provision of section 3 (2), 5, 18, 24 and the identified parts of section 27, the land use charge law, 2012 of Edo State are unconstitutional , invalid, null and void and of no effect whatsoever. I therefore resolved issue 1 in favor of the claimant," he added.

At Iftar with Diplomatic Corps, Buhari Says He'll Ensure Will of Nigerians Prevail in 2023

● *Vows to resist rigging, cautions against foreign interference*

President Muhammadu Buhari, yesterday, told the diplomatic corps, who broke fast with him, that he would ensure the will of Nigerians

prevail in the 2023 general election. He, therefore, cautioned against plans by any individual or groups to rig the forthcoming elections, staying he would use every legitimate means to protect the

votes of Nigerians. At the same time, the president cautioned against foreign interference in the 2023 elections, but to adopt a positive role that reinforces the doctrine of respect for our internal affairs and respect for facts, devoid of pre-conceived notions and bias.

The president, who spoke Thursday at an Iftar dinner with members of the Diplomatic Corps at the State House, Abuja, warned those planning to rig the forthcoming elections to have a rethink, "because I intend to resolutely protect and defend the sacred will of the Nigerian people, to be expressed through the ballot box."

While cautioning against foreign interference, he said, "As you are all aware, the tenure of this administration ends on 29th May, 2023. Typical of election years all over the world, the tempo of political activities is often high.

"That is the nature of democracy. I am committed to bequeathing a stronger culture of credible elections to Nigeria than I met. As Nigeria goes through this trajectory, I urge our friends in the global community, represented by you the Diplomatic Corps, to adopt a positive role that reinforces the doctrine of respect for our internal affairs and respect for facts and devoid of pre-conceived notions and bias," he said.

Speaking on the Russia-Ukraine conflict, the president called for greater consideration for humanitarian conditions in the affected areas in the ongoing crisis, warning that the conflict would get worse, if an immediate resolution was not found.

According to him, "The war has lasted too long, cost so much and hurt too many people, well beyond the immediate theatres. The rest of the world is progressively facing the impact of the conflict and this will certainly get worse, if an immediate

resolution is not found, not least in the area of food security."

Welcoming the recent initiative of UN Secretary-General, Antonio Guterres, of visiting Moscow and Kyiv, President Buhari commended his efforts in search of a ceasefire, as a prelude to other enduring solutions.

"The United Nations must continue to actively lead the way for engagements that could ultimately unlock peace through diplomacy," he said.

The President urged the world, especially, the Muslim community, to use the solemn and rewarding month of Ramadan, and especially, these last days of the fast, to intensify prayers for de-escalation of the Russia-Ukraine conflict and for the return of peace to the world.

President Buhari also used the occasion to apprise members of the international community on some of the critical issues that were currently on the front burner of

this administration's agenda and spirited efforts in handling them.

His words: "We continue to make steady progress on the daunting tasks of combating insecurity, fighting corruption, diversifying the economy, promoting good governance, and containing the COVID-19 pandemic.

"Despite the many challenges we faced, and continue to face, we have instituted measures to plug leakages, improve the economy and enhance the achievement of the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

"These include Renewal of vital infrastructure, including rail and roads; Implementation of the N2.3 trillion Economic Sustainability Plan to create jobs and provide support to Small and Medium Scale Enterprises; and Launch of the National Development Plan (2021-2025) to spur economic growth, leverage science, technology and innovation.

Group Faults Falana on Jonathan's Eligibility for 2023 Presidential Election

A socio-political group under the platform of the Law & Order Group, has faulted the submissions of senior lawyer, Mr. Femi Falana, SAN, on the eligibility of former President Goodluck Jonathan for the 2023 presidential election.

This came just as colourful and intimidating posters of Jonathan dotted major streets in Kano yesterday. The posters with inscription, "2023 Our hope, Our Solution, were strategically pasted to catch the attention of the city dwellers.

The posters were mainly passed within and around the Kano business district that housed half of the city population.

Falana, had on a national television submitted that Jonathan could not contest the 2023 presidency because of a new constitutional provisions that foreclosed him from participating.

According to Falana, Section 137 (3) of the Constitution of the Federal Republic of Nigeria, 1999 (as amended) forbids a person who completed the tenure of another from serving beyond a single term.

But in a swift response, the group in the statement titled: "Former President Goodluck Jonathan is Qualified to Contest for the Office of the President of Nigeria in the 2023 General Election", faulted Falana's submission describing it as "erroneous and misconceived."

The group in the statement signed by its Coordinator, Aliyu Mohammed, explained

that the fourth Alteration to the Constitution which introduced Section 137(3) was signed into law as part of the Constitution of the Federal Republic of Nigeria, 1999 (As Amended) by President Muhammadu Buhari in June 2018 while Jonathan was president between 2011 and 2015.

"The said Section 137 (3) contains a commencement date which is the date it was signed into law. Thus, the provisions of Section 137(3) of the 1999 Constitution (4th Alteration) became operative on the 7th of June, 2018 and not any time before that date.

"The law is settled beyond controversy or dispute that a law does not take effect retroactively. Again, it is the law that, where a piece of legislation sets out a specific commencement date, as in the case of Section 137 (3), all rights, duties, obligations and interests created or intended to be created or imposed by that law will not be applicable to rights, events or duties which accrued or occurred before then," the group submitted.

They further stressed that one of the cardinal principles of the country's legal system is that constitutional provisions and, indeed, laws are not applied retroactively.

In addition, the Law and Order Group stated that the courts have, over the years, declared retroactive application of laws as reprehensive and abusive, adding that Section 137(3) of the 1999 Constitution is not and will not present an exception simply because some persons desire it to be so.

2023: Abiodun Declares for Second Term

● *Ogun governor deserves re-election, says Fayemi*

Ogun State Governor, Dapo Abiodun, yesterday officially declared his intention to seek re-election in 2023 on the platform of All Progressives Congress (APC), saying he remains undaunted and resolutely committed to achieve more for the state.

The National Chairman of the Peoples Democratic Party (PDP), Dr. Iyorchia Ayu, yesterday, said much as former Vice President, Alhaji Atiku Abubakar, remained his personal friend, with whom he had fought many political battles, he would not support his presidential bid, because he and the National Working Committee (NWC) were determined to conduct

a transparent and fair presidential primary election.

This is as Atiku has asked the PDP leadership to give him a right of first refusal in its choice of presidential candidate, because already, he had some 11 million votes in the kitty.

Also, the Bauchi State Governor and presidential hopeful, Senator Bala Mohammed, has said contrary to speculation, the decision by former Military President, General

Ibrahim Babangida and Professor Ango Abdullahi, to settle for him and Senator Bukola Saraki as the consensus presidential candidates of the north was not a unilateral decision.

In the same vein, the Sokoto State Governor, Aminu Tambuwal, who intensified his consultations for presidential bid, met with former ministers of the party from 1999 to 2015 and told them he was the best man for the job.

This, nonetheless, the PDP, yesterday, began the screening of its 17 presidential aspirants, even as it was adamant on the zoning of its presidential ticket.

However, Ayu, while speaking during the screening of Atiku, said, "I cannot deny that you are my friend. I don't deny my friends. We worked together in various capacities. You and I plotted the emergence of President Olusegun Obasanjo.

"But in this, I will not work for you. I will work for all the 17 presidential aspirants. I will not take sides with you. I will work for all the aspirants. Let the delegates decide, who is the presidential candidate of the party.

"If you happen to emerge as the presidential candidate, the party will support you. The party has an internal process of choosing its candidate and we will follow that process. We are not known of conducting a controversial presidential convention. Our presidential convention will be thorough and transparent," Ayu stated.

The PDP boss hinted that, at the next National Executive Committee (NEC) meeting, the party would set up a manifesto committee to articulate its policies, including the foreign policy focus of the party, to enable Nigerians know where it stood on all issues.

Atiku, while speaking, called on the NWC to ensure that he was given the right of first refusal in the contest of who becomes the presidential candidate, because he has already 11 million voters in the bag.

Enugu Govt Trains over 260 Young Farmers on Modern Agriculture

The beneficiaries have arrived safely at the agricultural training facility in Keffi.

According to a statement, addressing the participants at Michael Okpara Square, Independence Layout, Enugu, before departure, the Special Adviser to the Governor on Agriculture, Engr. Michael Ogbuekwe, disclosed that the training was part of the concerted efforts of the Ugwuanyi's administration to encourage and empower the youth to gain agricultural experience in line with international best practices.

Ogbuekwe explained that Ugwuanyi was committed to agricultural development in Enugu State as well as efficient and effective involvement of the youth and other indigenes of the state in modern agriculture.

Justice Evelyn Ayandike of the Federal High Court in Umuahia, had in a judgement delivered last month ordered the deletion of Section 84 of the Electoral Act, which barred political appointees from participating in congresses and conventions of political parties except they resigned 30 days to such conventions and congresses.

The judge held that the section should be deleted and given no effect because it contravened the Constitution, which had already given conditions on how a person could qualify or be disqualified in any election.

In his submission, another senior lawyer, Chief Mike Ozekhome, SAN, disagreed with Falana, on the grounds that the

law nullifying the said portion of the Electoral Act subsisted until set aside.

According to Ozekhome, "The truth is that until it is set aside even if it is on appeal, the judgement for now operates."

He said that what the appeal court said was that the judgement should not be executed until the appeal was decided.

Ozekhome described the situation "as a very tricky one", even as he expressed confidence that the appellate court would affirm the judgment of the Federal High Court, because the said section was unconstitutional.

"I agree with that judgement in Umuahia, and I believe that they will strike it down. The Constitution has already provided how one can be qualified or be disqualified from election, whether it is primary or other election."

The senior lawyer further contended that if a law of a party contradicted the Constitution, the Constitution takes precedent.

While insisting that the constitution had already spelt out who was qualified or not, Ozekhome stressed, "You cannot now use a party's constitution to add to that qualification, otherwise, there would be no end to it."

He referred to the NDLEA request as an additional imposition for qualification, saying that too was "unconstitutional".

He said the move by NDLEA was a good one which he supported but that it could not be brought in just like Justice Ekwo removed Umahi for defection."

He maintained that the Constitution had provided how a governor should be removed from office and that defection was not one of them, adding, "a court cannot make law, the court interprets it."

He accused Justice Ekwo of overruling the Supreme Court in the case of the federal government against Atiku by going ahead to order the removal of Umahi on account of his defection from the

because there has to be rule of law, there has to be security. Before anything else, Mr. Chairman, and members of the National Working Committee, about two months ago, I was on a visit to Niger State and I decided to pay a courtesy call to the governor. 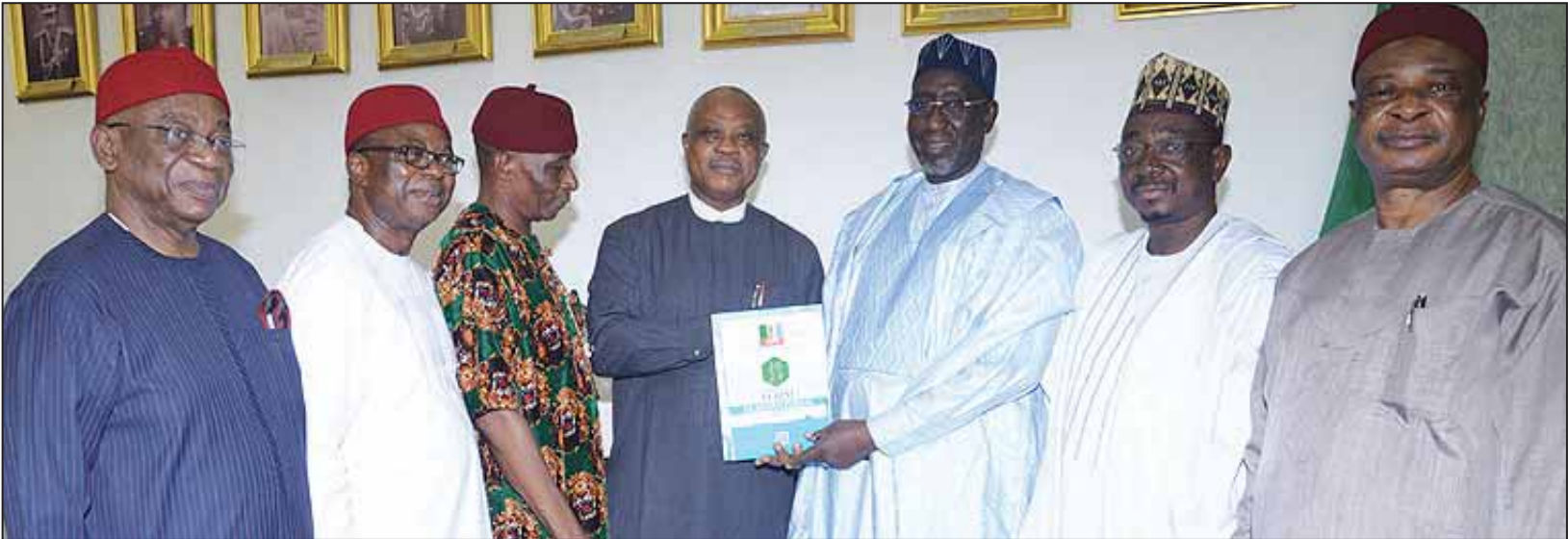
He lamented that, "There is no single day that passes without an ugly incident of attack and massacre in rural communities or mass abductions of people in both rural communities and

The Vice President was speaking at the 25th edition of the National Stakeholders Consultative Forum (NSCF) on Trafficking in Persons, and the public presentation of the National Action Plan on Human Trafficking (2022-2026).

"As we all know by now; human trafficking is a challenge of extraordinary magnitude. Empirical evidence shows that it is a multi-billion-dollar enterprise with criminals

exploiting their victims over and over".

The VP, who was represented by the Deputy Chief of Staff to the President, Mr. Ade Ikpaye, remarked that for years, issues of human trafficking have plagued the country, smearing Nigeria as an origin, transit, and destination country.

He said: "Trafficking in persons and irregular migration is, without doubt, a National and International concern, especially with a large number of Nigerians trapped in sexual and labor exploitation in various African and European countries, all striving for greener pasture."

While identifying poverty, underdevelopment, and lack of equal opportunity as major factors encouraging the crime, he disclosed that President Muhammadu Buhari-led government recognizing this fact has encouraged the investment in people, especially the young and disadvantaged.

Boko Haram in 17 Northern LGs are Spent Forces, Says Gambari

Obi Cubana Sues PM Express for N1bn, Says He is Not a Drug Baron

Chief Obinna Iyiegbu, popularly known as Obi Cubana, has slammed a whopping N1 billion law suit against publishers of Lagos based newspapers “PM Express” at the High Court of the Federal Capital Territory (FCT) over publication of defamatory information against him.

Obi Cubana in the suit dated and filed on April 27, 2022 by his lawyer, Mr. Afam Osiogwe (SAN), is also seeking an order of perpetual injunction, restraining the defendants either by themselves, agents, third party, media outfits etc from publishing, advertising, promoting, distributing, circulating and serializing the news article, which is the subject matter of the suit on the internet, social media, Facebook and other social platforms, containing allegations and insinuations that he is involved in drug trafficking.

In the suit marked: CV/1367/2022, Chief Iyiegbu stated that he had suffered severe losses since the defendants, in their publication of April 26, 2022 presented him as a drug baron whose bank accounts have been frozen by the orders of a Federal High Court in Lagos.

Defendants in the suit are David Odey, Arinze Alinnor, Funsho Arogundade, Cyriacus Izulekwe and Taiwo Adelu, carrying on business in the name and style of DAFCT Communications.

In the statement of claim, Chief Iyiegbu accused the defendants of “maliciously” using his photography in publishing a story in which the entire story as well as reported court

order has absolutely nothing to do with him.

According to the claimant, the defendants had on April 26, 2022 published on their website: www.pmexpressng.com a story with headline “Court Orders Banks to Freeze Suspected Drug Barons’ Accounts” with

his picture used as that of one of the two suspected drug barons, Basil Okafor Onochie and Okwuchukwu Edwin Izuchukwu, whose accounts were reportedly ordered frozen by Justice Tijjani Ringim in the suit filed by the National Drug Law Enforcement Agency (NDLEA).

Ebonyi state government has dissociated itself from the current trails of Reverend Father Timothy Ngwuta, who is currently incarcerated in Abakaliki prisons, stating that his case bothers on criminality.

Governor Dave Umahi of Ebonyi has been fingered as the brain behind Ngwuta’s incarceration. But in a reaction, the Commissioner of Information, Uchenna Orji said that on the contrary Ngwuta was in prison for “the criminal charge based on his alleged complicity in aiding and abetting war and killings in Effium/Ezza Effium Community in Ohaukwu Local Government Area.”

Giving details of Ngwuta’s alleged criminal involvement, Orji pointed out that “the security report made available to us indicates that Rev. Fr. Timothy Ngwuta was arrested by the surveillance youths and vigilance team of Nwori village in the warring community when he

came in the company of two other suspects on 11th December, 2021 to recover a vehicle suspected to have been used to convey some of the armed warriors suspected to have unleashed attack on the security operatives who were in search of the bodies of the 5 NELAN Engineers allegedly killed by kingpins of the warriors.

“The security report further revealed that the said Rev. Father is a native of Inikiri Umuezokaoha Ezza Effium, a section of the warring community where the suspected attack occurred and it is also on record that he confirmed in his statements to the Police that he went to Nwori village to recover the car suspected to have been used by the armed warriors to carry out the attack that led to the death of two security operatives and others injured during security operations at Nwanenwo forest on the 28th day of November, 2021”

‘Eid: An Occasion for Worship and Showing Gratitude

Days pass by and hours lapse quickly. It seems as if it was just yesterday that we received a dear guest, but today we will bid it farewell.

Just a few days ago, the crescent of the month of Ramadan appeared and today it is about to fade away. Other nations take pride in their days of celebration and festivals, giving them false attributes, exaggerated importance, imaginary blessings and illusory happiness, despite being deviant and going astray. However, truth and guidance will always be found in the methodology of the nation of Muhammad, (pbuh). Thus, all thanks be to Allah The Almighty for guiding the Muslim nation to the truth and distinguishing it with an unprecedented favor.

Open your eyes wide to see the graceful nation at sunrise on the day of ‘Eed, worshipping Allah The Almighty by breaking the fast, just as you worshipped Him by observing fast.

Anas (ra) said, “When the Messenger of Allah (pbuh) came to Madeenah, the people had two days on which they would have fun. He said: ‘Allah has given you something better than those two days, the Day of ‘Eed Al-Adh-ha and ‘Eed Al-Fitr.” [Abu Daawood and An-Nasaa’i]

‘Eed is a great rite and practice of Islam; however, some people have belittled it by giving precedence to innovated festivals. Hence, we see many people preparing for birthdays, Mother’s Day and the like, rejoicing along with their children over their advent, and spending large sums of money to celebrate them. On the other hand, they look down upon the festivals of Islam and they may even not notice them forgetting that Allah The Almighty Says (what means): [That [is so]. And whoever honors the symbols of Allah - indeed, it is from the piety of hearts.] [Quran 22:32]

The day of ‘Eed is happy and joyful for those who have righteous souls and sincere intentions rather than those who only wear new clothes and take pride in their large numbers. The true ‘Eed is for those who fear the Day of Threat (Judgment) and the honorable Owner of the Throne, and who shed the tears of repentance hoping for the Day of Rewards. Here are some quick reflections on the etiquette and rulings of ‘Eed:

1. Thank Allah The Almighty for completing the blessing of observing fast and night prayer during this blessed month upon you and supplicate Allah The Almighty frequently and entreat Him to accept your fast and night prayer and to Forgive your negligence.
2. Takbeer: It is an act of the Sunnah for one to say Takbeer [Allahu akbar, Allahu akbar, laa ilaaha ill-Allah, wa Allahu akbar, Allah akbar, wa Lillaah il-hamd (Allah is Most Great, Allah is Most Great, there

is no deity worthy of worship but Allah, Allah is Most Great, Allah is Most Great, and to Allah be praise)] from the time of sunset of the night of ‘Eed until the ‘Eed Prayer. Allah The Exalted Says (what means): {and to glorify Allah for that [to] which He has guided you; and perhaps you will be grateful.}[Quran 2:185]

It is an act of Sunnah (Prophetic tradition) for men to say Takbeer loudly in mosques, markets and roads to manifest the glorification of Allah The Almighty and to show obedience and gratitude to Him.

3. Zakat Al-Fitr: Your Lord has commanded you to pay Zakat Al-Fitr by the end of the blessed month of Ramadan as purification for the fasting person from idle talk and obscene speech, and to feed the poor. Zakat Al-Fitr is 2 kilograms and 40 grams of dates, barley, raisins, rice, cheese or similar foods. It is enjoined upon everyone, slave or free, male or female, and young or old.

The best time for paying it is before the ‘Eed Prayer, and it is permissible to pay it one or two days before the ‘Eed. However, it is impermissible for one to pay it after the ‘Eed Prayer, because this contradicts the Sunnah (tradition) of the Prophet, (pbuh). It must be food fit for humans and one must search for the poor and give it to them.

Allowing young children to participate in paying Zakat Al-Fitr is a good way to accustom them to the sublime Islamic meanings underlying the spirit of ‘Eed.

4. Taking a bath, applying perfume, wearing the best clothes for men, while staying distant from extravagance and shaving of the beard because this is prohibited. As for the woman, it is lawful for her to go to the place of the ‘Eed prayer without exposing her adornment or applying perfume. The true Muslim woman can never go to worship Allah The Almighty while she is committing the sin of illegal exposure of adornment or wearing perfume in front of non-Mahram men.

5. Eating an odd number of dates (three, five, and so on) before heading to the place of ‘Eed Prayer, as the Prophet, (pbuh), used to do so.

6. Performing the ‘Eed Prayer in congregation and attending the Khutbah (sermon). According to senior scholars, the ‘Eed prayer is obligatory and it is impermissible for one to leave it without a valid excuse in the Share’ah (Islamic legislation). With regard to women, they should attend the ‘Eed prayer with the Muslims even if they are menstruating. However, the menstruating women should keep away from the place of prayer.

7. Taking different routes. It is recommended for one to go to the ‘Eed prayer via one route and return via another, as the Prophet, (pbuh), used to do so.

8. There is no harm in exchanging greetings on ‘Eed such as ‘Taqabbal Allaahu minna wa minkum (may Allah accept from us and you).”

The ‘Eed Prayer Described

‘Eed prayer is a strongly recommended and important act of worship in Islam and the Prophet (pbuh) never neglected it. The Hanafi School of Jurisprudence says it is obligatory. The Prophet (pbuh) is reported to have ordered men, women and children to proceed to the ‘Eed prayer ground. Even menstruating women are encouraged to attend the ‘Eed sermon but they should keep away from the prayer area.

It is highly recommended to have ritual ablution (Ghusl) and to wear the most beautiful garments and the best perfumes one possesses.

It (i.e., the ‘Eed Prayer) consists of two Rak’ahs (unit of prayer). Ibn ‘Umar may Allah be pleased with him said: “The journey prayer consists of two Rak’ahs, the Adh-Haa prayer consists of two Rak’ahs, and the Fitr prayer consists of two Rak’ahs as well, and they are complete prayers not shortened according to what the Prophet (pbuh) said.”

The first Rak’ah begins with the Takbeer [saying: Allahu Akbar (Allah is the Greatest)] as the case is in all other prayers. Then Imaam (followed by the praying Muslims) recites seven Takbeeraat (plural of Takbeer). In the second Rak’ah there are five Takbeeraat other than the transmission Takbeer (i.e., the one recited when the Imam and the praying Muslims stand up to perform second Rak’ah). ‘Aa’ishah, may Allah be pleased with her, said: “The Prophet (pbuh) used to recite Takbeer in (the prayers of ‘Eed) Al-Fitr and Al-Adh-Haa, seven Takbeeraat in the first (Raka’ah) and five in the second one other than the two Takbeeraat that precede the Rukoo’ (bowing).”

Imaam Al-Bahawi (ra) said: “This is the opinion of most of the well-versed scholars of the Companions, may Allah be pleased with them all, and those who followed them that there are seven Takbeeraat in the first Rak’ah of the ‘Eed prayer other than the first Takbeer (Takbeeratul Ihram), and five Takbeeraat in the second Rak’ah other than the transmission Takbeer and all before reciting (verses from the Glorious Quran). This was narrated from Abu Bakr, ‘Umar, ‘Ali, may Allah be pleased with them, and others.” It is not affirmed that the Prophet (pbuh) used to raise his hands with

every Takbeer, but Ibn al-Qayyim (ra) said: “Though Ibn ‘Umar, may Allah be pleased with him, was a great follower of the Prophetic Sunnah, he used to raise his hands when reciting the Takbeeraat.”

When the Prophet (pbuh) was done with the Takbeeraat, he used to recite the Faatihah (the first chapter) of the Holy Quran) then he recites “Qaaf, By the Glorious Quran,” [chapter 50] in the first Rak’ah and Al-Qamar [chapter 54] in the second one.

Sometimes he (pbuh) used to recite Al-‘Alaa Soorah [chapter 87] in the first Rak’ah and Al-Ghashiyah Soorah [chapter 88] in the second one. Ibn Al-Qayyim (ra) said: “The two cases were affirmed from the Prophet (pbuh) and nothing else.”

The rest of the acts of the ‘Eed prayer are as those of any other prayer; nothing is different.

Whoever misses the ‘Eed prayer with the congregation can offer a two Rak’ahs prayer.

Imaam Al-Bukhari (ra) said: “Whoever misses the ‘Eed prayer should offer two Rak’ahs prayer.” Al-Hafith Ibn Hajar (ra) said in ‘Al-Fath’ commenting on Al-Bukhari’s point, “Regarding this point, there are two rulings:

A. Offering the ‘Eed prayer is obligatory, if missed with the congregation whether (missing it was) willingly or unwillingly.

B. It is a two Rak’ahs prayer; ‘Ataa’ (ra) said whoever missed the ‘Eed (prayer) could offer a two Rak’ahs prayer.”

Waliullaah Ad-Dahlawi (ra) said: “This is the Shaafi’i’s Madhhab (school of jurisprudence) that if one misses the ‘Eed prayer with the Imam could offer a two Rak’ahs prayer so as not to miss the blessings of the ‘Eed prayer having missed the blessings of the congregational prayer with the Imam. Abu Hanifah, on the other hand, believed that there is no making up for the missed ‘Eed prayer and if one misses it with the Imam he can never make up for it.

Imaam Maalik (ra) said in Al-Muwattaa: “Whoever - whether a man or a woman - offers the ‘Eed prayer alone should recite seven Takbeeraat in the first Rak’ah and five Takbeeraat in the second one before reciting (some verses from the Glorious Quran).” And whoever misses part of the ‘Eed prayer (with the Imam) should make up for the missed part as it is, just like other prayers.

THE TRAGIC CYCLE OF YORUBA HISTORY

identifying with the memory of the late and last premier of the Western region, Chief Ladoke Akintola. My dad was regional minister from 1955 to 1966 straddling the premiership of Chiefs Obafemi Awolowo and Ladoke Akintola. More significantly, he opted for the Akintola faction in the factional crisis that ensued within the ranks of the Action Group, AG, in 1962. In taking this stand he was led by his conscience and conviction. He was only one of two ministers exonerated and exculpated of any act of corruption or wrongdoing by the Justice Kayode Eso panel (set up by military governor Adekunle Fajuyi in 1966 to probe the Akintola government).

According to Oladesu of the nation newspaper “Osuntokun served the people of Western Region without enriching himself. He shone as a politician, and he shunned corruption. To the political icon from Okemesi-Ekiti, contentment was great gain. As minister of lands and housing he was responsible for the creation of the industrial and residential layouts of Ikorodu, Ilupeju and Ikeja. A principled and disciplined man, Osuntokun never allocated a single plot to himself, family or friends”. The historian junior brother to the minister, Professor Osuntokun wrote the first authoritative biography of Akintola titled S.Ladoke Akintola: His Life and Times. In the foreword to the book, Professor Emmanuel Ayandele pointedly remarked “Akinjide Osuntokun has been more than ordinarily audacious in choosing a terrain upon which angels would fear to tread. For he has selected for analysis a political gladiator of national stature who, at the time of his murder in the coup of January 15, 1966 that toppled the first republic, had been labelled by his political enemies in Yoruba land as a twentieth century Afonja.. That this leader of the opposition in the federal parliament in the last years of British

colonial rule and Premier of the “wild wild West” in the first republic has been partially rehabilitated, perhaps vindicated, is clear from this professional X-ray by historian Osuntokun”.

By dint of this heritage and as a student of Nigerian politics I was sufficiently motivated to reexamine all received wisdom on the Awolowo/Akintola crisis and did my level best to arrive at objective and independent conclusions. And I was afforded the platform to do so as a columnist in leading Nigerian newspapers in the past thirty years. All writing, contends Daniel Murray, is autobiographical, that ‘everything we write inevitably bears the imprint of our life experience that is unique to us and distinguishes our work from others’. Hence I have had to rebut the orthodoxy of a generalised Yoruba wide criminalization and demonisation of Akintola. He was no saint neither was he the devil. Prior to the externalisation of the crisis he bent over backwards to contain the differences he had with Awolowo within the ranks of the AG/Yoruba leadership including prostrating before the AG leader but was rebuffed and ridiculed. There was no party patriarch especially the regional governor, Ooni Adesoji Aderemi, who did not counsel Awolowo that his deputy has done enough to earn his magnanimity. Towards the end of his life he would rue his intransigence against Akintola, wondering what more remorse the premier could have shown to merit his forgiveness. He went on to attribute his rigid stance to the pressure brought to bear on him by the radical young party intellectuals.

Corroboration was provided a decade later by Professor Sam Aluko. “In fact, it was we, who caused the problem between Akintola and Awolowo. There was a group in the university then, led by Prof. Oyenuga. He was chairman of the Committee of Civil

Liberty at that time. We had Prof. Odumosu, Prof. Wole Soyinka, some Europeans and myself. We said, as a group, the way things were going, we must have an ideology guiding us. So, we had what we called democratic socialism, which now became the policy of the Action Group. So, Awo said this democratic socialism we must try it, which he did into concrete programmes like agriculture, health, roads etc”..That was exactly what caused their problem. Akintola had become premier by then, so he said why should Awolowo be organising people to write philosophy for the party. That when Awo was premier, they were writing for him as premier and that since he (Akintola) had assumed the premiership, they should be writing for him. He felt that Awo was out to undermine him, and said no, things could not continue like that”. I have recalled these penitent reflections not to absolve Akintola of blame but to give a balanced historical perspective against the backdrop that he did not survive to tell his story.

Thirty five years after this episode, in 2001, the title and theme of my lecture was prompted by the eruption of a similar intramural imbroglio within the ranks of the Yoruba/Afenifere leadership. It was the story of the late Chief Ajibola Ige who felt betrayed by his colleagues in the choice of Chief Olu Falae (a newcomer to the Afenifere leadership caucus) over him as the presidential candidate of the caucus . Thus offended, Ige initiated a supremacist struggle against his colleagues in the Afenifere political hierarchy within which he was deputy leader to Senator Abraham Adesanya. As recently recalled by Dare Babarinsa “It is interesting that close to the 20th anniversary of Ige’s death, Chief Bisi Akande, one of Ige’s closest collaborators released his robust autobiography, My Participations, to tell

Ige’s side of the story, ‘Akande’s book is the third by Afenifere chieftains to tell their stories and wage war by other means. The first to publish was Chief Ayo Adebajo whose autobiography, Telling It As It Is, spares no one in his gunsight. He had no kind words to one of the old comrades, Chief Bola Ige, who by 2018 when Adebajo published his book, had been dead for 17 years”. In my reckoning, after his humiliating loss to Falae, the smart political strategy, from the standpoint of group cohesion and unity, would be for his colleagues to see the need to rally round him and help heal his political wound. Not to see and accept the need for this outreach amounted to insensitivity bordering on hostility but Ige equally overreacted.

After a twenty two years interlude, we are being treated to a seeming similar manifestation of this historical tendency in the Bola Ahmed Tinubu/ Yemi Osinbajo conflict. Relative to the three historical precedence and as Karl Marx contended- this is history repeating itself as farce. Yet it has a distinct potential for a contrived region wide political polarisation. Unlike Awolowo and Adesanya, Tinubu lacks the political legitimacy that can evoke and sustain a campaign of demonisation against Osinbajo who personifies the shared Yorùbá value of meritocracy. Both of them are guilty of the opportunism of not accepting the moral imperative of conceding the field to the Igbo. But a greater disqualifier of Tinubu is the willingness to subordinate the delicate religious balance of Nigeria to his presidential aspiration. No personal ambition is worth the religious stress test and dangerous experimentation to which Nigeria will be subjected by a Muslim / Muslim presidential ticket. With charity towards all and malice to none, I cannot see any clear path, going forward, for either of them.

Osimhen Sacks His Agent, Joins Calenda's Stable

Nigerian international, Victor Osimhen, has sacked his agent and switch camp to Italian FIFA Football Agent, Roberto Calenda. According to OwnGoalNigeria.com, the Super Eagles forward who was previously represented by Jean-Gerard Benoit Czajka right from the age of 14 years parted ways with the agent during negotiations for the record breaking move from Lille of France to Napoli little over two years ago. William D'Avilla of DW Sports brokered the Napoli deal

and was largely instrumental to Osimhen's move to Naples. Surprisingly, both player and agent parted ways barely a year into the contract. It was at this stage that Osimhen turned to his brother-in-law Osita Okolo as his new agent. OwnGoalNigeria.com reported yesterday that the relationship between Osimhen and Okolo hit the rock following the Agent's advice to the Super Eagles forward to take care of his family. The statement appears not to go down well

with the player. This was why Osimhen is believed to have turned his attention to Calenda as his new agent. The first major task facing the new agent is how to get the best deal for the 2015 FIFA Under-17 World Cup winner with the Golden Eaglets following several offers from English Premier League clubs for Osimhen. After London Gunners Arsenal appears to be the front runners to lure Osimhen to the Premier League with mouth-watering offer, Manchester

United have also joined the fray for the signature of the Nigerian. Reports from Italy yesterday indicate that Manchester United are leading Arsenal and Newcastle in the race to sign the Napoli striker and in the next few days, the picture would become clearer. As at last week, odds favoured Arsenal. They were sure of top-four finish to meet one of the conditions given by Osimhen to play in the UEFA Champions' league next season after a long spell out of the tournament.

The Nigeria Women Football League (NWFL) has approved the promotion of four Nationwide teams to the NWFL Championship against the earlier two publicised by the league board. The increase was announced Thursday by the General Co-ordinator of the NWFL Nationwide, Sir Joe Amene, while addressing the four teams that qualified for the final round of the Nationwide League. The four teams are: Lakeside Queens of Lagos, Imo Strikers of Owerri, Prince Kazeem Eletu Queens of Lagos and Delta Babes of Asaba. Amene, in his statement to the teams after the last two matches played at the School of Health Technology, Benin City, noted that, the approval for the promotion of the four teams was given by the Chairperson of the Nigeria Women Football League, Aisha Falode, with the support of other board members of the NWFL, after watching all the group matches in the A1, A2, B1 and B2. Amene stressed that, the Chairperson and the members were marvelled by the standard of play of all the teams and particularly the last four teams - Imo Strikers, Lakeside Queens of Lagos, Prince Kazeem Eletu Queens of Lagos and Delta Babes. "The high standard of play was the main reason the four teams were promoted. None of the teams, coaches, nor league officials had the premonition that four teams will qualify for the NWFL Championship. But they were only lifted by their excellent standard of play and maturity displayed by all the 16 teams that participated in the league. "Last season, a total of eight teams were promoted to the NWFL Championship from the Nationwide. Four each from the Ijebu Ode and Abuja centres. The standard at both Ijebu Ode and Abuja wasn't as high as what we experienced at the Western Boys Stadium, Ikpoba Hill and the School of Health Technology, Okha, Benin City this year."

EUROPA LEAGUE switched allegiance to Nigeria, forced Gianluca Mancini to turn into his own net to level from close range after 67 minutes. Kelechi Iheanacho who came on in the 62nd minute for Jamie Vardy failed to get on the scorers sheet against Jose Mourinho's side. The return leg in Italy takes

In The Netherlands, another Nigerian international, Cyriel Dessers' brace gave Feyenoord a 3-2 victory against Olympique de Marseille's in the UEFA Europa Conference League at De Kuip. Feyenoord started off well, and were able to hold off Marseille's early pressure. As the hosts grew into the game with two goals

ahead, they continuously were able to get behind Marseille's back line with balls from above. The French team fought back to tie the game at 2-2. However, Dessers' second goal of the evening, barely one minute into the second half gave Feyenoord the 3-2 victory going into the second leg of the semi final next week Thursday. Joe Aribo and Calvin Bassey's trip with Rangers to Germany

did not bear good results as the Scottish team lost 1-0 to a late strike from RB Leipzig's Angelo. Now, Rangers must come from behind if they are to reach their first European final in 14 years after a resolute showing was undone by that late wonder strike in their Europa League semi-final first leg. The Bundesliga hosts were limited in their opportunities but take a slender lead to Glasgow thanks to a stunning Angelino volley five minutes from time.

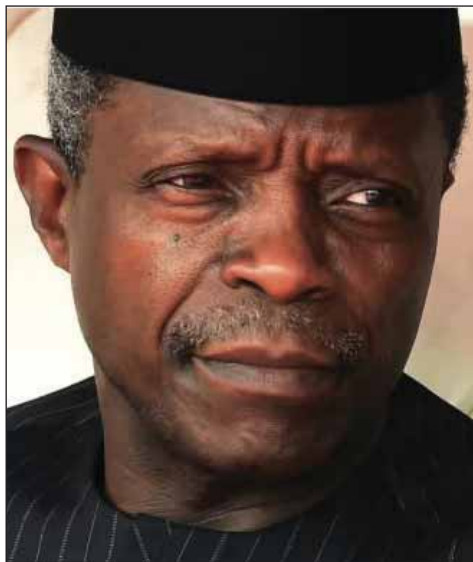
The Tragic Cycle Of Yoruba History

"Those who do not remember the past are condemned to repeat it" —George Santayana

History repeats itself, first as tragedy, second as farce —Karl Marx

"The only thing that we learn from history is that we learn nothing from history." —Georg Hegel

The citations above have intermittently found resonance in Yoruba history. The perspective they embodied has been read into such historical landmarks as the Afonja/Alaafin crisis, the Obafemi Awolowo/Ladoke Akintola feud, the Afenifere/Bola Ige schism and now the Bola Tinubu/Yemi Osinbajo broken relationship. The repetitive inference of betrayal as leitmotif is a flawed anecdotal interpretation of reality in almost all the instances. The favourite departure point of this historical retrospection is the tragic 19th-century sociopolitical implosion of an inchoate and incipient Yoruba nation. The Are Ona Kakanfo, (commander in chief of the armed forces) Afonja was the ill starred political Judas who plotted with wily external forces to vanquish the Aláàfin, the political sovereign of the Oyo empire.

The consequential fallacy of this narrative lies in the fact that Afonja had militarily prevailed over the Alaafin ever before his path crossed with Alimi (which encounter turned out to be his death warrant and the proximate cause of the appropriation of Ilorin into the Sokoto caliphate).

As I have reiterated on this page, Afonja was a villain quite alright but only as the most prominent of many rebellious warlords who had little consciousness or notion of the Yoruba national unity that we now presume and take for granted. He was notoriously guilty of violating the political order and stability of the empire but little is said on the pertinent mitigation that his agent provocateur role was substantially provoked by a fellow rogue political sovereign, Alaafin Aole. What has been historically interpreted as treachery was an unintended consequence of a self-destructive violation of the political order. He obviously did not anticipate the short term consequences of his action let alone the ensuing long term ramifications. Given the nature of military alliances that

were contracted by Yoruba warlords in the 19th century, they did not categorically perceive the Fulani as a corporate enemy—with the ulterior objective of subverting and incorporating the totality of the Yoruba society into the Sokoto caliphate.

This history resonated one and half centuries later in the Obafemi Awolowo/Ladoke Akintola feud. I had the distinct privilege of being called forth to deliver the first Ladoke Akintola Memorial Lecture twenty years ago. Why me? Following upon the precedence of my dad, Chief Oduola Osuntokun and my uncle, Professor Akinjide Osuntokun and against the run of popular imagination, I have been unapologetic in publicly and objectively
